NEWPORT TO VOTE FOR WATER WORKS

(Special Dispatch to The Journal.)

Newport, Or., July 27.—An amendment to the charter of the city of Newport, authorizing the common council to issue bonds to the amount of \$50,000 to construct a water system will be submitted to the voters of the city Friday, July 30. The proposed water supply has been measured and found adequate for the present needs and for the future growth of the city for many years. An analysis of the water proves it to be of the purest. The reservoir at the intake of the springs will be protected by elevated to give a practical pressure for fire protection. There is but little doubt that the voters will endorse the amendment and authorize the city to issue the bonds and construct the waterworks. At the time the water supply was measured and the elevations taken a petition was circulated among the citizens to ascertain their views. As over 85 per cent of all the voters signed the petition favoring a water system it would seem that it was already assured. If the bond proposition carries the council intends to let a contract at once for the construction of the works and it is thought that the city will be supplied with an abundance of pure water by July, 1910.

Virginia Republicans.

Newport News, Va., July 27.—Many delegates and visitors are arriving in Newport News to attend the Republican state convention, which will be called to order at 11 o'clock tomorrow morning to nominate candidates for governor and other state officers to be voted for at the election next November. For the first time in the history of the Republican party in Virginia the leaders believe they have some show of electing their state ticket, as a result of the split in the Democratic ranks. Several prominent Republicans are being boomed for the head of the ticket and it is possible there may be lively contests in the convention before the choice is decided. It is understood that the platform will advocate state wide prohibition in opposition to the Democratic platform of local option.

Texas Farmers' Congress.

College Station, Texas, July 27.—The great annual gathering of Texas farmers, fruit growers, nut growers, nurserymen, horticulturists, swine breeders, etc., opened here today, and the town is crowded with delegates and visitors from all parts of the state. The various conventions are held in the extensive building of the Agricultural and Mechanical college of Texas, which is large enough to accommodate even the record crowd assembled this year. Most of the conventions will last through the week and for each an interesting and elaborate program has been arranged. Among the speakers who have consented to address the various gatherings are some of the best known authorities on their respective subjects.
