THE STRANGER WITHIN OUR GATES

"I am representing a syndicate of Rhode Island capitalists who desire to get hold of some land which will raise English walnuts. I have inspected some of the walnut lands in Yamhill county, and will make a report thereon, but I want to visit other sections of the state before returning home. From what I can learn southern Oregon has a wonderful climate, and I expect to go down that way this evening," said Jesse L. Baker at the Imperial today.

"The price of silver were to rise shortly, the states of Nevada, Utah and Idaho progress wonderfully," said Carl D. Williams at the Perkins today. "I own a great deal of mining property in Sonora, N. M., but at most of it is silver property. I can not afford to work the mines. I expect to make

some money from them some day, though."

C. O. Cowell, Keith, Neb.: "I expect that Portland will have a population of 1,000,000 people within 20 years or less. Nothing can stop it. It has the brightest future of any city in the west."

"The elk in Colorado will soon be a thing of the past," said Riley S. Hamilton of Hamilton, Colo., at the Oregon this afternoon. "I live right in the heart of the wildest portion of the state, and I saw but two bands of elk last winter. Usually I see many hundreds. The game warden of our district had to haul hay and feed a herd of elk last winter."

"The only way that prohibition will prohibit is for the government to take a hand by not allowing the manufacture of spirituous liquors," said A. D. Taylor, Peru, Iowa, at the Perkins today. "Just now the government gets a big fat take-off on all whiskey manufactured, and so long as people are protected by this government they will not stop making the stuff. And for that reason many people feel that what is good for the

government is good for them, and so they drink it."

"To most Wisconsin people La Follette is a sort of a god—that is to all except the members of the machine. We are proud of him, and consider him about the most brilliant man in the United States today," said H. Q. Stewart, Denfield, Wis., at the Imperial.

"The population of the state of Indiana has doubled within the past eight years, I am told," said D. A. Eldoran, Shelbyville, Ind., at the Nortonia today. "The state is experiencing a great wave of prosperity that seems to be lasting and makes everyone feel good to know that he is alive."

"I am ashamed to confess it," said A. H. Metcalf, Mendon, Mo., "but I came to Oregon to buy an orange grove. I never knew that you didn't raise oranges here. In fact, I always believed that you did. But I am not the only one. I think everybody in our town believes the same thing. The local paper spoke about it when I left."

"I can say emphatically that polygamy is not practiced in Utah," said Charles Hansen, Kanosh, Utah, at the

St. Charles today. "I have lived in Utah for 23 years, and I am in touch with conditions. The report that there are some men yet who live with a dozen or more wives has no foundation whatever."

Myron Crawford, Portland, Maine: "I just simply came here to see Portland. I wanted to see how your Portland compared with ours. My, but this is a fine city. Finer than I ever suspected. Do you know, the people of Portland, Maine, have no idea that this Portland is such a city? I am certainly proud of our town's namesake."

THOUSANDS WANT RESERVATION LAND

Over 20,000 people are each engaged in the mad scramble for a quarter section of government land now going on at Spokane, Coeur d'Alene and Missoula, according to the report brought back by a resident of Portland who went up into the northern country believing that it would be an easy matter to get a homestead on one of the Indian reservations recently thrown open for allings. From the same authority it was learned that almost every person in the Spokane country had registered and that

thousands are still daily pouring into that country for the purpose of registering. For most of them the trip will be no more than an outing as there are not above 4000 agricultural claims in all the territory to be homesteaded, a vast percentage of the country being only fit for grazing purposes, and not first class grazing land at that. Most of those registering for the drawing had from west of the Rocky mountains, although every state in the union is said to be represented in the throng of homestead seekers.

WELL-KNOWN WOMAN PASSES AWAY

Mrs. Sophia Markell, wife of William R. Markell, died Tuesday night at the home of their son, W. H. Markell, on the east side. The funeral took place at 1:30 this afternoon from the house. Mrs. Markell is survived by her husband and six sons, three of whom are in the east, and the other three, W. H. Markell in Portland, Gordon Markell at Springbrook, Or., and Willis Markell at

Pleasant Home. Mrs. Markell was born in Cornwall, Conn., April 20, 1825. She was married there to Mr. Markell and remained there till 18 years ago when they came west to make their home. For the past three years they have lived with their son.
