NEWS FORECAST
OF COMING WEEK

Washington, July 10.—A quiet week in prospect for official Washington. The final debate on Congress over the tariff measures promising the only relief from the dullness that envelops the capital in midsummer.

President Taft, having returned from his trip to the Champlain country, is expected to remain in Washington until the end of the week. On Thursday he will attend the laying of the corner stone of the new \$40,000 temple of the Elks' lodge in this city, and probably will deliver an address. The church will be the first in Washington to unite scientific medicine and spiritual therapy.

The drawing will begin Thursday for the Idaho lands soon to be opened by the government in the Flathead reservation, Montana; the Oquirrh lands, Idaho, and the Spokane in Washington. The throwing open for settlement of these immense tracts, more than 750,000 acres of desirable farming land, has created much interest throughout the entire country, and many parties have been organized to go to the southwest during the registration days and try their luck in the great lottery. The fact that this is the last year opening the country will ever see has added interest to the event.

Interest in the automobile world will center in the Golden tour—the annual road classic of American motorists. The tour is to start Monday from Detroit and the entries assure a notable contest. The trip will be made over a circuitous route of 2,421 miles, extending as far westward as Denver and returning to Kansas City, which will be the finishing point.

The largest convention of the week will be in Los Angeles, where the annual convention and show of the International and Protective Order of Elks will assemble Monday for a session of six days. Thousands of members of the order will be in attendance from every part of the country and great preparations have been made in Los Angeles for their entertainment.

The week at the Alaska-Yukon-Pacific exposition in Seattle will be made notable by a great convention representing the lumber trade of the entire country and the annual meeting of the National Council of Women of the United States.

In Buffalo the thirteenth annual convention of the Jewish Chamber of Commerce will assemble Monday for a week's session. Prominent Jews from all parts of the United States are expected to attend the convention, which, it is predicted, will be the largest in the history of the society.

Pasco, Wash., July 10.—Suit has been instituted by M. M. Taylor of Connell against County Treasurer W. D. Schutt to force the county official to deal with county warrants according to the state law. Taylor, who is president of the First National bank of Connell, contends that Treasurer Schutt is juggling with the county warrants inasmuch as the warrants are not paid in regular form, leaving him as a result with \$25,000 worth of county paper on hand.

Investigation has developed that several road and school districts of the county have overdrawn their funds, a heretofore unheard of incident. Instead of registering the warrant unpaid for reason of no funds, it is contended that the official drew from other funds.

CHINESE SMUGGLING
GAME INVESTIGATED

(United Press Licensed Wire.)

San Francisco, July 10.—That the Chinese underground railways are making vehicles of illegal entry of the Standard Oil company's vessels that visit this port, is alleged to be the startling fact unearthed by special agents from Washington who are conducting an investigation here.

Many of these vessels, usually sailing under the English or the German flag, make this port from the Orient each year. Each carries in her crew

some 50 Chinese sailors. The officials are of the opinion that Chinese agents in this city arrange with many of their countrymen, who have made their fortunes, to replace the Chinese sailors when the Standard vessel leave the port on payment of a certain sum from the entrant. This substitution is easy because of the manner of checking the crews of ships on their arrival and departure.

Experts of the Department of Agriculture have succeeded in raising in this country a species of watermelon indigenous to Roumania. The fruit is the size of a grape fruit, with a thin skin.
