

WARD HAD ACCESS TO BREWSTER'S HOME

OF LARSEN'S COUPLED FOR

PORTLAND

Well Dressed Stranger Arrested for Robbing Brewster, Who Aided Him.

A. L. Gray, well dressed, giving his age as 24 years, and his home as North Bond, Or., was arrested on a charge of robbing the person of the first man on complaint of George Brewster, a young student who has been working at the University of Oregon since the examination in municipal court and was held to the grand jury under \$500 bonds. Brewster, who gives his home as 124 and 126, told him he was "broke" yesterday so he lent him a dollar and told him he could share his room at 624 1/2 Sixth street.

Gray, he says, then left to go to Oregon city and returned at midnight, awoke him and later left the room. When Brewster awoke himself a few minutes later he found that between \$10 and \$15 which he had placed in a pocketbook under his pillow had been taken. This he said was a \$10 bill, a \$5 gold piece, a \$5 gold piece and some silver.

When Gray returned Brewster induced him to go with him to headquarters and when searched a deposit check with the clerk of the Eaton hotel was found on him for \$27. Examination by Detective Bailey and Snow developed that the money corresponded in the main with that described by Brewster, although the \$5 gold piece was not there but a \$5 gold piece and some silver. In addition the young man carried two checks, one for \$100 and one for \$50, which he said were worthless but that he would pass them.

Gray also had two grips which it developed he obtained from the Wells Fargo company with the wrong checks, although he had sent the grips himself. Brewster said that Gray told him he intended going later to the Wells Fargo company with the right checks and depositing the money in the grip. Gray refused to discuss the situation other than to make a flat denial.

Councilman Lombard and his adherents do not believe this method of procedure is fair to property owners affected and they announced their determination to stand out against it.

Chairman Devin of the ways and means committee and President of the Council George L. Baker, are the leaders of the opposition. They hold that the contractor who makes the improvement is entitled to his money as quickly as it can be raised by the council.

Under the provisions of the charter the council may order an assessment to pay the costs of a street or other improvement whenever any portion of it has been accepted by the city engineer. After an assessment ordinance has been passed property owners affected are to be notified by the city engineer and if the uncompleted portion of the improvement is afterwards found to be defective they have no recourse but to the bonding of their property acts as a waiver of all legal rights should they remonstrate against payment for the improvement.

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Great Council of Order, in Session Here, Plans to Take Care of Aged and Infirm Members of the Order.

Resolutions will be passed by the great council of the Improved Order of Red Men, reservation of Oregon, in session today, to provide an appropriation of from \$50,000 to \$100,000 for the erection of a Red Men's home in Portland. The council will make a fight for the home on the floor of the council today, but it is generally expected that Portland will get the institution. This afternoon a committee will be appointed to select a site and arrange for the building of the structure.

Other topics of the day to come up for consideration by the great council are resolutions barring saloonkeepers from the order, and the adoption of amendments to the constitution looking toward the care of aged and infirm members of the order.

Soon after 9 o'clock this morning the members of the great council were called to order to begin what promises to be an unusually busy day. The council will be in session from 9 o'clock to 10 o'clock, and then the council will adjourn.

Among other business to come up today is the election of great council officers, and although no bitter contests are expected, some change in the personnel of the executive staff is anticipated. Great council, J. H. Fitzgerald, formally announced at the session last night that he would not be a candidate for election, but that he had come out for the office of grand representative to the national council of the order.

Plans for the Red Men's home have not yet been made, and until the matter is voted on it will be known how expensive a building will be erected. Several sites in and around the city have already been considered. The home will be used to take care of members of the order and the women of the order, and the order will be a branch of the order.

In line with the building of a home for the aged and feeble, an amendment to the constitution carrying old and infirm members of the order, who are unable to pay their dues because of misfortune, be carried free. In the past, aged members who were unable to pay their dues were expelled from the order.

The resolution prohibiting saloonkeepers, bartenders and professional gamblers from joining the order, was passed this afternoon beyond question, in that it is mandatory upon the great council of the order to pass such resolutions.

Threaten to Go Beyond Own Case in Opening Navy Scandal.

(United Press Leased Wire.) Washington, July 28.—Formal protest against the ruling of the judge advocate of the Army and Navy department, in the case of Lieutenant James N. Sutton, to the effect that the investigation would be conducted by the department, was made today by attorneys for James N. Sutton.

Attorney Meyer demanded that the department issue an order compelling the court to resume its sessions as an inquest body, instead of as a trial board.

