"When you hear anyone criticizing Chinese missionaries," said Mrs. Paul McClintock yesterday afternoon in addressing an audience of women in the chapel of the First Presbyterian church, "remember that women missionaries work only with Chinese women and girls. It is impossible for them to have anything to do with the men."

Mrs. McClintock has been with her husband for 10 years on the island of Hainan, off the southern coast of China, and related many interesting experiences and stories of her Chinese life, and the difficulties of teaching Christianity in China.
