

GIBBONS IS 75 YEARS OLD TODAY

His Natural Force Unabated
—Sketch of Career of a Beloved Ecclesiast.

Gibbons' Life Journey.
Born in Baltimore on July 23, 1834, of Irish parents.
Ordained a priest June 6, 1861, by Archbishop Patrick Kenrick.
Was appointed coadjutor, with the right of succession, to Archbishop Bayley of Baltimore, May 20, 1877.
Was installed as archbishop at the Baltimore cathedral on February 10, 1878.
Received the red hat of the cardinalate from Pope Leo XIII, March 17, 1887.
Celebrated his silver jubilee as archbishop on February 10, 1903.

Baltimore, July 23.—Apparently in unimpaired health and as strong as he was 20 years ago Cardinal Gibbons today reached his seventy-fifth birthday anniversary. In accordance with the rules and traditions of the Roman Catholic hierarchy the event was not marked on the occasion of any special celebration or observance of a public nature, but hundreds of letters and telegrams of congratulation from distinguished persons in all parts of the country bore witness to the fact that the venerable primate of the Roman Catholic church in the United States has many friends and admirers throughout the land, who did not fail to remember this memorable day in the life of the cardinal.

Biographical.
Cardinal Gibbons was born in Baltimore, of Irish parents, on July 23, 1834. While he was still a boy James Gibbons was taken to Ireland by his father, where he received the elements of a liberal education. On his return to America he entered St. Charles college, Maryland, from which he graduated with distinction in 1857. He then entered St. Mary's seminary, Baltimore, and after the usual course of philosophy and theology was ordained a priest on June 6, 1861, by the late Archbishop Kenrick. He immediately entered upon the duties of his calling, serving first as assistant to the late Rev. James Dolan, rector of St. Patrick's church, and afterward as the pastor of St. Bridget's church, Canton.

High Administrative Ability.
A few years after his transfer to St. Bridget's he was elected by the late Archbishop Spalding as his private secretary, and on August 16, 1868, was consecrated at the cathedral, bishop of Adirondack in Parishville, New York, and vicar apostolic of North Carolina. He remained four years in North Carolina and displayed such remarkable administrative abilities that on the death of Bishop McGill he was translated to Richmond, Va., where he was in-

stalled bishop by the late Archbishop Bayley on October 20, 1872.
His administration in Richmond was marked by almost immediate revival of religious interest, and by practical results of the most important character. In the course of five years several new churches were erected, and St. Peter's cathedral, male academy and parochial school were founded. By his energy also St. Joseph's female orphan asylum was enlarged, a parochial school for boys and girls was established at Petersburg, and one at Portsmouth for girls.

Cardinal in 1887.
On the 20th of May, 1877, he was appointed coadjutor with the right of succession to the late Archbishop James Roosevelt Bayley of Baltimore. He was installed archbishop at the cathedral February 10, 1878. On March 17, 1887, he received the red hat of the cardinalate from Pope Leo XIII, having previously been invested with the insignia of the office at the Baltimore cathedral. On May 20 of the same year he took possession of his titular church in Rome and, when he returned from Rome on June 17, 1887, he was welcomed in Baltimore by one of the largest and most enthusiastic public demonstrations ever witnessed in the city.

As Educator and Author.
Cardinal Gibbons was one of the founders of the Catholic university and is its chancellor. His influence at the Vatican has always been great, and it is said that his representations have been the cause of the pope's famous encyclicals on the labor question relative to the popular government in the United States.
As an author Cardinal Gibbons holds a high rank in the literature of his church, and his "Faith of Our Fathers" is regarded by eminent scholars and divines of every creed as a masterpiece of logic and literary attainments. With all his learning and attainments Cardinal Gibbons is one of the most modest and unassuming of men and is beloved not only by the priests in his charge, but by the people of all classes, who venerate him for his kindness, charity and truly democratic affability.

TACOMA PROMISED PLACE ON THE MAP

Tacoma, Wash., July 23.—As the result of activity on the part of the commercial bodies here Robert Lee, agent of the Harriman lines, has secured from General Passenger Agent Lomax the promise that hereafter Tacoma will appear on the maps published by the Union and Southern Pacific companies in advertisements and elsewhere. The map to which objection was made appeared in an eastern paper and showed other northwestern cities but not Tacoma.

Christian Traveling Men.
St. Louis, Mo., July 23.—St. Louis is entertaining for three days a large and notable gathering of commercial travelers, who have assembled from all parts of the country for the annual national convention of Gideons. The organization is composed of "Christian traveling men" and its aim is to promote the spiritual and moral welfare of the great army of men engaged as commercial travelers in America. The business of the convention will occupy two days and will be followed on Sunday with special religious services in several of the local churches, the pulpits of which will be occupied by prominent speakers among the delegates.

