

ASSAM PEOPLE BRING OWN ROCK

East Side Business Men Hint Paving Trust Holds Up Improvement.

After losing nearly a month through its inability to get crushed rock from other quarries, the Oregon Hissam Paving company yesterday shipped down its first barge load of rock from its own quarry on the Columbia river and will start work tomorrow on Grand avenue. It has been four weeks since a bit of work has been done on the street. Hints as to a combine among the paving interests to keep the Hissam people from completing their contract with the city have been passed around quite prominently by members of the East Side Business Men's club, and by members of the Oregon Hissam Paving company. While crushed rock was delivered in a number of instances to other paving companies, none would be delivered to Grand avenue. As a result the work of the east side during the Rose Festival was considerably held up while the residents and business men along Grand avenue have been suffering from the delay for the past three weeks.

The management of the company, however, yesterday promised C. A. Bigelow, president of the East Side Business Men's club, that work on the thoroughfare would be started at once, if possible, and at least as soon as the weather settled. Rock will be delivered today from the first barge, which arrived yesterday. The quarry of the company was only recently opened, and this load of rock is the first to come out of it.

BRISTOL DEVELOPMENT CLUB MEETS SATURDAY

(Special Dispatch to The Journal.) Bristol, Wash., July 8.—The regular monthly meeting of the Bristol Development club will be held Saturday night, promises to be an interesting one. Recommendations covering a number of county roads will be considered and some action taken to secure a state road along the Columbia river connecting Underwood, Cook's addition, Bingen, White Salmon and Lytle, where it is said a grade of not more than 7 per cent can be obtained. The club's delegates to the Central Road Improvement club, composed of delegates from the Bristol club, Bingen Commercial club and Cook's Addition Improvement club, which directs the work of the supervisor of road district No. 11, will report as to the recommendation on the road and bridge fund tax levy for this year at the Central club's meeting Saturday afternoon. The Bristol club recently instructed its delegates to work for a 1 mill levy recommendation. The matter of a petition for a daily mail service by consolidating the present Bristol and Snowden routes will also be brought up.

SOLOMON LIPMAN PASSES FROM LONG ACTIVE LIFE

Beginning life as a penniless lad in Germany, entering upon a business career on the Pacific coast 53 years ago, becoming a past master in the art of merchandising and closing a brilliant career in Portland, chosen as the home of his declining years, he, in brief, the story of the career of Solomon Lipman, who passed to the great beyond last night.

At the good old age of 80 years, surrounded by family and friends, counting among his acquaintances many of the great merchants of the world, Mr. Lipman could lie down in the last sleep with a consciousness of having spent every year of his life well, of having done a service to his day and generation.

Born in Hohewallern Hechingen, Germany, in 1829, of lowly parentage, Mr. Lipman early in life, lured for the broader opportunities in America, at the age of 19 years he came to Port-

land, and after a brief sojourn there came to Sacramento, Cal., making the journey by the way of Panama.

In the rich California valley Mr. Lipman conceived the idea of a great merchandising house, and at Sacramento he established the parent business 53 years ago. Since that time he had been content and untiring in his efforts to excel as a merchant in his application to the details of his business, in his progressive plans for the creation of greater opportunities for merchandising.

Came Here Five Years Ago.

For 30 years Mr. Lipman had been heavily interested in Portland. Five years ago he removed to the city, built a beautiful home and determined to spend the declining years of a well-rounded life here. He had been a well-known character for a score of years, although having never been active in a public way. He has resided at Wayne

and St. Clair streets, where the body now rests.

Solomon Lipman was truly a domestic man. No greater tribute can be placed on his life than that he was a typical old school merchant, sturdy, upright in his efforts to progress ahead of the community and of his competitors, yet withal a home-loving and home-living man. Studious and things connected with the good of the town and the community, Mr. Lipman took no active part in the public affairs, never held public office and never joined a secret society.

In 1888 Mr. Lipman and Miss Dana Frank were married in San Francisco. Mrs. Lipman survives her husband, the family consisting of a daughter and two sons, death having never entered the family circle in the last night. Mrs. Rose Heller lives in New York, Will F. and L. N. Lipman reside in Portland.

