To swell their fund for meeting the expenses of doctors, medicine, a sick benefit of \$10 a week in cases of illness among members, and in the event of a member's death, a payment of \$1,000 to his beneficiaries, the Brotherhood of Electric Railway Employees will give their third annual picnic at "The Oaks" on Wednesday, July 21.

The Brotherhood of Electric Railway Employees was nominally organized to advance each other's interests and to systematize the manner of assisting the sick and disabled. Before the association's inception nearly every month subscription lists were circulated at the different car barns to aid unfortunate employees, and in event of a death a sum was subscribed for the family thus left without support.

The officials of the company were taken into the brotherhood for the sole purpose of bringing together the different forces of the railway company. The more the operators are interested in the work of moving the public, the better results are to be obtained. In

nearly all cases of reforms in street car service the reforms have started among the carmen. The officials are aware of the underlying principle involved in the unity of forces in handling a public service corporation work, and the company pays into the treasury of the brotherhood an amount equal to one per cent of the total of dues and assessments paid by the members. In addition to this the company gives to the brotherhood the net earnings of "The Oaks" on the 21st of July. The more tickets sold for the picnic day the greater the net sum for the treasury of the brotherhood.

Picnic to Be Attractive.

The picnic should be an attraction not only for those interested in the brotherhood, but also for all who enjoy a good time. FLORENCE KELLY GIVES ADDRESSES

General Secretary Consumers' League to Explain Work.

A series of especially attractive meetings will be held this week for the purpose of arousing interest in the work of the Consumers' League. Mrs. Florence Kelly of New York city, general secretary of the National Consumers' League, arrived in the city last night. Arrangements have been made for Mrs. Kelly to speak at three different churches today and at six meetings during the week. The meetings during the week will be of a semi-social nature, and will be held in different parts of town, so as to enable everyone interested to attend at least one of them.

Friday evening a public meeting, at which the men are especially urged to be present, will be held in the Commercial Club auditorium.

Today Mrs. Kelly will speak first at the Unitarian church, at the morning service, at the Third Presbyterian church at 6:45 in the evening, and at 7:45 at the First Congregational church at Park and Madison streets.

Monday afternoon at 3 o'clock a meeting will be held at the residence of Mrs. O. B. Hallou, 424 Irving street.

Tuesday afternoon the meeting will be at the Portland Heights clubhouse, and Mrs. Walter V. Smith will act as hostess.

Wednesday afternoon the meeting will be especially for the residents of Westmore Heights, and Mrs. R. B. Gamson will open her home for the meeting.

Thursday afternoon the Irvington clubhouse will be the place of meeting, and Mrs. R. L. Sabin will be the hostess.

Friday afternoon Mrs. Milton W. Smith will have the meeting at her home, 135 Curry street. She will be assisted by Mrs. Elmer Colwell.

Mrs. Florence Kelly, who is to be the principal speaker at all of these meetings, is a very widely known. She is not only the recognized authority in America on child labor conditions, but has also made exhaustive investigations of the industrial condition of women in this country. Last year Mrs. Kelly went to Switzerland to attend the International Conference of Consumers' leagues.

Many Portland people remember her for her addresses in the interests of the league during the Charities and Corrections conference at the Lewis and Clark exposition. Mrs. Kelly is a member of the National Child Labor commission, and of the National Woman's Suffrage board. She was for a long time a resident of Hull house in Chicago, and served some years as state factory inspector for Illinois.

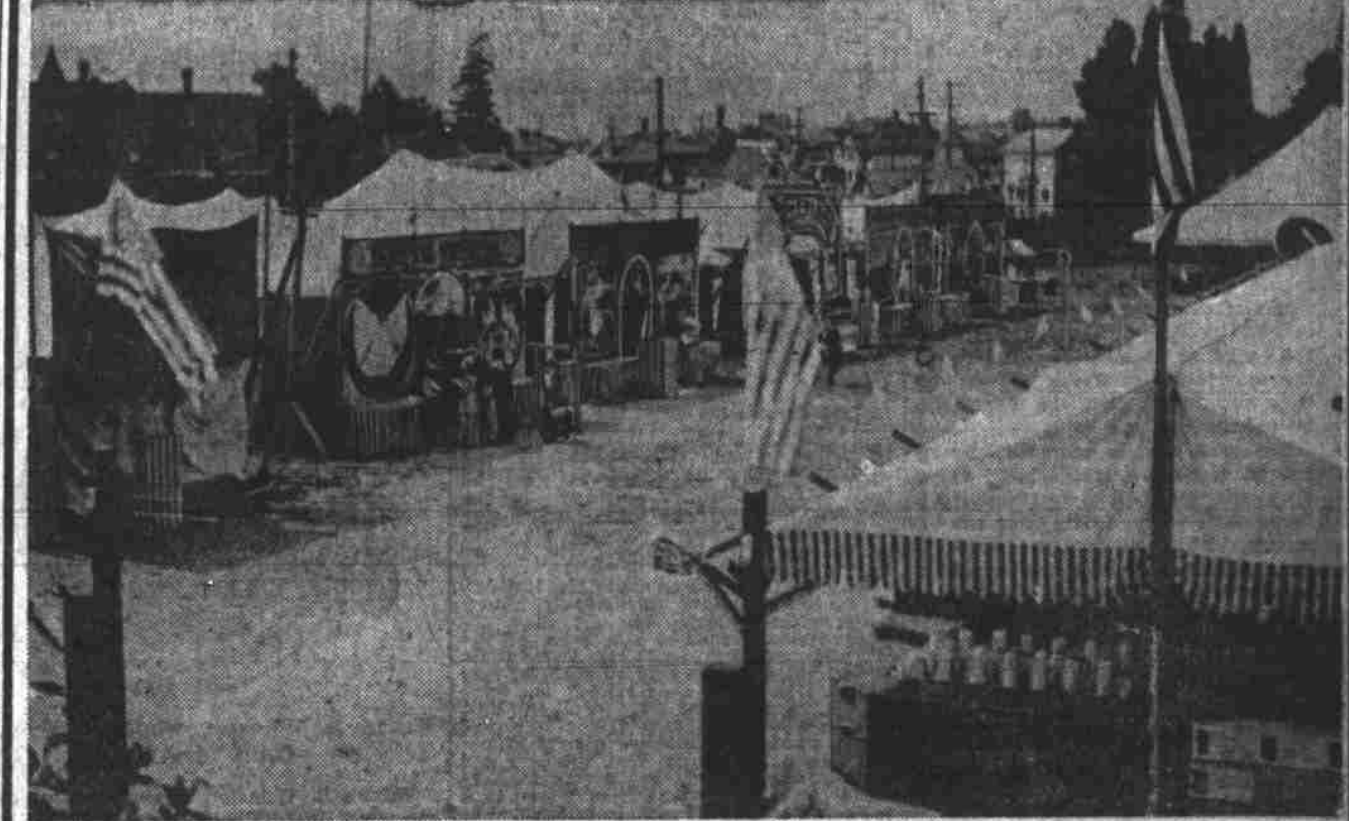