After Lackawanna Officials.
Norwich, N. J., July 23.—Several of the most prominent executive officials of the Lackawanna railroad have been summoned to appear in court here tomorrow to answer to the charge of violating the law that a railroad company must pay its employees twice each month. The complaint is made by the state department of labor on the affidavits of a number of local employees, who testified that they pay for the first 15 days of June was not received until July 10.

CAPTAIN CONBOY DOWN AND OUT

Dismissed for Drunkenness
With a Worse Charge
Against Him.

San Francisco, July 23.—Police Captain Michael Joseph Conboy, who wound up a quarter of a century of service on the local force by shooting Bernard Lagan Jr., June 23, while intoxicated, was officially dismissed from the force at 2 o'clock this morning when the board of police commissioners returned a verdict of guilty on a charge of intoxication. Conboy was represented by counsel at the board's meeting. He declined to discuss the verdict, which was unanimous.

After an evening alleged to have been spent at downtown cafes celebrating the birth of a grandchild, Conboy was found in an alleged helpless condition at 1:30 o'clock in the morning by Lagan and a friend. Lagan claimed that he assisted the officer to his feet and as a reward for his service was called a vile name.
According to George Greenwood, Lagan's companion, the young man walked back to the officer to demand an apology, whereupon Conboy drew his revolver and fired.
Lagan was taken to a hospital, where for several weeks he hovered between life and death. It was feared that if he lived he would be a lifelong paralytic.

Conboy was arrested, later being admitted to bail.
His hearing by the police commission was preliminary to the hearing of criminal charges pending against him as a result of the shooting.
The testimony of witnesses before the commission last night differed noticeably. Several witnesses stated on the stand that the police captain was sober when he left the Odeon cafe, immediately before the shooting.

ARGENTINA GYPSIES FIGHT DEPORTATION

New York, July 23.—Desperately resisting the squad of police detailed to place them aboard the steamer Verdi, on which they were to be deported, 24 gypsies created a riot in the streets of Brooklyn.
Though the men of the party were supplied plentifully with money, the authorities passed judgment that they were non-producers and decreed that they be returned to Buenos Ayres on the Verdi.

The fight was renewed when the party was placed aboard a tug to be transferred to the waiting steamer. The gypsies seized babies from the arms of their women, and using them as shields or clubs, tried to drive back the officers and take possession of the tug.
The officers were compelled to draw their clubs and many of the frenzied foreigners were beaten to the ground. The injured were cared for by the surgeon of the Verdi.

PROPORTIONAL RATES ORDERED ABOLISHED

Salem, July 23.—An order has been made by the state railroad commission directing the Oregon Railway & Navigation company to abolish the proportional rates which have been in effect on the Willows extension of the Elgin branch since the new extension has been

in operation. The matter had been taken up on the complaint of the Commercial club of Enterprise.

The order will affect class rates alone, and not rates in wool or livestock. The order sets forth that rates on wool are fixed on a basis of interstate traffic almost entirely, and that therefore little complaint can be made because proportionate rates were added to through rates.

The same conditions apply to the rates on livestock. The commission holds that not enough livestock has been shipped to make a sufficient test of the conditions, and therefore the commission expresses no opinion as to the reasonableness of rates on wool and livestock.
It has been the practice of the railroad company to apply through rates on all shipments destined to points on the Willows extension beyond Elgin.
The railroad commission has also made an order reducing rates from 25 cents to 20 cents per hundred pounds on freight of the first class on the Astoria & Columbia River railroad, between Seaside and Astoria, as the result of a complaint filed by Alex Gilbert of Seaside. Smaller reductions were made on other lines of freight to points west of Astoria from that city.

May Lose Crops at Nampa.

Nampa, Idaho, July 23.—The Ridebaugh canal leading to this section from the Boise river, one of the largest and oldest canals of the Boise valley, has had two serious breaks during the past two weeks that has caused a delay each time in the water service to the farmers under that canal which has well-nigh caused a total failure of crops for this season. The last break in the canal occurred the later part of last week and the repair has not yet been completed, so that no water is forthcoming to the crops under the canal. The canal serves about 35,000 acres of land, much of which is in alfalfa and sugar beets. Unless the water is available within the next few days a total failure of sugar beets will occur and the second crop of alfalfa will be a loss. Twenty-five hundred inches of water has been turned into the canal from the government feeder canal for the Deer Flat reservoir, but it is only a drop for the big area and will do but little good.
As large a force of men and teams as can work are employed to hasten the repair of the washed out canal embank-

ment and it is anticipated that water may be available again within a few days, but it must come quickly or the heaviest loss that has occurred in this section for many years will be the result.
