Hansen was removed to the Good Samaritan hospital late yesterday afternoon, as his condition was reported as serious. He at once accused Morrison.

Railroad Failed to Feed Stock.—The Southern Pacific company yesterday pleaded guilty to violation of the 25 hour stock law and was fined \$200 in circuit court. The case came to court on this effect having been reached between the prosecution and counsel for the railroad. The 25-hour law provides for feeding and watering of stock in transit at least every 25 hours.

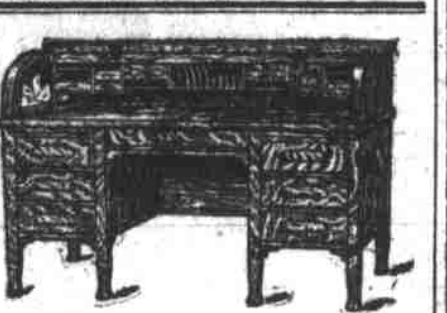
