

SUFFRAGISTS DIVIDE ON SALOON

Advocates of Fight on Liquor Interest Say Saloon Power Greatest Obstacle to Suffrage—Opponents Doubt Policy of Warfare.

Seattle, July 3.—The vital issue before the National American Woman Suffrage Association in convention in Seattle today, and the question which promises to precipitate the most interesting contest of the meeting, is whether or not a fight is to be made against the liquor traffic.

Resolutions placing woman suffrage associations all over the country in an open fight against the liquor interests are being considered by the resolutions committee, which held a preliminary conference this morning. A report to the convention will be made Tuesday afternoon and before that report is made, strong pressure from both sides will be brought to bear on the members of the committee.

Rev. Anna Howard Shaw, national president, who is leading the fight against the liquor interests, in her annual address said the liquor dealers were the bitterest foes of suffragists. She said they openly opposed the women and the only way to succeed was to go out and make an open fight against the liquor traffic.

National Auditor Laura Clay, discussing the resolution, said today that in her opinion there was but one way to secure the franchise for women and that was to fight in the same manner they were being fought.

The one class unalterably and irrevocably opposed to the enfranchisement of women in the organized liquor traffic," she said.

Prominent officials of the national W. C. T. U., among whom is Mrs. Cornelia Jewett, editor of the Union Signal, are here as delegates and will aid in securing the adoption of the resolution against the liquor interests.

There will, however, be strong opposition to the adoption of the prohibition resolution, headed by Mrs. Abigail Scott Duniway, president of the Oregon association, who opposed the movement will do all they can to keep it down. Mrs. Duniway is of the opinion that the endorsement of prohibition would prove detrimental to the cause of suffrage.

If the prohibition issue reaches the floor of the convention it is believed it will be the occasion for a stirring fight, with the chances of its success or failure about equally divided.

GLORIES IN HIS ATROCIOUS DEED

Cunningham a Monomaniac on Subject of Injustice to Himself.

San Francisco, July 3.—Remorse has not yet fallen upon James Edward Cunningham, slayer of Caroline Brach, and today he reiterated his declaration that he was glad he killed the girl during their dispute over a few cents' difference in a time check.

The police say there can be no doubt that Cunningham, who says he was once an inmate of an asylum at Phoenix, Ariz., is insane on some subjects; but a formal charge of murder will be preferred against him at the coroner's inquest Monday.

Chief of Police Cook said today that he would not attempt to determine the question of the prisoner's sanity, as he thought that was a matter on which the court should pass.

Neither said a word to the effect that he murdered the girl was substantiated today, when the bullet taken from his victim's head was found to be the same size and style as those found in his pockets at the time he gave himself up.

Early today two brothers of the murdered girl called at police headquarters and asked to be allowed to see their sister's body. Cunningham, unaware of the identity of the visitors, was led from his cell and the brothers were allowed to gaze at him.

Neither said a word, but both breathed deeply and appeared to be having a hard fight within themselves to keep from weeping sympathetically upon the confessed murderer.

The coolness with which Cunningham discusses his crime is amazing. He appears insane upon the subject and declares again and again that he is perfectly content, now that he has killed the innocent girl whom he blames for his difficulty in collecting money due him from the Gray Brothers contracting firm, for which Miss Brach was bookkeeper.

"No, I am not sorry I killed her," he said for the hundredth time today. "It was her fault. I didn't get the money, and without money I could not live. If I had not killed her she would have hypnotized me. She tried it while I was in the office."

Phoenix, Ariz., July 3.—Officials of the state asylum for the insane said today that no record of James Edward Cunningham as an inmate of the institution could be found. Frank Cunningham, inmate over religion, was committed from Yuma county, March 20, 1896, and escaped April 12, 1904. He was then 29 years of age. By occupation he was a day laborer.

The investigation was made in response to an inquiry from San Francisco, where James E. Cunningham has confessed that he killed a young woman who, he claimed, was trying to hypnotize him.

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INCOME TAX AS AN AMENDMENT

Senate Will Vote Monday on Question of Submitting to the States.

Washington, July 3.—It was decided in the senate today to vote next Monday on the question of submitting to the states a constitutional amendment authorizing congress to collect taxes on incomes.

Resolutions on this subject, introduced by Aldrich and Brown, of Nebraska, are pending.

When Aldrich today called up the maximum and minimum features of the tariff bill he said he considered it the most important of the bill.

After several senators had voiced their desire to omit tea and coffee from the section Aldrich announced that he accepted the suggestion and it was acted upon favorably.

The Aldrich maximum and minimum section of the tariff bill was adopted by the senate this afternoon by a vote of 34 to 14.

THIEVES GET \$15 IN
ASTORIA OIL OFFICE

MONUMENT TO G. A. R.
FOUNDER UNVEILED

Duncel resides at 492 East Twenty-eighth street. Grace May is the daughter of his ex-wife by a former marriage. Bail was fixed at \$500 by Judge Brown. Deputy Sheriff Bulger made the arrest.

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DYNAMITE IS HID UNDER LUMBER

Small Boys' Preparation for Fourth of July Celebration Is Fortunately Discovered Before Any Damage Is Done.

Two sticks of dynamite, with caps and fuses, were found under a pile of lumber in the lot at the corner of East Eleventh street and Killingsworth avenue. A. L. Barber, a contractor, who is constructing a house on the property for Michael O'Brien, discovered the dynamite early this morning, when moving the lumber. Mr. O'Brien believes that the dynamite was hidden underneath the lumber by boys, who in anticipation of the Fourth of July, had stolen it from a nearby quarry.

It is said that there was sufficient dynamite in the two sticks found to have done immense damage in the neighborhood.

ALEXANDRA WINS: SPIRIT BECALMED

Seattle, July 3.—After leading all the way to within half a mile of the finish of the 12 mile course, Spirit II, the Seattle entry in the international yacht race for the Alexandra cup, became becalmed and was forced to lie motionless while the Alexandra, the Canadian entry, crossed the line a winner.

When becalmed, the Spirit was nearly half a mile in the lead. Meanwhile the Alexandra, in a more favorable wind current, was able to keep her sails fairly well filled and crossed the line at 1:30 o'clock, winner of the first heat of the race for the trophy.

LUMBERMEN'S DAY AT SEATTLE FAIR

Seattle, July 3.—Today is Lumbermen's day at the Alaska-Yukon-Pacific exposition and thousands of lumbermen were present to celebrate the event. Nearly every logging camp on Puget sound closed down yesterday to permit the employees to visit the fair today and the attendance is a record breaker.

Among the special events of interest to the lumbermen was the shingle weaving contest for which there were 21 entries. Other contests consist of a log bucking and log rolling contests.

Today was also railroad men's day and from early this morning the grounds were thronged with the railroaders and their families. The most extensive program yet arranged for any special day is being carried out by the railroad employees.
