Case Involves Large Tract.—Trial of the case of the state of Oregon against the Three Sisters Irrigation company, the Columbia Southern Irrigation company, the Oregon Trust & Savings bank and W. A. Laidlaw, will begin in the federal court August 2, the matter having been set down on the calendar this morning when Attorney General A. M. Crawford was present. Associated with him for the prosecution is the firm of Kollock & Zollinger. The case is considered to be of considerable importance, the reason of the fact that it involves a large tract of land for which the Three Sisters Irrigation company has a claim. The case is expected to be a long one, and it is thought that the trial will be a very interesting one.

POWELL CHARGED WITH ASSAULT

Andy Powell, plumbing inspector in the east side water office, was arrested last evening on a charge of assault and battery at 81 Grand avenue. According to Floyd Brown, Powell assaulted him while in a drunken condition. June 28, and struck him in the left eye, breaking his glasses and cutting his left eye. Brown says: "The blow broke my glasses and the glass cut through the lid and cut into my eye. I was badly injured. I could not see and it was feared that I would lose the sight of my eye. As it was I was in the hospital for 10 days."

Brown states that he intended taking the matter up before the grand jury, but learning yesterday that the grand jury might not meet again this month, he decided to file a complaint with Powell with assault and battery. The case was continued for hearing for next Tuesday.

GOVERNMENT WANTS PILES FROM OREGON

Through its general purchasing agent, F. C. Boggs, the Isthmian Canal commission in Washington, on July 8, issued a call for bids to furnish untreated and creosoted piles, to be used in the construction of the Panama canal. All piling is required to be of long leaf pine, cypress, or Douglas fir, and it must be free from bark rot and unsound knots.

The commission is calling for 125,625 linear feet of untreated piles and 20,000 feet of creosoted piles.

The piles must be delivered at Colon, the Atlantic port, or the Port of Ancon, the Panama port.

The detailed specification sheet may be obtained through Secretary Giltner of the chamber of commerce.

BIG DISPLAY FOR TONIGHT

Postponed Fireworks Will Be Shown at Oaks.

A grand display of fireworks, postponed from the night of July 12, will be given at the Oaks tonight. The program of fireworks includes 40 elaborate pieces and will be started by a salute of aerial shells, followed by an illumination of the river and surroundings.

One of the best displays will be a bunch of electric-radium rockets. Some of the other displays will be an exhibition of Paine's device for shooting fish, "Maude and the Kicking Mule," and the patriotic device, "My Country 'Tis of Thee." The fireworks will end with a display of large colored rockets.

IMPORTANT CHANGES

In Oregon Electric Railway Trains, Commencing Sunday, July 18.

A new timecard goes into effect tomorrow on the Oregon Electric railway that changes the arriving and leaving time of all trains in and out of Portland, Salem, Forest Grove and Hillsboro. The new card will be found in the round road time table section of this paper.

Six additional trains are added on the Forest Grove division and two additional trains on the Salem division. The limited train now leaves Portland at 1:50 a. m. instead of 2:15, arriving at Salem at 10:30, instead of 10:50, and returning, leaves Salem at 3:55 p. m., instead of 4:15. A night train leaves Portland for Salem at 11 p. m., also a night train leaves Portland for Forest Grove at 11:15 p. m.

FRENCH BANKS REPEATED

Windjammers Sully and Jean Bart Will Come Here for Wheat.

NO STEAMERS ARE BEING TAKEN NOW

On Account of High Price Asked Dealers Are Waiting for the Steamers Bringing Coal for Government.

Two more windjammers were chartered yesterday at union rates, the vessel being the French bark Sully and Jean Bart, the former having arrived at Dunkirk, July 17, and the latter at Ipswich. They are expected to arrive in December and load wheat for United Kingdom ports.

The Sully is a bark of 1944 tons net register and the Jean Bart is 1981 tons net register. They will carry from 100,000 to 115,000 bushels of grain apiece.

Steam carriers are not being taken at present for the grain trade, as they are holding out for 15 and 25 cents, which is considered by the dealers as being too high, so they are awaiting the arrival of the steamers which are bringing coal around for the government.

It is expected that when they arrive there will be plenty of steam tonnage to carry grain, and also that charter prices will not be so high.

While there has been some inquiry about wheat, from other countries, prices are up so high at the present time, that nothing has come of them. Although it is expected that winter on things will pick up in that line.