Mr. Lipman, always loyal to every business interest, was loved by the men and women who assisted him in his enterprises. At Christmas time, when misfortune overtook any of those in his employ, Mr. Lipman, in his quiet way, responded with a generosity that few knew about and his quiet open and honest nature endeared him to everyone who learned his true nature.

Began in 1859.

The firm of S. Lipman & Co. was established at Sacramento, Cal., in 1859. A few years later Mr. Lipman purchased an interest in the firm of Goddard, Broderick and Thompson, one of the large importing concerns of the country. Mr. Lipman was considered an unusually strong buyer and to this element in his character is largely due his success in connecting himself with large concerns. In 1865, during the gold excitement at Virginia City, Nev., the firm established a store at that place and Adolph Wolfe was brought from Germany to manage it. Since that time Mr. Wolfe has been a close business associate with Mr. Lipman.

In 1889 the incorporation of the concern as Lipman, Wolfe & Co. took place.

In 1893 a store was opened at Napa, Cal., and in 1897 the first store was opened in Portland. While the branch at Virginia City was discontinued the store in Portland grew with wonderful rapidity, expanding each year until it became one of the most extensive concerns on the Pacific coast.

Associated With Crocker.

In early days in California Mr. Lipman was closely associated with Charles Crocker, afterwards the Union Pacific railroad magnate, with Mark Hopkins and Collis P. Huntington, of the Southern Pacific. All of these men were of small means at the time Mr. Lipman alone turned to merchandising, in the face of the great natural development of the country which was certain to follow the influx of people from the eastern states.

Mr. and Mrs. Lipman celebrated their golden wedding anniversary last night. In order to accommodate the large number of friends the festivities were held at the Hotel Portland. Thousands of Portland people will recall with pleasure the events of the day.

Mr. Lipman traveled abroad largely, and for many years maintained an office in Paris as well as in New York, conducting the buying for his store on the broadest lines. Since the failure of his health a few months ago Mr. Lipman had retired to his home, but until that time he was active and at his task daily.

Funeral services will be held at the home, Wayne and St. Clair streets, tomorrow afternoon at 1:30. Dr. Jacob Bloch officiating.

HATCHERIES ARE DOING GOOD WORK

McAllister Reports Great Number of Salmon Eggs Taken at All Places.

That the take of salmon eggs at the various hatcheries in this state will all probably exceed that of any former year is asserted by Master Fish Warden H. C. McAllister in his report for June to the state board of fish commissioners. While the salmon catch on the Columbia river for the month of June was unusually light, due, says the fish warden, to excessive high water, the river is full of fish, which is evidenced by the large numbers showing up at the different hatcheries on streams tributary to the Columbia.

As the McKenna river hatchery more salmon are in sight than ever before.

which indicates an immense take of eggs before the season is over.

At the new hatchery, near Jefferson, on the Santiam river, the same condition is reported by the superintendent of the hatchery.

Warden McAllister says in his report that he found the fishermen, canners and packers of the lower Columbia practically all in favor of the 24 hour Sunday close season, which is now being enforced to the letter.

"The season on the Willamette closed June 15, after one of the most successful years in the history of the industry," says the report. "This was made possible by the closing of the Columbia until May 1, while the Willamette opened on April 15, thus giving the early run of salmon an opportunity to reach the mouth of the river."

An immediate survey of the lower Columbia for the purpose of establishing the boundary line between Oregon and Washington is recommended. This is necessary in order to determine in which state many of the fish traps in the lower river are located.

Plans have been drawn for a central hatchery to be located on Tanner creek near Bonneville and contractors have been asked to submit bids for its erection.

LUMBERMEN SEE DANGEROUS RIVAL

Use of Pulp in Box Making Is Subject of Energetic Campaign.

(United Press Leased Wire.) Spokane, July 8.—The Spokane Lumbermen's club today started a campaign against the use of pulp paper or fiber boxes and packages. It is estimated that fully 80 per cent of the lumber manufactured in the United States is used by the box factories, and the substitution of pulp has made serious inroads. Resolutions will be sent to every manufacturer in the United States, and to all lumber organizations. It is asserted that lumber for boxes will be sold at the same price as pulp paper or fiber.
