TO SAFEGUARD CZAR IN ENGLAND

London, July 14.—Scotland Yard is exceptionally anxious concerning the czar's visit to England at the end of this month, as the authorities have received warning from various continental sources that among the foreign anarchists who have taken refuge in England during the last 12 months there are about a dozen of the most desperate type. It has been ascertained that several meetings of this particular group have been held recently in one of the larger provincial towns, and that on these occasions speeches of a most violent character have been made. The czar was invariably the subject of the open threats which the speakers indulged in, and sufficient was said to account easily for the uneasiness existing among the high officials of the police department. If possible, therefore, the precautions taken to safeguard the czar will be more elaborate than ever has been the case previously on the occasion of a foreign ruler's visit to England.

URSULINE CONVENT'S GOLDEN JUBILEE

Springfield, Ill., July 14.—Former pupils of the Ursuline convent of this city have gathered to take part in a notable celebration of the institution's fiftieth anniversary. The celebration began today and will continue over tomorrow and Friday. Tomorrow morning Bishop Ryan of Alton will celebrate high mass. Another feature of the program will be a reproduction of the first graduation exercises held at the institution in 1858. Among the participants will be Mrs. Rhoda Bissell Thomas of Belleville, daughter of former Governor Bissell of Illinois. Mrs. Thomas was salutatorian of the class of 1858 and will deliver the same address at the golden jubilee celebration.

LAND SEEKERS CONGREGATING

Five Thousand at Missoula and More Coming for Flathead Opening.

(United Press Land Wire.) Missoula, Mont., July 14.—At least 5000 strangers are lodged in the hotels and rooming houses of this city in anticipation of the opening to filing of the Flathead Indian reservation lands tomorrow. It is expected that at least 50,000 persons will register for the lands, which comprise 750,000 acres all told.

After the registration the drawing will be conducted by a committee named by the government. Christie Donlan, 12-year-old daughter of Senator Donlan, has been officially chosen to draw the allotments. Every train brings hundreds of persons. Already tents are being pitched on vacant lots and by Thursday the place will resemble an army encampment. Temporary buildings are being erected to be used as sleeping quarters for the transients. By special order the city administration has issued a mandate restricting the operations of takers during the registration period. Special deputies have been added to the force under Sheriff Graham and law and order will be maintained.

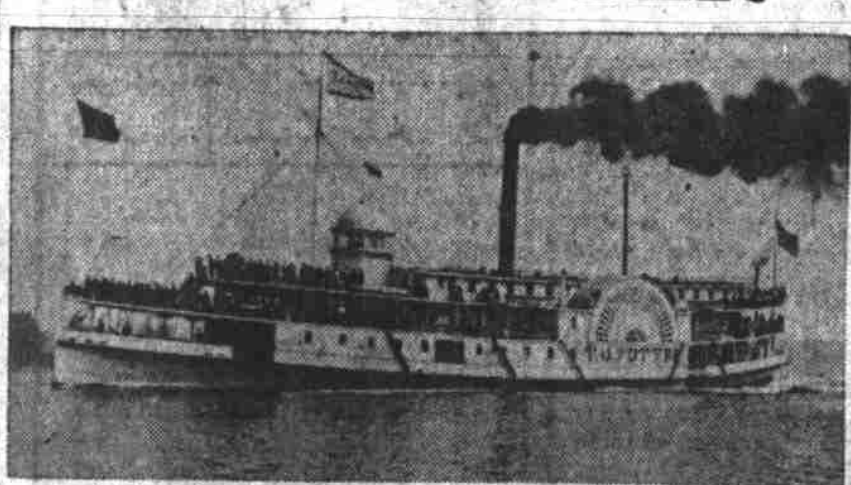
