In the evening, local bankers and business men will entertain the visitors with an elaborate banquet at the Commercial club, after which the special train will leave for Seattle. The reception committee of the Commercial club, composed of Sigmund Schickel, R. Sinnott, W. J. Hoffman, W. B. London and H. Beckwith, and a committee of local bankers, J. H. Hankman, W. Dunckley, R. Durham, J. A. Keating, and A. N. Wright, will be in charge of the entertainment. A number of former Texans will also attend as hosts. They are George H. Boeckhe, Tom Richardson, L. B. Menefee, Will A. Knight, E. G. Elkins, L. G. Gillette, George A. Akers and Guy M. Standifer.

Officers Elected—At the conclusion of the sixteenth annual convention of the State Dental society yesterday the following officers for next year were elected: Dr. William C. Holbrook, president; Dr. C. V. Littler, of Albany, vice-president; Dr. Wallace Shearer, secretary-treasurer; executive committee, Dr. A. L. Emmett, Dr. E. C. McFarland, editor, Dr. Julius Endelman, of Ashland. The executive committee of the association recommended that Dr. Jean Cline and Dr. George Nottage be recommended to the association as members of the board of state dental examiners. The Dental society has decided to cooperate with school and health boards for the inspection and care of children's teeth. The convention this year has been unusually successful and interesting for members.

Rock Pile for McGee—Alexander McGee, a young man arrested on Tuesday with Catherine James, a pretty 18-year-old miss, was today sentenced to 90 days on the rock pile by Judge Bennett on a charge of vagrancy. McGee, it appears, has been living with the James girl and was about to place her in a place of evil repute. He had, according to the James girl, been living on his earnings while in Portland. The young couple wanted to be married and escape the clutches of the law. Judge Bennett, however, would not listen after talking to the father of the James girl. She was sentenced to 90 days in jail, but the sentence was suspended. The girl was turned over to her father, who will take her home.

Must Stand Trial—A. J. Minier, released from custody on a charge of "being on the loose," is today to stand trial. J. L. Smithson, proprietor of the North Portland restaurant, who first had Minier arrested for the alleged offense of \$40 in the restaurant, was dismissed, stating that he wished to give Minier a chance to help his baby. Minier, who accused him of trying to "make a grandstand play," and secured the consent of the district attorney to let him go. Minier was letting him go he would demand trial.

Residence Damaged by Fire—Mrs. Caroline Baum's residence at 314 College street was partly destroyed by fire at 11 o'clock this morning. The total loss from damage to house and furniture being estimated at \$1500. The fire originated from a defective flue in the kitchen, and quickly spread to the remainder of the five room cottage, causing the entire inside of the building and destroying the furniture in three rooms. The loss is fully covered by insurance. Both the policy on the house and the furniture would have expired in a few days.

Charges Violent Throwing—Walter Green, alias Walter Oro, said at one time to have been the manager of the Star theatre, was arrested last night on complaint of his former wife, Elizabeth Green, on a charge of threatening to commit murder. Green is said to have attacked his wife yesterday afternoon and to have thrown a mixture of blue vitriol and water into her face and also to have threatened to kill her.

Showed His Heels—F. S. Williams, 255 Eleventh street, reported to the police that an attempt had been made to hold him up last night. He was walking in the vicinity of East Twenty-first and Clackamas streets when he says he was approached by three men, who tried to rob him, but from whom he escaped by running, despite threats made to shoot him.

Ed Burg Bound Over—Ed Burg, arrested yesterday on a charge of assault with intent to rob, for an alleged attack on Oscar Lamps at Third and Everett streets, on Tuesday night, was today bound over to the grand jury under \$200 cash bail by Judge Bennett in municipal court.

Best Up Engineer—C. H. M. Gromwald, proprietor of the Princess hotel, located at East Third and Burnside streets, was fined \$10 by Judge Bennett after a hearing on charges of assault and battery and using abusive and violent language. The complaint was

brought by Frank Kenney, an engineer who has been working for Gromwald. Kenney was discharged yesterday and had gone for his tools to the basement when he was assaulted. Gromwald followed him there and attacked him, beating him badly about the face and using violent and abusive language toward him. A number of witnesses corroborated Kenney's story and Gromwald was fined.

Stenographers Try Out—Secretary W. W. McIntosh of the municipal civil service commission for stenographers in the council chamber at the city hall today. There are seven competitors, all women. Professor A. F. Vance of the Holmes Business college, who donated his services for this work.

Runaway Horse Drowned—At about 7:30 last evening a bay horse hitched to a new buggy ran away and crossed the Weider creek and plunged into the Willamette river. The horse was drowned. A few minutes after the accident, the driver, who had been thrown out, appeared on the scene in an intoxicated condition. L. R. Dunderly, a taxicab driver, was an eye witness of the accident, but could not prevail upon the man to give him a name.

Bound Over on Gambling Charge—A. Kaufmann, Nathan Cohen, Simon Cohen and J. Gang, the four men arrested on a charge of larceny and later rearrested on a charge of gambling, were engaged in a dice game with Ben Cohen at First and Hooker streets, on Sunday night, were bound over to the grand jury under \$100 bail apiece by Judge Bennett after a hearing in municipal court. This morning, the larceny charge was dismissed.

Restrictions Placed on Dance Halls—The public dance halls in the city are to be placed under strict police surveillance, according to a letter received yesterday by Chief of Police Cox from City Auditor A. L. Barbur. All will be compelled to have licenses and all, with the exception of the halls at the Oaks and Council Crest, which have special licenses, will be compelled to close on Sundays.

PUSH CLUB HAS FINAL SESSION

Peninsula Boosters Close Work for Year and Take Up Important Business.

After a year of highly successful work, the Peninsula Development league last night held its last meeting of the year at the hall at Arbor Lodge. Several important measures to the Peninsula were taken up at the meeting.

One of these was a resolution adopted by the club and addressed to the water board of the city asking that the meter system be continued, meters installed in every house and building in the city and that in order to keep the water fund up to the desired height to raise the meter rate so that it would equal or at least come near equaling the old flat rate. This method, it was thought, would successfully catch the water hog yet give the considerate water user a fair rate.

Another movement endorsed was that of securing the three blocks between the new Jefferson high school and Killingsworth avenue for playgrounds. The lots are at present unimproved and it is thought that the city could purchase them at a very considerable price. The club realized that the pupils of the other two high schools are without suitable grounds and that the need of such a playground is great. The city was also asked to start a program of improving the new Smith park at once.

FIGHT FOR FORTUNE IN MASSACHUSETTS

Boston, Mass., July 15.—A contest that promises to develop into a notable fight for a fortune came up for hearing today in the probate court of Middlesex county. The case is that of Daniel Blake Russell, of North Dakota, who claims to be the son of the late Daniel Russell, of Melrose. His claim is disputed by William G. Russell, who failed to recognize in the North Dakota man his long missing brother.

The elder Russell died 14 years ago, leaving an estate valued at half a million dollars. The fortune was left to the son, William G. Russell, with the provision that if the second son, Daniel Blake Russell, who had long been lost sight of, should return he was to be given half the property.

Several months ago the North Dakota man appeared in Melrose and set up a claim for the fortune, alleging that he was the long missing son. He claimed that he had run away from home many years ago after a quarrel with his father and had only recently learned of the latter's death. He is said to have been identified by many of the older residents of Melrose and talks with him he recalled many of the incidents of his youth. Despite
