

CUBA WILL BE SEEN THOUSAND SHOTSIGHTED WARKE IN STEEL MEET OUT OWES BLOCK ANNEXATION

Fifteen Plants Idle—Workmen Determined to End Open Shop Policy.

Baptist Missionary From Island Says People Would Fight Before Living Under Shadow of Stars and Stripes—Want Freedom.

Cubans will fight before they will permit annexation by the United States. They want independence and their best friends want it for them. They are weary of independence and able to govern themselves.

The assertions were made before the Northern Baptist convention last night by Dr. H. R. Mosely, who for 10 years has given his best effort to missionary work in Cuba.

Dr. Mosely left work in Mexico to assume charge of the campaign inaugurated in Cuba by the American Baptist Home Mission society immediately after the war with Spain had come to an end. He was chosen to lead the work because of his knowledge of Spanish and familiarity with work in Catholic countries.

"I know of no more stupendous and wonderful mission achievement of the last century than what Dr. Mosely has done in Cuba," declared Dr. H. R. Mosely, secretary of the American Baptist Home Mission society, "and his influence has been great in placing the people on a basis where they can become organized and get ready for self government."

In the same connection Dr. Mosely asserted that now the political situation has become less involved, that Christianity will complete the civilization of Cuba.

"But there," he said, "to find that the power of Catholicism has been broken by the power of Spain. The people loved everything American, religion and all. At that time we could have taken into our churches a vast number of people, but we have not. We have worked slowly but surely. The people come now, not in such great numbers as at first, but with a better understanding of what they are doing."

Mosely concluded by telling humorous incidents of his life among the Cubans, how on his first arrival he found the children and adults and the whole population gripped by the lives of their parents and how the future of the island, he thinks, will be wonderful.

Notes of warning to the people of America were sounded in the address of Dr. L. C. Barnes before the Baptist convention at the White Temple last night.

"The blood of the people in the United States is changing," he declared. "There is only a small percentage of English blood in the United States. The population, two thirds foreign born. New York is more foreign than England. This condition is a danger to the United States. The situation is critical, inasmuch as the incoming foreigners bring new ideals of living and introduce diverse political government."

In the same way Dr. Barnes told how foreigners are rapidly gaining hold on more western states. He ended with the assertion that foreign missionary work is needed now as never before. The United States, he said, must be taught patriotism in the United States, made acquainted with the customs and the people to incorporate the Christian religion.

Miss Frankling, who was introduced by Dr. C. A. Woody, home missionary secretary for eight western states, he had with him a collection of Chinese ring which Mrs. Trumbull of Arizona had sent to be sold to anyone at the convention who might care to buy.

"She wants the money," said Dr. Woody, with deep feeling, "in order that she may have more means with which to carry on mission work. I want you to give her \$50 and let me take the ring back again. many bottles of milk was left intact. This was hurled through the air, lighting near Timms' body, but no fire.

Everything ground to bits.

The block signal pole nearby was splintered with many splinters. Every one mashed so terrible was the force with which they struck the pole. Another pole across the track was splintered over with milk, and with thousands of bits of glass, not one of them big as a pea.

At the point where the accident occurred there is a clear view of the track for fully a mile to the south. Trains usually travel at considerable speed. There is a heavy grade down which they come half a mile away. This grade is one which the company is seeking to be by its new Willaburg cut-off, as it is known. This morning's train was a heavy freight, with Engineer F. M. Timms at the controls. It was a freight train, and was carrying a load of coal.

Timms and young Helit, who was his new helper, were in the train. Timms was the driver, and Helit was the helper. They were both men of good character, and were well known in the community. Timms was a married man, and had a family. Helit was a single man, and was also a member of the community.

As soon as the accident was reported to the general office of the Southern Railway, the company's general manager, Mr. O'Brien, sent representatives out to investigate the circumstances.

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Former County Judge John H. Scott of Marion Believes State at Large Does Realize Possibilities of Crater Project.

(By Journal Leased Salem Wire.)
Salem, Or., July 1.—Only shortsightedness on the part of some taxpayers in the state of Oregon has made them object to the construction of a wagon and automobile road to Crater lake, according to John H. Scott, former county judge of Marion county and president of the Good Roads association.

Judge Scott is emphatic in his statement that Oregon has been slow to show her unsurpassable wonders to clamoring tourists and says that had California or Washington possessed Crater lake millions of dollars would have been spent before this, in the effort to make it accessible to the tourist trade. He thinks also that another road from north to south should be added to the present plan.

"The construction of this road to Crater lake will be of inestimable value to the state at large," Mr. Scott said. "That improvement, with another thoroughfare from the north to the south connecting with similarly well constructed highways in Washington and California, would bring millions of dollars of tourists to the state. It would also be a great deal of money spent by tourists at hotels and summer resorts, but a great many of the tourists would become interested in the development of our resources and would buy timber and farm lands and would invest in the development of our resources, such as lies in the water power now dormant in this state."

Other states, Judge Scott said, were to have a Crater lake, such as ours, they would without delay have spent millions of dollars in the development of that would soon be returned to them manifold by tourists.

The states of California and Washington are constructing highways from the north to the south and it is incumbent on Oregon to construct a similar road if it wishes to reap the great harvest that would otherwise stop at the state line.

"Such a road would, furthermore, cause large hotels to be built at all the principal towns through which the road would pass and also would cause better accommodations to be made at or close to our sea coast and mountain resorts."

Great State Developer.
"Yes, it certainly would be a great state developer to construct a road running from east to west through the state of Oregon via Crater lake, and consider it a mistake for any taxpayer in the state of Oregon to object to expending \$100,000 in the construction of a public thoroughfare to a point that has the possibilities that Crater lake has."

Further, when the expenditure of the \$100,000 will cause to be built another \$100,000 by the counties of Jackson and Klamath and several hundred of thousands of dollars by the government.
