

ACT OF AVENGER STARTS A FEUD

Brothers of Cecil Thayer
Carry Guns for Wil-
liam C. Mitchell.

(United Press Leased Wire.)
Los Angeles, July 22.—A jury declared innocent of murder by a jury after shooting to death his sister's betrayer, William C. Mitchell, in preparation to protect himself from the vengeance of his victim's brothers, who are alleged to have sworn to shoot him on sight.
Mitchell shot and killed Cecil Thayer and was brought to trial twice for the act. His jury disagreed at the first trial and yesterday he was acquitted of murder. Last night the Mitchells gathered to celebrate the acquittal. Festivities were at their height when word came of the threats of Thayer's brothers.
Lights were extinguished, the joy making ceased and preparations for defense were started. Ansel J. Mitchell, father of William, formerly lived in Arizona, where he was a small armory of weapons.
The Thayer brothers have also gun men, the elder Nash, having served with distinction in the United States army in the Philippines. He is regarded among particularly bitter over the freedom given Mitchell.
So alarmed have attorneys for Mitchell become that an appeal for protection for their client was made to the district attorney last night.
"It looks to me as if the verdict of this jury is very likely to start a family feud," said Deputy District Attorney North. "It has been reported to this office that threats were made by the brothers of the deceased that if William Mitchell should escape justice as a result of his trial for murder they would shoot him on sight. If an other murder trial should be necessary it would not be a strange coincidence if some of the same jurymen were called upon to pass upon the guilt or innocence of the slayer of William Mitchell."
If any evidence can be presented to this office, however, concerning the threats reported to have been made, immediate action will be taken to prevent the proper parties under bonds to keep the peace.

WIND BLOWS TRAINS OFF TRACKS

been blown off the tracks. One train was wrecked near Corpus Christi and a number of passengers killed, according to the advices received. The exact number of dead is not known.

Storm Kills Five Hours.
Another train on the San Antonio and Aransas Pass railroad is reported to have been blown off the tracks at Luling, near Yoakum.

The storm raged five hours and was the worst in years. It uprooted trees and tore roofs from buildings. This city suffered heavily but no estimate of the amount of damage has been received.

Communication with Galveston was again severed and nothing is known of the damage done and the extent of the storm. From the fact that waves were piled over the high breakwater by the first storm it is feared that more water was driven into the streets by the second. It is not thought, however, that there is any danger of the sea wall having given away, after the way in which it withstood the waves yesterday.

Wires Are Carried Away.
The storm extended north from the Gulf of Mexico. Towns in the Colorado river valley between here and the coast suffered greatly but no lives were reported lost in any of them, according to early advices received here. Communication with the surrounding country is intermittent, the wires having been wrecked by the gale, and it will probably be some time before details of the damage are known.

Reports already received indicate that much damage was done at Hallettsville, Yoakum, Rosenberg and La Grange.

SEA WALL SAVES GALVESTON CITY FROM DESTRUCTION

Galveston is safe, saved by the seawall constructed by George W. Boschke, now located in Portland as chief engineer for the Harriman lines in the northwest. From Mayor Lewis Fisher of Galveston, Mr. Boschke received a telegram this morning saying (as written yesterday):

"Severe storm here today. The seawall constructed by you proved entirely satisfactory."
Mr. Boschke received a telegram almost at the same time from a Galveston friend confirming Mayor Fisher's statement and adding: "I congratulate you on the splendid work done in Galveston."

"Galveston's seawall was completed in 1904. Had it not been for its presence the city might have been completely destroyed."

CLAD IN NIGHT ROBE WIFE IS DRIVEN FROM HOME, SHE DECLARES

Columbia, Wash., July 22.—The sheriff's office was notified today that W. R. Gregg, a former Endicott saloonkeeper, Tuesday night drove his wife from home and threatened to kill her if she attempted to return. The woman took refuge at the home of Justice Marsh of Endicott. Deputy Sheriff Rotan and Prosecutor Chamberlain left this morning to investigate the charges against Gregg.
In conversation with the sheriff's office by telephone, Mrs. Gregg claimed that her husband before driving her from home took all her money from her and refused to allow her to get her clothes, compelling her to leave the house clad in her night robe, and that for this reason she could not appear before the authorities personally.

BENSON ANNOUNCES MINOR APPOINTMENTS

Salem, Or., July 22.—Governor Benson announced a number of minor appointments before taking the train for the south yesterday afternoon. Reid of Ice and F. J. Motz of Baker City were appointed members of the state board of veterinarians. Tax Commissioner Charles V. Galloway was appointed a delegate to the next international conference on state and local taxation, which is to be held at Louisville, Ky., September 21 to 24. I. H. Bingham of Eugene, and Frederick W. Mulkey of Portland, were also appointed delegates to the taxation congress.

The present personnel of the state text book commission is retained by the appointment yesterday of all the present members of the board for another term. They are P. L. Campbell, president of the commission, Eugene; Editor H. W. Scott of Portland; C. A. Johns, Baker City; W. M. Colvig of Medford; and State Senator M. A. Miller of Lebanon.

NOT A CENT HAD FINANCIER FOR FARE

New York, July 22.—New York's kings of finance, in banks, stocks and bonds, but most of them carry very little cash.

B. F. Yoakum, president of the Rock Island system, has a check for \$100,000 in his pocket, but he has no cash. He could not find a cent and no acquaintance was there to make him a loan. Returning to his office, Mr. Yoakum said to his secretary:

"Go buy me 1000 subway tickets and see that they are put in every pocket or every suit of clothes I have."

WOMEN'S BUREAU SAVES MANY GIRLS

An account of the work of the women's auxiliary to the police department is given today in a report filed with the chief of police by Mrs. Lola G. Baldwin. She declares that this work has passed the experimental stage and while she is not leading in crusades, the object is to make a safe path for the feet of the girls by investigating possible pitfalls, employment agencies, lodging houses, restaurants where liquor is sold and places of public amusement.
During the month 273 new cases were handled, and 134 young women were extended further aid. Fifty-five pitfalls were investigated and 45 lodging houses. Investigation is now being made of a list of 26 Frenchmen, many of whom have no visible means of support, who are believed to have some part in the white slave trade.

Youths Returned to Portland.
