G. O. P. COVETS OLD DOMINION

Will Go Before People on
Platform of Radical
Rejuvenation.

Washington, July 20.—On the eve of the assembling of the Virginia Republican convention at Newport News there is manifested among the politicians here a lively interest in the situation in the Old Dominion. The convention will name candidates for governor and other state officers to be voted for at the election this fall.

Although Virginia has heretofore been a strong Democratic state, Republican leaders express confidence that conditions are decidedly in their favor, owing to dissensions in the Democratic party. Many well informed politicians declare that the state is ripe for a political revolution.

State expenditures during Governor Swann's administration have already increased without appreciable betterment of conditions, it is charged. The Republican party, therefore, pledges itself to insert a clause in its platform providing for a decrease in state expenditures. Another issue is the appointment of state officials by the governor. The Republicans demand that these 200 or more appointments should be by special act of the legislature reported in the hands of the people, by whom they should be elected at the polls.

Other planks the Republicans will incorporate in their platform are abolition of poll taxes, local option and reform in the tax law. That the platform will be along lines of reform never known to the state is vouchsafed for by party leaders.

Gillespie Can Have Nomination.
A. P. Gillespie of Tazewell, can have the gubernatorial nomination if he will accept it. Mr. Gillespie's strength lies in the fact that he is an able business man, who has achieved partisan politics, and is therefore strong with the independent voters of the state. He is an extensive land owner, which makes him popular with the farmers and stock raisers of the state. He has a large clientele among the coal producers of southwest Virginia, where he is known as a brilliant lawyer. He has never held any political position. It is understood that President Taft has personally urged Gillespie to become the Republican standard bearer in the approaching campaign, and on all sides it is admitted that he would be able to give the Democratic candidate, whether the latter is St. George Tucker or Judge Mann, a hard fight for election. Nevertheless there is much doubt as to whether Mr. Gillespie can be prevailed upon to accept the nomination.

THREE MINUTES FROM BROADWAY

New York and Jersey Cheer
in Unison as McAdoo's
First Train Starts.

(United Press Special Wire.)
New York, July 20.—Three minutes from Broadway! was the cheer that marked the departure of the first regular train through the McAdoo tunnel from Jersey City for Manhattan marking the inauguration of traffic through the \$70,000,000 subway passage.

Jersey City is closer to lower Manhattan than Harlem or the Bronx now, as far as transportation is concerned, and the Jersey commuter who has submitted to taunts and jeers for many long and weary years now may eat his soft boiled eggs in the early morning with some degree of comfort.

The main exercises were held at the city hall in Jersey City, where the addresses were made by Governor Fort of New Jersey, William McAdoo, president of the Hudson and New York Tunnel company, and Charles Jacobs, the chief engineer. A great crowd gathered in front of the city hall at 1 o'clock and the speakers were wildly applauded.

The first trains went under the river at 8 o'clock and the work of years was accomplished.

The subway is now working under the East river, to Brooklyn, and with the Pennsylvania tunnels, which will pass from the Jersey shore under the Hudson, under Manhattan island and under the East river to Long Island, the great fleet of ferriesboats will soon be looked upon as the man in a hurry as relics of the past.

The McAdoo tunnels enter New York at the great Hudson terminal building, which is exactly alike and are connected by bridges and viaducts, taken together form the largest office structure in the world.

The work of building the tunnels has been directed since the beginning by William McAdoo, who was the chief originator of the plan and under whose direction the vast undertaking, involving the expenditure of \$70,000,000, has been carried on.

The connecting link of a new direct route between Berlin and Stockholm, steam train ferry between Samnitz, Germany, and Treleborg, Sweden, will be opened by the Kaiser July 6.
