

COW TALKS ARE PRINTED IN BOOK

State Dairy Association Issues Interesting Data on Industry in State.

The Oregon State Dairy association has put out its annual report, which gives many valuable hints to those engaged in the dairy industry. Copies may be secured free by addressing the secretary of the association, Salem, Or. The publication contains the report of the proceedings at the 1908 convention in Salem, which had the largest attendance of any of these conventions.

The convention was held under the auspices of the Salem board of trade, and the address of welcome as given by August Hunkeler, president of the Salem Business Men's league, is published. The response was made by F. L. Kent, president of the dairy association. Both spoke briefly of the great resources in Oregon for this branch of work, and Mr. Kent told of the progress made within the last few years. An interesting discussion on the care of dairy cows followed.

By T. J. Furedor, president, then read a paper on "Food Problems in Oregon." Dr. E. N. Hutchinson of the United States Bureau of Animal Industry, spoke of "Tuberculosis in cattle," a cattle disease, with some valuable hints on the best way to fight it. J. Bailey, dairy and food commissioner, spoke on "Dairy Legislation." C. H. Fraser of the Corvallis Creamery company, on "An Appeal to Better Quality of Butter." Mrs. J. O. Yankum, retiring secretary of the dairy association, on "Dairying and Advertising." Mr. J. O. Yankum, on "Quality of Butter." Mrs. J. O. Yankum, on "Need for Improvement in Milk Production." Paul V. Maris, on "Cow Testing Association."

A resume is given of the business of the convention and the awards made. The discussions are given in full.

THAW REPLIES TO JEROME'S THRUSTS

"Because they found me not guilty," retorted Thaw somewhat sharply. "Then, after recrossing his legs, the defendant continued with his explanation that he thought his acquittal was the result of counsel for both sides being told that he was suffering from delusion at the time he shot White."

Force of "Noblesse Oblige."

"Do you understand noblesse oblige prevailing among gentlemen?" was Jerome's next question.

Thaw answered "Yes," and the prosecutor asked:

"Would you, having committed an act which you are called upon as a gentleman to perform, consent to subornation of lying by your counsel to escape the consequences of your act?"

"By no means," quickly replied the witness.

Replying to further questions, Thaw said that he had studied hypnotism a little prior to his marriage, but was not much interested in it. He said he thought his wife, Evelyn, was hypnotically influenced by Stanford White. White certainly exercised a strong influence over her.

He said he had taken little interest in Anthony Comstock's anti-vices crusades since his arrest.

LASHED YOUNG GIRL WITH WHIP AND ACTED INSANE

White Plains, N. Y., July 28.—A new chapter of sensation in the past history of Harry K. Thaw was opened by District Attorney Jerome yesterday in the latest stage of his long fight to bring the young Pittsburgh millionaire to the asylum for the criminally insane, when he introduced Susan Merrill, a New York lodging housekeeper, who alleged that she had been whipped by Thaw. He denied Jerome's insinuations about perverted practices at Harvard.

The Merrill woman yesterday said that Thaw frequently rented rooms at her house and brought young girls there and flogged them.

Throughout the time he was on the stand Thaw whispered explanations of his testimony to Justice Mills, showing his little about Jerome's opinion.

In the course of the questioning it was brought out that Thaw had been in the role of "Raid," it was alleged, conducted a fake theatrical agency for the purpose of taking girls to her house, where she said she lashed them unmercifully with a whip.

The whip was offered in evidence and it was clear that Thaw and his counsel were surprised and somewhat stunned by the new turn in the case.

Revelations a Surprise.

The revelation of an unknown period in the history of the prisoner, whose life has been traced over and over, day by day, in trial and lunacy inquests, came as a surprise to everyone present.

In the role of "Raid," it was alleged, by the witness, Thaw practiced orgies upon the girls victims of his "theatrical agency" in order to satiate an unnatural desire to witness their suffering. She alleged that through her Thaw paid out different sums, aggregating many thousands, in order to purchase silence from his victims and "keep his folks in Pittsburgh from finding out about it."

