ROOSEVELT IN CLUTCH OF FAMINE**Relief Party Sent Forward Almost Overcome With Want and the Desert's Hardships—Supplies Sent Back Along the Line.**

(United Press Special Wire.)
Nalvasa, British East Africa, July 12.—Half dead from hunger and thirst, R. J. Cunningham, the noted English hunter who is in charge of Colonel Roosevelt's hunting party, staggered up to Attendorough Manor house last night and reported that the Roosevelt party was badly in need of food. Commander Frederic Attendorough, retired, of the British navy, came across Lake Nalvasa in a launch driven at full speed this morning to get supplies for the American hunters.

They said they had misjudged the distance from the Roosevelt camp to the Attendorough house and had spent the entire day without food or water, on the desert.

Cunningham had started early in the morning with the intention of getting enough supplies from the manor house to feed the Roosevelt party until such time as more provisions could be sent from here. Taking his porters, he set out across the desert, expecting to arrive at the manor long before noon. The distance was much greater than he judged and it was late at night when he finally reached his destination.

Attendorough said he did not think Colonel Roosevelt and his companions were in a serious condition, only having underestimated the supply of food necessary for their march across the country to the Attendorough manor.

As soon as Cunningham had been cared for and fed he gathered up a small supply of food and started back across the desert to meet Roosevelt.

He took along enough provisions to feed the hunters until they reach Attendorough's estate, where their commissary will be restocked with supplies. Attendorough started for his home in the hills, where he expects to find Roosevelt, as soon as the supplies were loaded on his launch. He said he expected Colonel Roosevelt and his party to reach the manor some time this afternoon.

H. W. Attendorough, the commander's brother, who for 30 years was a resident of San Francisco, remained at the manor house to welcome Colonel Roosevelt.

The colonel and Kermit will remain at the Attendorough estate for several days and then go to Lord Desmiers' estate near Nloro. The scientists in the party will remain at the Attendorough place while Roosevelt and his men make this visit.

Major Edgar A. Mearns, United States army, a member of the Roosevelt party, now shares the laurels of the American president in the eyes of the American hero-worshipping nation. He won his place in the affection of the blacks by riding 40 miles across the desert recently and saving the life of a native who had been injured by a lion.

At the Attendorough estate, Roosevelt hopes to kill some fine bush bucks, baboons and rare duiker boks.

SIXTH TRIENNIAL COUNCIL OF WOMEN

Seattle, July 12.—President Mary Wood Swift of Berkeley, Cal., has arrived in this city to take charge of final arrangements for the sixth triennial session of the National Council of Women, which will be held in Seattle on Wednesday, Thursday and Friday of this week.

Several prominent members of the national council are already here, having attended other conventions already held. Among these are Rev. Anna H. Shaw of Pennsylvania, Rachel Foster Avery of New York, who attended the suffragist convention, and Mrs. Nellie E. Merriam of Oklahoma, who attended the convention of the Pythian Sisters. Eighty delegates from the convention of the International Council of Women, recently held at Toronto, will arrive in Seattle this evening on the steamer Princess Charlotte from Victoria. These women will be given a reception on their arrival, after which they will be escorted to their special train, where they will occupy the cars instead of stopping at hotels.

A feature of the entertainment of the Wednesday will be an automobile ride about the city, at the conclusion of which a luncheon will be served in the new building on the exposition grounds by the Seattle Federation of Women's Clubs. The several foreign consuls of the city will be present and address the guests.

LAKE TRADE OPEN TO THE ROSE CITY**Portland Has Fine Opportunity to Compete With San Francisco.**

(Special Dispatch to The Journal.)
Klamath Falls, Or., July 12.—Portland wholesalers now have an excellent opportunity to obtain a portion of the lake county trade. Since the roads from Klamath Falls to Lakeview have been improved large shipments for Lake county merchants arrive at the Klamath Falls depot. Most of the consignments come from California notwithstanding the fact that Portland has the same freight rate as San Francisco. Lakeview merchants say they would purchase from Portland if incitements were made, and there seems no reason why the bulk of the freight passing through Klamath Falls should not come from the Oregon metropolis.

