spanned the river, the great natural bridge immortalized in Balch's story of that name, and verified by tradition and geology. You may peer down through the clear waters of the Columbia and see, many feet below, tops of tall trees that were submerged centuries ago when the great stone bridge connecting the banks of the river, was hurled from its foundations to the bottom of the stream, there to form a barrier to navigation, making the river impassable save by artificial locks. The river at this point is a seething mass of foam and spray.

Other interesting Columbia river points, Hood River, Monier and The Dalles, are but a short distance, respectively, beyond Cascade Locks.

To Cloud Cap Inn by Train and Auto

The Mount Hood trip to Cloud Cap Inn provides a wholly new set of experiences. Some people are inclined to look upon the snow peaks as alluring only to the daring mind and those sure of foot, offering little incentive to less rugged natures. Mount Hood can be visited with as much ease as can the coast. Leaving Portland on an Oregon Railroad and Navigation company train, you are whisked along at a pleasant rate, skirting the upper Columbia. Two hours' journey brings you to Hood River, where you are met by a modern high speed auto and conveyed the remainder of the distance to Cloud Cap Inn.

There may follow daily expeditions, under competent guides, to Ellet glacier, Ladd glacier, Newton Clark glacier, Zigzag glacier, White River glacier, Sandy glacier, Cow glacier, Cooper's Four, Hardacre falls, Meekins falls, Coman's Scoot and many other spots of peculiar interest. Some of these trips require fortitude, others are as simple as a summer's walk under your own shade trees.

Resorts on North Bank Road

The development of summer resorts on the Spokane, Portland & Seattle railway, "the North Bank road," has

been rapid since the completion of that line between Spokane and Portland. The road traverses a section of country along the bank of the Columbia river that abounds in mineral springs, many of them gushing forth boiling water that it is claimed has medicinal qualities, and this has led to the establishment of a number of tourist and health resorts that are becoming well known, since adequate transportation facilities have been provided.

At Ash, Wash., are located Shipper's Mineral Springs hotel and St. Martin's Springs hotel. These are situated in the heart of the Cascade mountains, on that famous fishing stream, Wind river, and near the base of Wind mountain. The distance from the railway is approximately 10 miles and a bus from the hotel meet all trains.

At Collins, Wash., is the Collins Hot Springs hotel, located on the bank of the Columbia river, about five miles east of Ash, commanding a view of the Columbia river in both directions that is unparalleled for its magnificence. Captain Belcher is in charge of this hotel, which has long been popular as a health and pleasure resort, being served both by the railroad company and the Columbia river boat lines. There are several trout streams in the vicinity of Collins where the best of fishing is found.

At White Salmon, Wash., are found the famous Jewett farm resort and the Washington hotel. The Jewett farm is unique in that it combines the comforts of the tourist hotel with the charm and freedom of country life on a farm. Situated on a high bluff, at one of the most picturesque points on the Columbia river, near the mouth of the White Salmon river, this comfortable old farmhouse, surrounded by quaint cottages and sleeping tents, nestles among the pine trees, where the breezes always blow and where the pure mountain air rests and refreshes the tourists. The Washington hotel is located in the town of White Salmon, and makes a specialty of caring for tourist travel.

The Goldendale branch of the S. P. & N. railway leaves the main line at Lytle, Wash., and follows the Klickitat river to the town of Goldendale. Along the Klickitat river is found trout fishing that awakens the enthusiasm of the angler and where record catches are not unusual. Two daily trains in each direction afford an opportunity for the sportsman to enjoy the scenery of the banks of this famous fishing stream. At Wahkiakum, a station located on the bank of the Klickitat, is to be found the farmhouse of Mr. Maddoch, on whose land are found hot springs and who has made provision for taking care

of tourists who are looking for health or pleasure.

Crater Lake National Park

Crater Lake, via Medford, Ashland or Klamath Falls, is reached by a way so beautiful as to attract the senses to the exquisite presentation. The road leads through native forests of sugar and yellow pine, fir, spruce and hemlock, past crystal mountain streams, along wondrous gorges, and at last, by a well worn, deep forest road, approaches the base of Mount Mazama. A half mile climb and you reach the broken rim of the old volcano, and gaze directly upon Crater lake—the vast body of deep blue water that half fills the shell of this great extinct volcano; 2000 feet down you look to the water's surface, and 3000 feet below that lies the lake's bottom! The surface dimensions, five by seven miles, the altitude where you stand, 8000 feet. But figures can convey nothing of the impression of immensity one gains gazing upon the lake.

