

AROUND LAND GO BAPTISTS, MENTALLY

Missionaries From Many Countries Lead Delegates to Convention on Interesting Lecture Tour Among Homes of Strange Peoples.

Delegates to the Northern Baptist convention traveled around the world yesterday afternoon and evening, watching in relief before their eyes like a vast panorama. Without stopping even to catch their breath, the delegates, the missionaries of the American Baptist Missionary union, kept up a running interpretation of conditions in the countries visited together with a description of the scenery and people.

Japan, the land of flowers and brown-skinned folks, received much attention. The policy of progression was affirmed, the country named a national workshop. A picture of girls going to school with the boys in China was painted in words by one speaker and he passed rapidly in approach through the difficulties of ancestor worship, the perils of the Boxer rebellion and the heroic missionaries who have lifted the cloak of superstition from the people.

India was shown as a country where there are now more heathens than in the days of William Carey, the first due to the spread of Brahminism and Hinduism. At the same time there are more Christians and stronger churches which the natives are rapidly coming to support.

Baptism is Easy.

Dr. David Downie, a veteran missionary who has given the best of his life to work in South India, declared that no rule could be kinder or more acceptable than that of Great Britain among the people of India. They will give self-government as soon as they are able to maintain it, he declared.

Dr. T. S. Barbour, foreign secretary of the missionary union, said that the attention of the audience for more than an hour as he described with picturesque phrasing his own visit to China and Japan and the Philippines, where already the education, religion and enterprise of the United States is producing a revolution in the lives of the people.

Professor S. W. Woodward of the union president over last evening's session, Home Secretary Fred P. Haggard, D. D., introduced the most striking feature of the session when he rather on the platform a score or more of the younger missionaries who have come into all quarters of a globe for the sake of spreading the Christian faith. Each one of these was encouraged to tell in a word why he or she had given up home and friends and comfort in the states and gone among savage people, there to endure the perils of death, from diseases or from the people themselves.

Varied Accounts Told.

These accounts were as varied as were the personalities, yet the purpose was the same, expressed in one word—service. All of these missionaries were in the fields of work after a general conference which is to be held in Boston, September 3-10. On September 10, those going to India and Japan will sail. Those going to China, Japan and the Philippines will sail a little later from the Pacific coast.

W. E. Rodgers goes to Congo-Free State, South Africa, at his own charges, and Roy D. Stafford is to be business agent for the union in Shanghai, China. At the afternoon session Dr. T. S. Barbour introduced Rev. Fred P. Haggard, D. D., who is one of those missionaries who have come into close relations with government officials, making it thus possible to advance the mission work very rapidly. Mr. Haggard's parents and grandparents and several brothers and sisters have been missionaries of the union. Mr. Haggard told how considerably more than 1100,000 have been raised by the natives of Burma for the carrying on of their own work. There are 472 Baptist churches in Burma and of these 72 are self-supporting. With this number Mr. Haggard asserted there was only one missionary to each 100,000 of people, and he made a strong appeal for men and money.

Young's Story Remarkable.

Rev. W. M. Young, who comes from Thibet, known as the "world's roof," gave a remarkable description of his work. Two years after he arrived in his first convert was baptized. Soon people came in hundreds asking that cards, written on their arms, be made as a sign of religious faith, be cut from their arms, and this Mr. Young did with his jack-knife, the act being evidence of their freedom from superstitious rites and beliefs. Several thousand have now been led to accept the Christian religion and the wilder tribes from the mountain fastnesses are bleeding with the missionaries for some one to be set among them. Then came descriptions of the way opium sales have been decreased, schools started and the people made almost civilized through missionary endeavor.

These transformations were believed to be in the mind of Mr. Young's last night when he closed his remarkable address by declaring: "The world is a growing land, a land bounded on the east by America, a little beneath the shifting waters is the land. Nations are coming through the air, steel vessels on the sea, and steam and electric transportation on the land. The world will be one, with one great purpose, one great common cause of sympathy, one reason for progress and this, the religion of Christ."

Women Have Hearing.

Before the afternoon session had been closed the Woman's Baptist Foreign Missionary society was given a hearing. The service emphasized the great place women are taking in foreign as well as home missionary work. Many of the women missionaries confine their efforts to work among the women of the countries in which they go. In all heathen countries women are considered as being little better than an animal. Christ has given them the bringing the native women to the proper place of respect and admiration. Yesterday's was the ninety-fifth annual meeting of the American Baptist Missionary union. It was considered one of the most encouraging evidences of growth ever presented by its workers. The missionaries in attendance are:

GREAT THINGS SPRING FROM CONVENTION

Portland Meeting of Northern Baptists Marks Revolution in Work of Church and Opens Way for Vast Future Progress.

"The importance of the Portland meeting of the Northern Baptist convention has been realized for many years," said H. T. Musselman, educational secretary of the American Baptist Publication society this morning. "We have accomplished," continued Mr. Musselman, "the organization of a Baptist democracy. The genius of the Baptist church is seen in the history of Baptist organization."

"For years the Baptists of the south and of Canada have been organized into a great convention. The action taken in Portland brings 1,250,000 northern Baptists into line with other sections."

"Indeed it is well said that the Northern Baptist convention is the most democratic organization among all the religious people on earth. There is no longer a financial basis for the organization. Each and every branch has the privilege of representation in the convention."

Work is Revolutionized.

"The organization of the Northern Baptist convention does not mean a theological reconstruction but does revolutionize the method of work among Baptists. The Portland convention has made wonderful progress in setting the denomination ready for the great tasks of the future. There have been four great and significant things accomplished by the meeting here."

"First there was the settlement of probable legal relations between the great missionary societies. Judge Clinch's report as adopted retains the autonomy of the American Baptist Publication society, the American Baptist Home Mission society, and the American Baptist Missionary union, and Dr. R. G. Seabour, of the Baptist Publication society. This tour, which is to begin with the conclusion of the Northern Baptist convention, will include an itinerary, visits to Eugene, Medford, Salem, San Francisco, Twin Falls, Tacoma, Oakland and Los Angeles. Reports of the conditions will be submitted to the societies named and action be taken."