Jerome Backs Theory.

This testimony was in line with previous efforts of Jerome to prove that Thaw was a flagellant. In the trials of his case for the killing of Stanford White, it was alleged that Thaw whipped Evelyn Nesbit Thaw while they were traveling in Europe, raising welts on her bare back.

The role of "Mr. Reid," the theatrical agent, and the story of the alleged syndicate of girls in New York, however, was a bombshell for Thaw's counsel evidently was not prepared.

Mrs. Thaw Cynical.

Evelyn Nesbit Thaw sat through the testimony of the witness, with a cynical smile. It is believed that she gave Jerome aid in the preparation of the present case. When the witness told of a "Mrs. Reid" who accompanied Thaw during the period of the "theatrical agency" venture, she was asked a question by counsel for the state.

Jerome showed today, as seldom before, how determined he is to carry his case against Thaw to the end and to prevent his release from custody under any new twist in the case if he can help it.

Not Afraid of Thaw.

It has been said that Jerome is afraid Thaw will kill him if released, but at this Jerome smiles, saying that he is merely doing his duty in protecting the public against a "dangerous maniac."

NORWEGIAN BARK ORLEANS IS LOST

(United Press Special Wire.)

Victoria, B. C., July 28.—The British steamer Maritima, which has just arrived here from Australia, brings news of the loss of the Norwegian bark Orleans, with seven of her crew, while bound for the Seychelle islands for Dunedee. After the crew of 14 had worked for five days at the pumps the Orleans was abandoned 300 miles off the west coast of Tasmania.

For 12 days the survivors suffered terrible hardships in an open boat, finally reaching MacQuarrie Head, Tasmania, where Captain Lindstedt reported the loss of seven shipmates who perished in a second lifeboat at the time the Orleans was abandoned. The boats kept company for 11 days and then were separated by a storm.

The survivors were in a pitiable condition from exposure and hunger when they reached MacQuarrie Head.

"Fullman City" at Spokane.

MRS. COLLINS PLEADS WILDLY

Mrs. Collins ever be tried on a criminal charge.

It was she, so it is declared, who took a young woman friend to Dr. Charles Friable, Dr. Collins' friend, for treatment for throat trouble. On one or two occasions during Dr. Friable's absence from the city Dr. Collins had charge of the former's practice. In this way, Dr. Friable says, Dr. Collins became acquainted with Miss Pollard and her young woman friend, who is spoken of as the other woman in the case, and who will also be called as a witness should the case go to criminal trial.

Dr. Friable Enters Denial.

Dr. Friable, who is unquestionably the man hinted at by Mrs. Collins' friends as being overzealous in bounding a poor woman who was driven insane by her troubles, denies any such "enthusiasm" on his part. He also denies that either Miss Pollard, "her friend," will be mixed up in the case.

"It is not fair to Miss Pollard or any of my patients to drag their names into this case. They do not care for this notoriety—it hurts them and they don't want it."

Dr. Friable, who has been a friend with his family, of Mrs. Collins for years, Mrs. Collins often visited at his home, and her daughter, Mrs. Gertrude Garber, of Fisher's Landing, Or., upon her visits to Portland, spent her time at the Willis home. Dr. Friable has been spoken of as acting as Mrs. Collins' attorney in her present trouble, but said today that though with interest in the case not as a paid representative, but as a friend of long standing and a friend only.

Will Have Attorneys.

"When the time comes," he said, "I shall be able to represent Mrs. Collins. She has too many friends, good and true, for her to be deserted at this time. She has no money left but I will see to it that she is properly represented."

Dr. Friable was emphatic in this statement.

"There is no question but that Mrs. Collins is insane, and was insane for weeks before the shooting. She came to my office a week before she shot and from her conversation then that she contemplated committing suicide. She spoke of a number of times about going away. I did not know she had the Sladen home to look after I would go right away, meaning that she would leave her home."

