Contractor for New Jail Finds \$6000 Mistake in His Estimate.

James D. Steele, the contractor to whom was awarded the construction of the new east side police station, has informed members of Mayor Simon's executive board that he cannot fulfill the contract and that he would rather lose the amount of his certified check than attempt to do so. The contractor declares that he made a mistake of \$6000 in his bid.

Work on the badly needed station must be delayed for some time if the contractor refuses to go ahead with it, as the executive board will have to readjust for the time being. It is not thought possible that the board will give the contractor the extra \$6000 he asks for.

F and H will, upon their arrival at Portland, entrain upon train No. 17, which will leave the union depot at 4:15 p. m., July 24. The Fourth regiment will be in camp from July 25 to 30 inclusive, and during that period will be inspected by the regular army inspectors designated for that purpose by the commanding officer of the department of the Columbia.
