

EVANS' PARTNER ABSENT

Will E. Purdy Said to Be Visiting at Seattle—Detectives Continue Search for Portland Man Mysteriously Missing.

Another peculiar phase developed in the Evans disappearance case this morning when a Journal reporter endeavored to obtain interviews with H. D. Winters and Will E. Purdy, associated with Martin B. Evans in the Purdy Investment company, or which Evans was secretary. The reporter first visited the firm's offices in the Madison building, on Third street, where he was informed by a young woman stenographer, the only occupant of the office, that Purdy had been absent from Portland two days; that she understood he was in Seattle. The reporter then visited the rooming house at 52 1/2 Grand avenue, where H. D. Winters lives. Winters refused to open the door to his room, saying he was ill and did not wish to see any visitors.

(Special Dispatch to The Journal.) Tacoma, Wash., July 2.—What looked like an important clue in the mystery of the disappearance here of Martin B. Evans, Portland real estate man, has developed into nothing more than a case of mistaken identity and the detectives who are searching for the missing man are again discouraged and hopelessly at sea.

When it was reported that a man closely resembling the picture of Evans shown here had been seen in the lobby of the Donnelly hotel a week ago yesterday, the day after Evans disappeared, and that he had been engaged in conversation with a man who wished to interest him in the chance of buying a hotel, the fact that the man who looked like a promising trail was uncovered, and all efforts were directed to following it up yesterday afternoon, however, while showing that a man closely resembling Evans had been seen in South Tacoma, proved indisputably that the man was not Evans, though so much like him in features as to be termed by all who have seen the stranger and the picture of Evans as his double.

Double Smokes and Drinks. Evans double both smokes and drinks, while Evans does neither. His clothing does not tally with that worn by Evans when he disappeared and in addition to that it has been established that the double is a man who came to Tacoma recently from San Francisco for the purpose of buying a moving picture show in South Tacoma.

Detective F. E. D. Hughes of Tacoma, who is leading the search for Evans, says that while he has no definite clue at present he will not give up the search until the mystery is cleared up. "I have covered thoroughly every possible chance of information in Tacoma," said Mr. Hughes this morning, "and have about reached the conclusion that Evans is nowhere near here and will direct my attention to other northwestern cities and towns."

"I have known the missing man well for a number of years, and have such a high regard not only for his thorough integrity, but for his sanity and good sense, that I can accept no explanation or theory of his disappearance as plausible but that he has met with some serious accident or has been murdered, or is being held somewhere a prisoner."

Accident Theory Barred. "The accident theory is almost completely barred by the fact that we know from the postal received by his wife that Evans was here Wednesday evening of last week, and yet the accident at any of the hotels and I did not hear from him. Certainly if he had met with accident that night before he reached a hotel, we should have heard of it through the police, the coroner or the hospitals, all of which have been covered."

The failure of the South Tacoma clue knocks away the belief that he was seen in the lobby of the Donnelly hotel Thursday morning. So that takes us back again to Wednesday night. "I am compelled to believe that Evans was intercepted after leaving the restaurant that night and before he was able to reach the Donnelly, where he always stopped while in Tacoma, and was lured or taken by force somewhere to be held a prisoner or done away with."

Newcomer in Portland. Evans was a newcomer in Portland and on the coast as well. He came to the coast first on a visit last fall and after visiting friends in Seattle and Tacoma went to Portland, where he finally decided to locate. In February of this year, after coming interested in the Purdy Investment company, a real estate firm, he journeyed back to his old home in New Hampshire, sold his property there and with his wife returned to Portland to take up his residence about April 1.

Evans is said to have discovered certain damaging facts in regard to a man with whom he had business dealings during his short stay in Portland. These facts are said to include proof that the name of a prominent Portland citizen had been forged to a document. Evans, asserted to be man of the strictest business integrity, is said to have laid the proof of the forgery before him and to have refused to give it up upon demand, whereupon the suspected man is alleged to have said:

"If you ever let this out, I'll knife you."

Goes to Consult Friend. Evans, greatly distressed at the knowledge of another guilt—man in whom he had reposed confidence—and doubtful as to what to do under the circumstances, wrote several letters to F. E. D. Hughes, a private detective of Tacoma, and after having had a long consultation with him, Portland business friend, came to Tacoma, carrying on his person the evidence against the man he suspected of treachery and fraud, to lay the case before Hughes.

His wife was told where he was going and accompanied him to the train Wednesday. Thursday she received the postal, which was the last heard from Evans, saying that he would be home Friday or Saturday. Friday she called up the Hughes home in Tacoma, and asked to speak to her husband, when the fact of his disappearance became known.

Evans is described as a man about 50 years of age, of medium height, slightly stooped, heavy moustache, light gray hair, gray hair, light gray eyes. When he left home he was dressed in a black suit and a black hat.

FOUR CONDEMNED MEN TO APPEAL

Three Days Granted for Hearings by Supreme Court—Other Cases.

(Special Dispatch to The Journal.) Salem, Or., July 2.—During the three days, including July 20, 21 and 22, the supreme court will hear the appeals of four men convicted in the lower courts of murder in the first degree and under sentence of death. Of these the Finch case is the one around which the most interest centers. It will be the first to be heard.

Tuesday, at 10 o'clock, July 20, the Finch case will be heard; Wednesday at 10 o'clock, July 21, state vs. Jancig, who killed his sweetheart at Oregon City last winter; at 2 o'clock July 21, state vs. Daly, a Multnomah county case; on Thursday, July 22, state vs. Hembree, the famous Tillamook county case will be heard. Hembree was tried twice, the first time a verdict of manslaughter was rendered against him for the death of his wife, and the second time murder in the first degree for the killing of his daughter.

The case against J. Thorburn Ross has also been set to be heard this month. That case is set down for 10 o'clock Thursday, July 29.

Other cases have been set as follows: Tuesday, July 27, 10 o'clock, state vs. Miller; 2 o'clock, state vs. Turpin. Wednesday, July 28, state vs. Cochran; 2 o'clock, state vs. Ward. Tuesday, August 3, 10 o'clock, state vs. Walsworth; 2 o'clock, state vs. Ward H. Martin.

This docket provides for all the principal criminal cases tried in Oregon during the past 15 months.

ROSEBURG WANTS BETTER SERVICE

(Special Dispatch to The Journal.) Roseburg, Or., July 2.—Since it has been announced that the Cottage Grove local is to be made an afternoon train, Roseburg business men want it to be made a continuance of the Ashland local, which arrives in Roseburg at 1:10 p. m. and ties up, and run this train right on through to Portland. This would fill a gap between this city and Cottage Grove besides giving Roseburg an afternoon service north. If this train left Ashland about an hour later than at present, and picked up a chair car here for Portland, it would supply much needed service all along the line. Since the railroad company declares it to be impracticable to handle any local business on the afternoon northbound train, this suggestion to combine the Ashland and Cottage Grove locals into one through train to Portland seems a very practical solution to the whole question.

The northbound overland train No. 16 does not pick up mail at Roseburg at present, another fault which Roseburg men in the chamber of commerce next Sunday, July 4, of Portland express No. 14, which will cause it to arrive in Portland two hours later than at present, or at 11:55. A letter can be mailed here any time up to midnight and it will arrive in Portland the next morning in time for goods to be shipped that day, but the change in the schedule will cause the mail to arrive in Portland a day later, and it will be impossible to ship goods until the next day, therefore bringing upon them a great loss.