Mrs. Sutton's attorneys characterized the action of the judge advocate as an outrage and threatened a naval scandal bigger than the first one opened up in connection with the case. The attorneys alleged that facts regarding Sutton's death are being smothered by the officials.

(Special Dispatch to The Journal.) Tacoma, Wash., July 28.—That an undergarment worn by Margaret Cuvrean Sunday, the day she lost her life, was missing when the body was recovered and the most startling fact brought out in the coroner's inquest at the Pierce county courthouse today. Witnesses testified that the girl's clothing was not disturbed from the time she was found.

Throughout the questioning by Coroner G. D. Shaver and Assistant Prosecuting Attorney Ralph Woods the young man upon whom suspicion rested in connection with the young girl's death, remained unmoved and practically unvarying in his story.

He said that the girl was terrified when the boat was nearly filled with water by the action of the waves, and he was trying to get her out of the boat, but she would not get out.

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Adopts Report Which Sends Park Bond Bids Back to Makers.

All doubts that the council would uphold the policies of Mayor Simon in refusing to sanction the sale of nearly \$1,000,000 worth of park and fire main bonds were set at rest today when the lawmakers adopted the report of the committee on the subject, which Monday returned bids for bonds to the amount of \$775,000 to the bidders unopened and recommended that no sale be made.

Of this sum \$600,000 was for the purchase of parks and \$275,000 for the installation of reinforcing fire mains on the city streets. The committee report made no objection when the roll call on the committee report was called, but he declared the necessity for additional money is so great that the council should give it more careful consideration.

It was part of the ways and means committee's duty to sell these bonds, continued Mr. Rushlight, and I would like to hear the sentiment of the chairman on the subject.

Chairman Devin answered Mr. Rushlight briefly. He said that the former administration had made a great mistake in selling bonds for the city. The result, he said, was that there is now in the city treasury \$2,500,000 on which the city is paying interest and adding to the tax burden without benefit.

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Offers to Furnish Beautiful Alaska Stone for New Courthouse If County Will Haul It to Portland—Splendid Varieties.

Marble for the construction of the new county courthouse has been offered free of charge to the county commissioners. The offer is made by Francis Clarno, who owns a valuable quarry of marble on Prince of Wales island, Alaska. He places no restriction on the quantity, and will furnish the material for the entire structure if desired.

Commissioners Lightner and Barnes are not certain that they can avail themselves of the offer, but express a preference for the marble. It can be provided at a cost not exceeding brick or other material. But if some of the best of the material is used, the marble, properly cut, at a specified price, the county may be able to save some money.

On Friday night, as is to be opened the second time for structural steel for the new building, and it is assumed that the contract for the steel will be awarded soon thereafter. But the finishing material has not been chosen, brick being understood to have the preference up to this time.

Mr. Clarno has shown the commissioners samples from his quarry, the colors ranging from pure white to pure black, through intermediate grades and shades of gray, green and blue, and in variety. The predominant color in the immense quarry is white, with veins of gray and blue.

Mr. Clarno claims superior texture for his marble over other Alaskan marble. He states that in Portland, he has shown samples of stone for columns that exhibit a beautiful variety of color. All of these colors, he says, are due to the way the marble is quarried and to the way it is cut.

He also urges that the plan of bringing the marble to Portland be practical. Ships can be loaded direct from the quarry by derrick, as the exposed cliffs of marble rise abruptly from an inlet, where vessels can load the marble directly from the quarry. The quarry is located on the coast of Alaska, about 50 miles southwest from Ketchikan, on an arm of Melina Sound. The quarry is a good one, showing 12 claims, aggregating 240 acres.

As much of the contracting firm of Gleason & Joplin, is one of those who have investigated the property, and in a report he has made no bears out Mr. Clarno's statement that the quarry is a good one.

COCE SECRETARY TO JIMMY HYDE

John H. Stuart Commits Suicide in Shack Near Mukilteo.

(United Press Leased Wire.) Everett, Wash., July 28.—John H. Stuart, secretary of the Everett branch of the I. O. O. F., committed suicide yesterday by shooting himself twice in the head and body with a .38 Smith & Wesson revolver.

Stuart testified at the insurance investigation held in New York. Afterward he is said to have left for Seattle. He then came west and settled in the little shack near Mukilteo, where he lived alone until a young woman, said to be the daughter of an eastern railroad official, came out from New York and married him. She was alone in the shack when Stuart took his own life. She pleaded with the deputy coroner to have the death certificate delayed until she could see him.

Stuart is supposed to have been a Cornell graduate, had been visiting the couple, but had started for New York.

REMARKABLE DEMONSTRATION WHEN CHANNEL FLYER REACHES CAPITAL.
