Dedicatory Services of Bishop Morris Memorial Held Yesterday Morning.

The memorial chapel, in the new addition to the Good Samaritan hospital, which was erected to the memory of the late Bishop Morris, was dedicated yesterday morning by Bishop Morris. The service was held at 10 o'clock and was attended by Rev. Barr G. Lee and Rev. W. R. Powell, Rev. Barr G. Lee delivered the dedicatory sermon.

The service was held at 3 o'clock. Bishop Scadding conducted the service and the Rev. W. R. Powell, chaplain of the hospital, was in charge of the choir. The Rev. Barr G. Lee of Salem preached the sermon. The bishop in his remarks said that the entire hospital is in a sense a memorial to Bishop Morris, to whom the hospital was dedicated. It was especially fitting that the chapel should be formally dedicated to his memory.

One part of the work that was very close to Bishop Morris' heart was the care of children. Three children's coats were endowed in his lifetime, and in the new wing there is a children's ward, a memorial of Dr. Rodney Glessan. Now a beginning is being made in the endowment of a fourth cot, to be called the "newspaper" cot. The offering was for that purpose.

The bishop called attention to the newness of the chapel, which will all be memorials. "Part of these have already been promised and are expected soon." The chapel has a seating capacity of 150 persons. SCARLET FEVER CASES DECREASING FAST
The scarlet fever scourge, which ran into hundreds of cases in May and June, is fast being brought under control. It is the statement of Dr. C. H. Wheeler, the city health officer, who is making a special effort to trace down the source of each infectious case reported and thus to keep the number of cases at a minimum.

There are now four cases of smallpox in one family at Woodlawn, two cases on Thurman street and one at the post-house. The Thurman street patients will probably be fumigated and discharged tomorrow.

Dr. Wheeler says that the way of his office in dealing with infectious diseases will be to keep cases under observation and to trace back in every possible case, to the origin of the disease. He does not believe in the policy of quarantining whole households as soon as one case appears. Equally good results can be accomplished by isolating those affected and keeping close watch on the others, adopting meantime such precautions and preventatives as the circumstances demand.

HEAVY RAIN DIGS HOLES IN FILL

New Work on East Morrison Washed Out by Sudden Torrent.

Last night's heavy rain, together with a heavy pressure put upon the fill on East Morrison at Eighth street in the shape of a temporary trestle of the Pacific Bridge company, caused a big portion of the fill to slide about 10:30 last night, carrying out a portion of the sidewalk and endangering the foundation of the Montgomery rooming house. Several hundred yards of gravel will be required to fill up the hole.

A small river of water rushed down upon the place where the break in the fill occurred from the street above and from the drain pipes leading from the roof of the rooming house.

The last leg of a trestle being used for dump trains in filling East Eighth street was placed on the side of the fill and the water hitting just above the spot where the trestle had weakened the nose too strong gravel fill, caused the weakened portion to give way and slide into the slough.
