Chicago, July 17.—Except for a lowering of the July price, which was natural in view of the cash wheat prices everywhere there was no material change in the level of the market for the day. There was good trading in September wheat at times. A slightly lower market during the morning was followed by remarkably good buying to the contrary.

\$1.11 $\frac{1}{2}$. From this there was a break to \$1.10 $\frac{1}{2}$ near the close, but support was excellent after the decline, and the last price, \$1.11 $\frac{1}{2}$, less than $\frac{1}{4}$ cent net decline for the day. At one time there was heavy buying of September and selling of December by a strong local house which caused a decided widening in the spread.

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trade in general. St. Louis reported a bad smash in cash wheat prices in anticipation of heavy receipts early next week. There was a sharp drop in cash prices here also. There was an estimate that the Chicago market would be better, but there is considerable accumulation of wheat by Monday at the winter wheat markets, some further break in cash prices may be recorded. On the other hand, a return of bad weather might easily cause a complete change of feeling and bring about a recovery as it did last year.

Selling pressure in corn at the opening caused a dip in the July price to 69 cents and in the September to a shade under 65 cents. In the Good buying by local interests was felt at once and a quick rally occurred. For Monday the estimate is 211 cars. Shipping sales were 60,000 bushels. Cash prices after an early dip

The most abrupt break in the grain trade for the day was in July oats, which went off sharply to 45½ cents, had a 1 cent rally, an hour later, closed heavy at 45½ c. The late months showed about a half cent net loss for the day, closing at 41¼-41½ c for September and 41½ c for December. Estimated receipts 103 cars. Cash prices ruled lower and shipping sales were 130,000 bushels.

There was a certain element in the trade which had sold corn and bought provisions for some time past. There was considerable unstraddling in the way of buying corn and selling products. This more than anything else, gave the lower prices at the close. Recent prices for hogs will attract a larger run of hogs only for a few days.