Putting out from shore in rowboat or launch, you begin to gain an idea of the wonderful coloring of the water near shore. It is turquoise; farther out it is the deepest blue imaginable, and of a perfectly intense clearness—"diamond blue." Gradually the feeling of awe inspired by the novel situation of being inside a vast crater, given way to intense enjoyment as fish respond to the casting of the line, and great rainbow trout are pulled in almost as fast as hook reaches water. The limit, five to a fisherman, is soon reached.

Starting the rim to the left, the rock formations may be studied at closer range and the significance of certain names noted. Peak of Devil's Backbone, Lion Rock, the Palisades, the Wineglass, Red Cloud Cliff, the Castle, Dutton Cliff, Garfield Peak are all revealed with intense interest while the two islands invite to further exploration.

Newport, Otter Rock.

Leaving Portland on a Southern Pacific morning train, a most enjoyable day's journey up the Willamette valley, skirting the river of the same name, Albany from thence westward by the Corvallis & Eastern railroad, lands you at Newport in time for a genuine sea food dinner not to be duplicated anywhere. Newport, on Yaquina bay and the ocean, offers the most varied attractions of any beach resort on the

Pacific coast. There is the beautiful bay, smooth and safe as a mill pond, supplied with boats of every description, and the water alive with the greatest variety of fish; there is Yaquina river, affording the most delightful jaunting up to Elk City, and stocked with fish and shore is the Pacific coast, rolling grandly on these shores, without undertow to add danger to pleasure. Beaches rise from the water's edge, near shore, rugged peaks or flat tops that provide homes for all forms of marine life, such as seals, otters, gulls, and whales have from time immemorial made this their feeding ground.

Bay City—Tillamook

There is a fascination about the surf that lures thousands of people to its embrace every year. The following white crest waves that lick the beautiful beaches are irresistible, and already their beck and call have summoned thousands of Oregonians to their feet, and in consequence of the allurements of the sea, hundreds of Portland homes have been abandoned for the summer, and many more will be forsaken by people who love to while away the days weeks and months on the beautiful beaches of Oregon.

Boys and girls, youths and maidens, young men and young women, staid old bachelors and grave old maids, and even old men and women, find attraction at Bay City on Tillamook bay, where the brine obliterates terra firma. The beach attendance increases every year and people from other resorts are gradually learning that the Oregon beaches afford comfort and pleasure not found elsewhere.

Seal Rock Beach

Surpassing even the romantic effect of the famous Cliff House in California, plans are being made for a hotel at Seal Rock beach, the most beautiful beach on the coast. This modern structure, it is said, will be built upon a rocky promontory now known as Chapman Heights. From the front of the hotel, the bay, the mountains and the city are visible. The hotel will be a complete building, observation towers, rest rooms and reading rooms. If the plans as announced are followed out, Seal Rock beach will be able to boast of an innovation in resort building that will be known over the entire country.

An automobile stage, over the new Elk creek road is about to be run regularly, making Seal Rock beach only an hour further from Portland than Seaside is at present. Stages are now making the trip from Seaside twice a day and every convenience has been provided for tourists, campers and people who always are found at Cannon beach during the summer.

Estacada Line

Summer time is the picnic season, and Estacada and Cazadero are the Mecca and Mecca of picnickers, and thousands of other pleasure seekers as well. Estacada is especially attractive because of its beautiful park and fine hotel. The Estacada and Cazadero train leaves from the east approach of the Morrison street bridge every two hours daily. The distance is 35 miles, and the entire ride is interesting and gives you an excellent idea of the Willamette valley in the vicinity of Portland. You are whisked rapidly through a fine suburban country—grain fields, orchards, blooded stock pastures, berry farms, chicken ranches and stretches of forest. The line runs into "new country," where the land is being cleared for new homes.

The lovely village of Gresham lies 12 miles out, in the midst of the valley. Train service to this point is hourly. It is the center of a splendid farming district, and is also the place of departure for sportsmen seeking the trout of Bull Run creek, that picturesque mountain stream, from the headwaters of which Portland derives its famous water supply. Farming, berry culture, grape growing, vegetable gardening and cherry growing are among the important small farm industries throughout this region.

Some two miles above Estacada we come to Cazadero, at the end of the line. Here the Portland Railway, Light & Power company has worked its modern miracle of transformation by harnessing the turbulent Clackamas to its treadmill, the huge 25,000 horsepower electric plant, soon to be more than exceeded by another plant of 40,000 horsepower to be built by the same company further upstream. More than \$1,000,000 has been spent here, and \$2,500,000
