ALBERT RYAN'S SECOND VICTIM

Otto Miller, on Whom He Sought Vengeance for In-sults, Dies of Wounds.

Los Angeles, July 23.—The death roll resulting from the random attack made by Albert Ryan, an organizer for the Western Federation of Miners, on several men in a local hotel a week ago was increased early today by the death of Otto Miller, the man who precipitated Ryan's attack.
Ryan claimed at the time of the shooting that he was struck and kicked by Miller. He also said he had taken a few drinks to drown the memory of the disgrace and that after brooding over the matter he decided to renew the quarrel.
Ryan came upon Miller in the United States hotel. He pulled a revolver and at the first shot H. E. Snyder, a bystander, fell dead. Miller then received three bullets, and Manuel Lopez, another bystander, fell seriously but not mortally wounded.
Ryan was charged with the murder of Snyder and it is probable that an additional charge for the death of Miller will be brought against him.
