QUICK WORK FOR TRADE IS VITAL

Northern Pacific Railroad Will Handle Business Here if Local Dealers Will Prepare for It—Cheapest Account of Down Grade.

Portland gets this year first chance to handle 35,000,000 bushels of Washington, Oregon and Idaho wheat. Frank H. Fogarty, assistant general freight agent of the Northern Pacific, stated this morning that, abandoning the mountain route from the Palouse country to Seattle and Tacoma, all the grain shipments of the Hill lines will come via Portland. Mr. Fogarty added significantly:

"Portland dealers can handle the wheat of the Palouse country if they get ready for it." Local wheat dealers infer from this statement that the Northern Pacific would rather bring wheat to Portland and ship from here, than to carry it on to Tacoma or Seattle free of charge. The rate from any interior point tapped by the Hill lines is the same to Portland and Seattle or Tacoma.

Helpless as to Rates.
"We are helpless in the matter of rates," said Mr. Fogarty during a conversation. "We are compelled to treat all coast cities alike. We cannot give Portland one rate and Seattle another. If we did there would be trouble right away."

"More wheat will come from the Palouse country this year than ever before. It will be of better quality and I believe there will be a great demand for American wheat in foreign ports."

Dangerous Competition.
D. A. Patullo of Balfour, Guthrie & Co. believes that 35,000,000 bushels of wheat may go by Portland to Seattle and Tacoma. ROCKEFELLER SCANDAL IS SEVENTY TODAY

Mrs. Sutton Determined to Have Hazing of Her Son Rodondo and Death of Her Son James Thoroughly Investigated.

Washington, July 8.—Before leaving for West Point to attend a further investigation of the hazing of her cadet son, Rodondo, Mrs. James N. Sutton intimated that she knew who shot her other son, Lieutenant James N. Sutton at Annapolis, October 13, 1907. She even went so far as to suggest that companions of young Sutton of that night, three lieutenants of the marine corps, were ordered to foreign stations following that tragedy, thus separating them and preventing the further development of facts in connection with the death of her son.

The story of 12 months of patient search for evidence prosecuted by this bereaved mother to clear her son's name from the blot of alleged suicide, her intelligence in analyzing testimony, her patience during these trying months, her guarded statements now revealing nothing which would weaken the case which she purposes to establish in a new investigation, her tactful hints, which have compelled a new inquiry, and her enlistment of powerful officials in her cause, will have as a result, doubtless, a probing which will engage the attention of the entire country and, if her allegations are confirmed, will convulse the marine corps as it has seldom been stirred before.

Claims Jealousy as Motive.
Lieutenant James N. Sutton had come to the close of his three year course at the naval academy at Annapolis, but at the commencement examinations he failed in languages. His superior officers there urged him to try again another year, showing him that he would have no difficulty in meeting all requirements. His parents joined with them. But he conceived the plan of entering the marine corps, whence, as he had discovered, could be found an avenue for entrance into the engineer corps of the navy. He had been deeply chagrined at being "flunked" and his pride made it hard for him to return to the naval academy another year while his fellow "middles" were out on service, beginning their careers as naval officers.

Story of the Tragedy.
On the night of October 13, 1907, Lieutenant Sutton was at a dance at Annapolis where, with three other marine lieutenants, he entered an automobile to return to the barracks. The driver, at his death found officially that death was caused by suicide, after he had got into a fight with these lieutenants and, perhaps, with one of them, P. Roelker and R. E. Adams. It was his best work.

HOW BATTLE WAS WON OVER TAX EARNINGS

Washington, July 8.—The great battle over the income tax and corporation net earnings tax was won by advocates of the latter on the contention that the supreme court having declared the income tax (in its 1894 decision) unconstitutional, it would be a slap in the face of the court to adopt another such law and ask the court again to pass on it.

Yet in times past, often from the beginning of the court's existence, the court has been asked to pass on these fundamental principles involved and never before has the court intimated or anyone thought it slap in the court's face. The court, as shown by Senator Borah in his able speech, has cheerfully continued the law and the constitution many times with reference to the imposition of an income tax. Lawyers have massed into the courtroom, presented their views and heard the justice's opinions and, up to this moment, none has charged the lawyers with insulting the court.

The Viewpoint.
This view optimizes one phase of the contention of the proponents of the income tax in the present congress, and perhaps not even that, can prevail. FIEND SLAYS TRUSTING WOMAN

Robbery Motive for Awful Crime Near Wilkeson, Wash.—Hurries to Lonely Spot Thinking Her Brother Had Accident.

Wilkeson, Wash., July 8.—Lured to a lonely spot on the railroad track, about a mile and a half northwest of this town, by the false tale that her brother had been killed in a mine accident at Black Diamond, Mrs. Louis Bronzo, 42 years old, was brutally murdered; her skull was crushed with a stone some time between midnight and 4 o'clock this morning. The motive for the murder and the identity of the assassin remain a mystery.

A stranger came to the Bronzo home last night with the story of the fatal accident in the Black Diamond mines, telling Mrs. Bronzo that he was on his way there and that she might accompany him. Hastily leaving word of where she had gone with a neighbor for her husband, Mrs. Bronzo started down the railroad track with the stranger. None of the neighbors saw the man distinctly, and can give no description of him.

Examination of the body showed that the woman had been dead several hours. The murder was probably committed about 12:30.

Bronzo, frantic with grief, hurried back to town and notified the citizens. Deputy Sheriff Charles Hunt at once organized a posse and went to the scene of the crime to take up the chase of the murderer.

The body was left lying beside the track to await the arrival of Coroner Shaver from Tacoma. The sheriff's office in Tacoma has been notified, and efforts will be made to get the body on the trail at once, as there is slender chance of capturing the man by any other method on account of lack of means of identification.

QUAKES ROCK SOUTHERN ASIA
Indian Peninsula Jarred From Sea to Sea—Continent Shares Shocks.

Paris, July 8.—Brief dispatches received here indicate that a terrific earthquake rocked the entire Indian peninsula and all the southern portion of the Asiatic continent early today. The first shock was felt about 3 o'clock this morning in the vicinity of Rawalpindi and extended into the British provinces, Kashmir and Punjab.

Cleveland, July 8.—Vibrations recorded by the seismograph at the observatory of St. Ignace college, announced today by Father Odenbach, the astronomer in charge, are thought to be indicative of a severe earthquake yesterday.

Father Odenbach stated that a severe shock was recorded at 2:55 o'clock yesterday afternoon. The waves continued at intervals, reaching their greatest force at 3:21. The final vibrations were noted at 4:40. He gave as his opinion that the shocks were actually several of the northern frontier provinces, Kashmir and Punjab.

FIRE LEAVES UNION COUPLE CHILDLESS
Suzanerville, Ore., July 8.—Deaths last night claimed two more children of Mr. and Mrs. Bert Oliver of this city, making the third death since lightning struck their home Sunday night. The two children, a boy and a girl, were in the room which was destroyed by the fire. The boy, about 18 months old, and the girl, about 10 months old, were both killed.

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The parents sustained severe losses, but it is believed they will survive.
