First Meeting Held.—The first meeting in the Cotton Tabernacle, East Eleventh and Morrison streets, was held last evening. Evangelist Will F. He showed that there is no prediction of peace before the second advent of Christ. Instead of that, and nations are much on the increase. He quoted figures showing the war debt of Great Britain is now \$1,500,000,000. A choir of 30 voices led by Professor G. E. Johnson rendered excellent music. Grocers in Bankruptcy.—Judge Wolverson of the federal court this morning granted the voluntary petition in bankruptcy of E. L. Melton and W. A. Fenstermacher, individually and as partners in the name of P. Cash Grocery and M. F. D. company. The liabilities of the firm are \$7132 and the assets \$225. \$200 of the stock is claimed as exempt. Fenstermacher's individual liabilities are \$2750, and Melton is indebted to the amount of \$2775.
