

WEIGHT KILLS MAN AND BOY

SODDEN DEATH OVER TAKES MILK MEN

THIRTEEN AND 12-YEAR-OLD Nephew Clarence Helit Killed High in Air by Tumbling Train at Sellwood Crossing

Accident, apparently the first of the kind, in which a heavy Southern Railway train was bearing down on a milk train, occurred at the intersection of the two lines at the Sellwood crossing at 6:55 o'clock, and was instantly fatal to the boy, Clarence Helit, who was riding with him, died before 10 o'clock.

The train was thrown fully 100 feet and landed when W. A. Guthrie, the sole witness of the tragedy, reached him, the boy was hurled nearly 100 feet and nearly every bone in his body broken. He lived for four hours after the accident, but was unconscious most of the time.

Thomas, who was unmarried and lived with his stepfather and mother on a ranch less than a mile away from the crossing, was the first to see the accident. He was driving his horse and buggy when he saw the train coming and stopped to watch.

W. A. Guthrie, a neighbor, was the man who saw the accident from the house about 400 feet south of the crossing. He was watching to see the train go by. CHINESE EXCLUSION STARTS WOOLY BATTLE

Northern Baptist Convention Uncorks Heated Oratory Over Resolution Charging Unfair Treatment by Federal Law. Other Points Made.

(United Press-Associated Wire.) Zane Batten of Lincoln, Neb., was adopted as read. The report follows: "Resolved, That the Chinese exclusion laws now being enforced are in a spirit of violation of the treaty between the United States and China, and by the enforcement of these laws many quiet, inoffensive and industrious Chinese people who have been in this country years are threatened with deportation and great loss and suffering. Therefore, be it

Resolved, That we declare most positively that we do not advocate Asiatic immigration to this country. Other resolutions passed are as follows: "Resolved, That we rejoice in the recent wide extension of prohibition privileges in the splendid achievements of the Anti-Saloon League in their efforts to promote temperance legislation and the mobilization of the forces of righteousness; and we bespeak the sympathetic cooperation of all churches and Bible societies in the saloon fight; and we urge all Christian voters to give their ballots for the suppression of the saloon."

Resolved, That we recognize in the liquor traffic, including the saloon, the hotel bar and the wine room of the social club, one of the most subtle foes that humanity has to meet in its upward progress; that we find the organized saloon, one of the most dangerous and corrupting forces in our political affairs; and we therefore reaffirm our allegiance to the principle of prohibition for the individual and legal prohibition for the state.

Resolved, That we view with horror and shame the revelations of widespread and organized traffic in womanhood known as the "White Slave Traffic," whereby young women are lured into cities and then sold into prostitution within specified limits, thereby giving this crime recognition, standing and respectability in the eyes of the community. We therefore urge all churches and Bible societies to take up this work and to urge all Christian voters to give their ballots for the suppression of the saloon.

Resolved, That in view of the rapid development and strategic importance of this Pacific coast region, and the standing walls in the ruins of the old world history, that we extend to our fellow laborers in this western empire, our hearty and sincere sympathy and our prayerful interest in their work, and pledging them the largest measure of our financial support.
