

\$3,000,000 INCREASE IN BANK DEPOSITS

State Examiner Steel's Statement Shows Institutions to Be in Excellent Condition—Vale National Fails to Send in Report.

Salem, Or., July 17.—Oregon banks show a healthy increase in deposits during the past few months, according to the statement issued yesterday by State Examiner Steel. Since the last statement was made deposits have increased \$3,000,000, the sum being divided about evenly between the state and national banks. Loans and discounts have increased \$1,500,000 among the national banks, but there is a slight decrease among the state banks.

FIRE DESTROYS FINE MACHINERY

Stock and Equipment of John Clark Saddlery Company Damaged by Fire.

Fire, resulting in damage amounting to between \$600 and \$800 according to estimates made, broke out shortly after 5 o'clock this morning in the factory room on the second floor of the John Clark Saddlery company at the east side of Front street south of Washington street. The fire evidently started from defective wiring and was blazing fiercely when the department arrived on the scene.

The room in which the fire originated is entirely encompassed with heavy brick walls and the windows are covered with heavy iron fireproof shutters and this, owing to the excellent work of the fire department held the blaze within the one large factory room. The fire did not burn through the roof, although the ceiling was destroyed and several holes were burned in the floor.

Mr. Clark estimates that his loss will reach \$10,000, although a part of this will be through loss of business until the factory can be put in running order again. The loss comes largely from machinery and stock and will temporarily put 50 men out of employment.

A large number of sets of harness on these men were working were destroyed. Intricate and valuable machinery was reduced to a wreck, while a large quantity of leather and other materials were destroyed.

The estimates and other valuable papers kept in the small office in the factory room were saved. The fire department had considerable difficulty in fighting the fire owing to the large number of electric wires strung about the ceiling.

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NEW COUNTY MAY BE CARVED OUT

Three Thousand Employees of Car Company Out—Fight Fund Raised.

Pittsburg, July 17.—The Public Defense association, in the interest of taxpayers, today began proceedings to bring the sheriff, the officials of the Pressed Steel Car company and the workers' striking employees into court to settle their difficulties. The proceedings were begun on the grounds that the strike is a menace to public property.

Butler, Pa., July 17.—At a mass meeting this morning a committee of four workers was appointed to present the workers' grievances to the company. Manager Altman refused to see them, and announced that he had closed the plant for an indefinite time.

Butler, Pa., July 17.—Three thousand employees of the Standard Steel Car company are on strike today, and riots are threatened. Fearing violence, the sheriff has sent a request to Harrisburg for a detachment of state constabulary to guard the company's plant.

A small riot occurred today when a big Hungarian defied the strikers' pickets and declared he intended to return to work. He was stoned and clubbed into submission by sympathizers of the strikers and was finally removed to the hospital.

Five hundred workmen quit work at the plant yesterday and others followed today. Those who struck today refused to leave the shops yesterday, but were persuaded to strike by agents who worked among them last night.

It is reported here that 3000 persons attended the mass meeting at which the money was raised.

STRIKE FUND RAISED AT MCKEE'S ROCKS

Pittsburg, Pa., July 17.—Ten thousand dollars to assist in paying the expenses of the striking workers who are fighting the Pressed Steel Car company was raised at a mass meeting held at McKee's Rocks yesterday.

No disorders have been reported in the vicinity of the car company's plant today, the strikers declaring their intention to maintain peace.

It is reported here that 3000 persons attended the mass meeting at which the money was raised.

BULLDOG GUARDS GRESHAM CAMP

Place Where Dodge and Parmour Lived Needs no Federal Protection.

A faithful and fearless bulldog is guarding the tent occupied till three days ago by French E. Dodge and Mrs. John Connor and her two daughters, Grace and Rose, and the deputy marshal who will be sent out there today to take possession of it pending the outcome of the trial of Dodge or the woman, will have to be careful lest he gets the worst of the mixup that might follow when the dog discovers that he is about to be ousted from his position of guard.

Dodge, after a preliminary investigation yesterday afternoon before United States Commissioner Marsh, in the office of the United States district attorney, was bound over to the grand jury under bonds of \$2500 to stand investigation on the charge of impersonating a government official, and the woman is held in the county jail to answer to a statutory charge sworn to by her husband. The little girls have been placed with friends, and the only one remaining at the camp, about a quarter of a mile east of Gresham, is the bulldog.

Dodge was arrested the other day by Deputy United States Marshal William Gilkenson of the Gresham district, but there was no charge against the bulldog he was left in the tent.

"I think it would be well for the government to appoint a keeper to look after the property in the tent," said the deputy marshal, after the conclusion of the examination yesterday, "or people might help themselves to whatever might be there. As it is, there is no one to look after it."

The dog broke in Dodge, who after all does not appear to be such a dangerous person, "there is a bulldog out there, and I'm afraid he might not respect his trust even to a deputy marshal. I would therefore ask whoever goes out there to beware of the dog. I don't want anybody to get hurt, and there is no telling what he might do. And he might be hungry, too, by this time."

Promise was given that the dog would be well treated, and the prisoner was returned to the county jail, while his editor, Seneca Fouts, started out to hunt bondsmen, whom it is believed can be secured by finding apparent that Dodge has friends here.

The hearing before Commissioner Marsh brought some statements that indicated that Farmer Connor of Shedd's station, who declares he was molested by Dodge to the tune of several hundred dollars, besides his wife and children, did not always treat his family as would an ideal husband and father. To make certain that Dodge will not escape punishment, the woman was arrested and was sworn out yesterday by the justice of the peace at Gresham charging him with a statutory crime and it was served on him yesterday. Federal case takes precedence, however, and it is possible that the second case will be dropped if conviction is secured in the first.

Two months ago a minor operation was performed, which for a time seemed successful, but fresh inflammation developed a short time ago, necessitating the operation.