Wholesalers from San Francisco are sending drummers into the southern Oregon country with instructions to get the business. It is realized that while the trade of this section is not now enormous, in the near future it will be a large item and will be well worth securing.

Portland is not making the efforts that are being put forth on the part of the Californians. Much of the Klamath trade has been diverted to Portland through the efforts of a few, but the Lake county business is still going in its old channels. In the past it has been impossible for Lake county merchants to buy from Portland. Commercial relations have been established with Sacramento and San Francisco. If these are to be broken it will take active

campaigning on the part of the wholesalers of the Oregon metropolis, according to views held by merchants of this section.

The road to Lake county from Klamath Falls is in good condition for heavy freighting. The merchants of Lakeview are determined to escape the clutches of the N. C. O. railway. The existing conditions offer an exceptional opportunity for Portlanders to enter the territory and get at least a portion of the trade.

GAMBLING PLACE AT COLMA RAIDED

San Francisco, July 12.—Twenty-five men and two women arrested in a police raid on Dan's brothers' resort in Colma, are at liberty today under bail of \$25 each. The police entered the building early yesterday morning after plain clothes men had found the company gathered around poker tables and roulette wheels. News of the raid reached the hall before the police made their appearance and the two detachments of officers found it necessary to break down the doors. John Dan, one of the proprietors, was among those arrested.

LUMBERMEN SAY SITUATION BETTER

(United Press Special Wire.)
Seattle, July 12.—With nearly 100 delegates from eastern and southern states in attendance, the annual convention of the National Lumber Manufacturers' association convened this forenoon at the Hoo Hoo house on the exposition grounds. The sessions will continue throughout the week.

The election of officers will take place Tuesday. Wednesday will be devoted largely to the reading of papers. On Thursday the delegates will be taken on a steamer trip on Puget sound. Friday the visitors will be entertained by Tacoma lumbermen at that city and on Saturday they will go to Portland.

The lumber situation was discussed

informally among the delegates and visiting lumbermen this morning and the unanimous sentiment was expressed that the industry was rapidly resuming its normal healthy tone.

New Orleans is making the only claim for the next convention place and it is believed that city will be chosen. It is predicted that R. A. Long of Kansas City will be reelected president of the association, with the chances favoring the reelection of George K. Smith of St. Louis as secretary.

DROWNED WHILE CHASING HIS HAT

San Francisco, July 12.—To recover the body of George Perz, 17 years of age, the bay off Farley's wharf is being dragged today. While he was walking on the wharf late yesterday Perz's hat was blown away. He pursued it to the edge of the wharf and in a final effort to regain it fell into the water. He was drowned before help arrived.

BUTTE MEN HOSTILE TO PRESIDENT MOYER

Denver, Colo., July 12.—Usual addresses of welcome marked the opening session of the convention of the Western Federation of Miners today. Activity on the part of the Butte delegation to oust President Moyer is already noticeable. A warm fight is anticipated.

12 Coaches Carry 1157 Tourists.

Husum, Wash., July 12.—A train of 12 coaches on the Spokane, Portland & Seattle from Spokane passed White Salmon the other day with 1157 passengers. A portion of the crowd were seated in the dining car, while many were compelled to stand. A party of about 50 Scandinavians were on the train, their destination being White Salmon. They will begin in this valley and other points in western Klickitat county.

EXAGGERATION OF TRIFLING MATTER**Blumauer Party Look Upon Newspaper Notoriety as Joke.**

"Just say for me that I'm glad to be back in Portland," said Sol Blumauer this morning. "Portland beats any of the cities I've been in."

"I've nothing to add to all that has been said about the affair in New York. There's nothing in it but newspaper talk."

"Just newspaper talk," said Mr. Blumauer's brother, to emphasize the statement.

"I expected to pay the duty, which amounted to about \$400," continued Mr. Blumauer. "Every trunk is inspected, and I paid all that I should pay, but no more."

Sol Blumauer evidently looks upon the whole matter as a joke, refusing to talk seriously about it and only smiling when asked to explain the details of the trouble, or to correct any false statements made about him in the newspapers.

"I've nothing to add," he said, "nor nothing to explain. The whole thing has been so grossly exaggerated and it is absurd to discuss such a trifling matter."

Thieves Make Jewelry Hunt.