DOG BITES WAITER

Pet of Passenger on Rose City Objects to Going Aboard.

While taking a little lapdog belonging to one of the passengers, a waiter named Robert Sheridan, was bitten on the hand. The wound which was not serious was immediately attended to by a physician. Health inspector of the steamship company, and Sheridan was allowed to go back to his duties, with instructions as to how to take care of his hand, so that it would not become poisoned.

CASCO ARRIVES LATE

Four Days From Bay City to Cape Blanco on Account of Wind.

The steam schooner Casco arrived in port last night, after a very rough passage up as far as Cape Blanco, after which she had a comparatively smooth run to the mouth of the Columbia. She was four days making the distance between San Francisco and Cape Blanco, which is about two days longer than her usual time. After passing the cape she made the run to the bay in one day.

Upon leaving San Francisco she ran into the northwester which has been blowing off the coast, and her decks were continually awash for the next four days. As her deck load was made up of asphalt, no damage was done to it on account of it being so heavy.

On her way up the Casco was passing the steamer Maverick, which was bound for Seattle with a general cargo.

The Casco is unloading 800 barrels of asphalt at the Council street dock, finishing there she will go to Columbia No. 1, where she will discharge 200 tons of cement, and then to the Oak street to unload what general cargo she brought up. She will load lumber somewhere down the river for her cargo to San Francisco.

MORE WHEAT ON TEAL

Open River Transportation Company's Boat to Bring 2500 Sacks.

Twenty-five hundred sacks of wheat will be brought down on the steamer Teal, which is being chartered for the purpose. It will be reloaded on the J. N. Teal and brought down here. It is expected to arrive here on Tuesday.

The wheat is taken on by the Twin Cities at Central Ferry and it will probably make up a part of the cargo of the Open River Transportation company's steamers on every trip now. Dorsey B. Smith, general manager of the company, said that they intended to handle the wheat from such places as were not reached by the railroads.

ALONG THE WATERFRONT

The American-Hawaiian steamer Hoquiam arrived at Astoria this morning and will probably be up some time this week. She is bringing a part of the cargo which was to have come on the Falcon, but the latter did not arrive in time to get it. The San Francisco cargo is now being transferred to the Hoquiam, which comes around by way of the Isthmus of Tehuantepec.

The steamer Kansas City, which will go on the run between here and San Francisco in the place of the State of California, arrived in San Francisco last night. She left Newport News on May 20.

With grain bags and miscellaneous Chinese merchandise, the Portland & Astoria Steamship company's steamer, the Henrik Ibsen, is due to arrive here on Tuesday or Wednesday from the Orient.

Dr. Henry S. Prichett, civilian member of the lighthouse board, arrived in the city last night. He just returned from a tour of inspection in southeastern Alaska. While here he will confer with Captain J. M. Elliott on matters concerning aids to navigation.

The steamer was taken down to the Port of Portland drydock this morning where she will be re-caulked and her hull strengthened before starting on her trip to San Francisco. This is necessary in order to obtain insurance on her. Howard C. Holmes said that she would be under down, although she would be under down in order to help herself. He could not say just when she would be ready to leave, but it will probably be a couple of weeks.

After loading 750,000 feet of lumber at the Columbia mills, at Knappa, for the Loop Lumber company, the schooner, the Virginia, is for San Francisco. The Associated Oil company's steamer, the W. S. Porter left San Francisco yesterday morning and will be back to Linton about Monday with fuel oil.

LITTLE BRIGHT EYES SEE WRONG

Mime, Peel May Face Court for Doing a Sherlock Holmes Stunt.

Because a clairvoyant had described young Gene Johns as the thief who had stolen a number of valuable rings from Mrs. Sadie Lowe of 404 East First street was induced by her daughter to swear to a complaint charging the young man with larceny yesterday. Johns, who is in the employ of the Pearson-Page company, was arrested yesterday afternoon and was released on his own recognizance, at the instance of District Attorney Cameron.

Mrs. Lowe and her daughter admitted that a clairvoyant, Madame Peel, had been visited by the latter and that she had given an absolute description of Johns as the thief. Now Deputy District Attorney Cameron states that he will bring the clairvoyant into court and make her explain why she is engaged in any practice which may lead to the arrest of an innocent man.

Mrs. Lowe lost from her room on July 6 five valuable rings aggregating in value \$185.
