GUARANTY LAW IN NEBRASKA

Operation Beseet With Restrictions—Opponents Attack It in Court.

Lincoln, Neb., July 1.—All of the state banks of Nebraska today come under the requirements of the new so-called guaranty of deposit law, passed by the last legislature. The law has met with considerable opposition not only from the national banks which are prevented by the federal banking laws from starting in its provisions, but also from a number of state banks. The opponents of the law have taken the matter into the courts with a view to restraining the state banking board from enforcing the measure.

The Nebraska law is a limited guaranty as distinguished from the Oklahoma law, where all the assets of all the state banks are back of the guaranty. Under the law in this state only a small portion is to be utilized. Four semiannual assessments, of one fourth of one per cent each, will be levied by the banking board upon the deposits of the banks, and after the accumulation of this fund it shall be maintained by an assessment every six months of one twentieth of one per cent.

If an emergency arises assessments not exceeding one per cent may be made. If this is insufficient to pay losses depositors in failed banks must wait the accumulation of the money necessary to pay them off, receiving a certificate as evidence of claim.

QUAN KAI OPTIMISTIC ON ORIENTAL TRADE

(United Press Leased Wire.)
Seattle, July 1.—"Not only Seattle, but the whole Pacific coast will reap inestimable profits through the development of oriental trade in the next few years, and I predict that the possession of the Philippines will enable the American merchant marine in time to dominate the Pacific trade," said Quan Kai, a millionaire flour merchant of Hongkong, today.

Besides controlling an immense flour business, Mr. Quan is proprietor of the Pacific Steamship company, the Toyo Kisen Kaisha, the Portland & Asiatic Steamship company, and is agent for the Portland Flouring Mills company.

"There is no doubt that the future extension of the world's trade will be in the Orient. No other country has as great advantages for trade in the Orient as has the United States," continued Mr. Quan. "My country is most favorably disposed to the United States, and is anxious to do business with this country. Annually China imports millions of dollars worth of goods from the United States now, and this trade is increasing all the time."

On his pleasure tour of the Pacific coast and visit to the Alaska-Yukon-Pacific exposition, Quan Kai is accompanied by J. W. Ganson, of Portland, vice president of the Portland Flouring Mills company.

JAPANESE HONOR MEMORY OF PERRY

Yokohama, July 1.—Under auspices of a most favorable character, a two-day celebration was inaugurated here today to mark the fiftieth anniversary of the opening of Yokohama to foreign trade. Popular festivities made up the program for the opening day of the celebration. Tomorrow the celebration will conclude with the unveiling of statues of Commodore M. C. Perry, of the United States navy, and Kanoo-no-Kami, the Japanese prime minister who negotiated the first treaty of commerce between Japan and the outside world. The statue of Commodore Perry has been placed in Yokohama park, close to the American consulate. The statue is of bronze, 17 feet high, and was modeled by B. Fujita, after photographs supplied by the United States government, and from pictures made by Japanese artists while Commodore Perry was in Yokohama. The cost of the memorial, including a magnificent granite pedestal, exceeded \$100,000.
