Hall and Ely were arrested for fighting. The police judge dismissed Ely and denied a change of venue to Hall, who claimed the justice was prejudiced.

The case was taken up to the superior court on a writ of certiorari and was remanded back to the police judge, as the record was incomplete. Homer Kerby, attorney for Hall, went to Vancouver late this evening to get Judge McCredie to order a change of venue. There is some question as to whether a change of venue or trial by jury can be had in this state in case of violation of a town ordinance.