"She was brooding over her marital difficulties. She said Collins had gone through with what little money she had saved after years of dreaming that now he had confessed to her that he did not love her, that instead he loved a little actress that was now in New York."

Contemplated Suicide.

"Mrs. Collins moaned and rambled in her talk and I was satisfied then that unless something was done she would attempt suicide. I tried to persuade her to go to her daughter's home, but she refused to go. Her mind weakened several years ago and I knew it had become a danger to her. My wife and I left that night for Seattle to visit the fair. I returned to Portland last Friday, the day before the shooting. I found Mrs. Collins and her daughter in the city. I went to the next day to Mrs. Collins and induced her to go with me to Fisher's home. I was thinking of calling her when the cries of the newboys on the street told of the accident."

Dr. Friable does not speak of the shooting as "murder."

Continuing, he said:

"Mrs. Collins worked at dressmaking almost up to week ago. She is refined, hard working woman, and one I would call a friend. When she married Dr. Collins she had perhaps \$2000. I know all she has left is 20 acres of land near Fisher's Landing."

Mrs. Collins Very Sick.

Mrs. Collins did not rest well last night. She rolled and tumbled and moaned most of the night but early this morning slept some. As she lay on her cot this afternoon, attired in a calico wrapper, a substitute for a nightgown, she looked more like a figure than a living, breathing body. Her hands lay on the white sheet like pieces of transparent wax. One spoke to did she show any life, and then for but an instant.

"There are three gentlemen watching her as many shifts. J. C. Gill, Marsh and Virgil. This morning she requested Officer Gill to 'Please don't let any one in to see me. I am tired and hurt and Roy is not with me. Where is Roy?—why does he not come to me?'"

A few minutes later she asked, "Won't you please remove your staff?—it shines so—I don't like it—Roy, I spoke to you, why did you not serve with an elaborate lunch at noon."

ONE RAILROAD AND PERHAPS TWO WILL BE BUILT

(Special Dispatch to The Journal.)

The Dalles, Or., July 28.—When the smoke shall have cleared away the people of Oregon will likely be surprised to find that the railroad activity along the Deschutes river is a reality, that the bluster and fuss has been made to gain temporary advantage until active construction work could be started.

A railroad, or perhaps two roads, will be built up the Deschutes. Harriman is quite certain to build one, and there is no difference of opinion as to the Hill interests being behind the struggle of Porter brothers for right of way privileges.

Despite the fact that the Harriman interests make light of the efforts of Hill to secure the right of way in a section heretofore bottled up by Harriman, there is every indication that the feeling is one of intense interest instead of careless indifference, or else the effort to force construction trains over the Oregon Railroad & Navigation company's line with right of track over passenger trains is a joke. Railroads seldom crowd trains unless there is some reason behind the move. If Porter brothers alone were behind the activity in the Deschutes country the Harriman interests would be wise enough to allow the trick to pass without any alarm or the expenditure of any needless money.

It is reported here that John F. Stevens, one of the construction engineers of the Hill line, is in charge of the work of Porter brothers, this fact giving further force to the fact that Hill is behind the right of way fight along the Deschutes. Stevens has done a great deal of work in the northwest and is as familiar with conditions in Oregon as any engineer in the country. Perhaps this is the reason he was assigned to direct the work when troublesome times were anticipated.

Shipments of tools, men and horses came to arrive Campa and being struck, quarters provided for men and animals with the apparent intention of maintaining them for some time and every indication points to the fact that work will begin in earnest very soon.

Considerable quantities of supplies are arriving daily at Grand Dalles, considerable quantities of lumber are being floated across the river to this place to be forwarded to the front by team. As day passes without any mail being brought powder across the river, the ferry boat not being licensed to carry such material, the steamer Bay Gatzert brought 35 laborers here for the railroad camps on the Deschutes, and about 50 came by the steamer Dalles City.
