Pinkertons End Hard Two Year Chase by Capture at Vancouver, B. C.

Pacific university at Forest Grove is to institute a campaign for the increase of its endowment. At a meeting of the board of directors held yesterday at the office of the president, Harvey W. Scott, the plan was presented by the University treasurer, William Ferrin, who hopes to raise \$300,000 within a year. Mr. Ferrin said that help is forthcoming from the east if the campaign is undertaken, and prominent among those who are ready to give aid is Dr. Pearson, the Chicago philanthropist who once before gave \$50,000 to the institution on condition that it raise a certain amount for itself.

The fund which will be expended in the erection of new buildings. Probably \$100,000 will be devoted to such purpose, and \$12,000 has already been raised for a new gymnasium which is to cost \$20,000. A men's dormitory will require \$40,000, a science hall \$50,000, and a library \$30,000. The remainder will be turned into a permanent endowment fund.

On the action of the board, W. D. Ferguson, professor of biblical literature at Pacific, who is visiting in New England, was telegraphed and put in immediate charge of the campaign. Last year he secured \$22,000 in Chicago for the university. The college now has an endowment of \$215,000, but is in need of additional funds.

The directors present at the meeting were H. W. Scott, Judge C. E. Wolverton, Dr. Luther R. Dyer, E. W. Hedges, Rev. C. F. Clapp, Newton McCoy, Napoleon Davis, Milton W. Smith, John E. Bailey, George W. Smith and Frank Ferrin. The jurisdiction of the canvass plan was placed in the hands of a special committee, consisting of Messrs. Scott, Clapp, Frank Ferrin, Marsh and Ferrin. Simultaneously an effort will be made to increase the student enrollment, which is now 240.

Mayor Would Have Institution in New City Jail Building—Dr. Wheeler Says \$2000 Would Furnish It Completely.

Mayor Simon says that Portland is to have an emergency hospital, that is, if the city council carries out his wishes. The mayor proposes to utilize a wing of the proposed new city jail to be built at Park and Everett streets for the purpose. He thinks an institution of this kind can be provided for at a small addition to the appropriation that will be necessary for the reception of patients.

City Health Officer C. H. Wheeler says the emergency hospital can be provided after the manner suggested by the mayor at a cost not to exceed \$2000. "All we need is a portion of one floor of the new jail," said Dr. Wheeler. "An operating room, a small kitchen, a room to contain six beds, three rooms suitable for the reception of patients suffering from delirium tremens and a room for the house physician will be ample for the present needs of the city."

"According to my ideas such a hospital would be needed only for the reception of temporarily insane persons and for those suffering from minor accidents—in short, for the reception only of such cases as the city hospitals do not care to take."

"Cases of serious injury would have to be taken to the other hospitals, anyway. They would not be handled in the emergency hospital. For instance, if a man were to be picked up with a broken leg it would be folly to bring him to the city hospital and then remove him to some other one. In the emergency hospital the patient should be moved about as little as possible, and the city could not take care of such patients."

The hospitals of Portland are all situated at convenient distances from the heart of the city now, and were it not for the minor cases which would not be wanted by these institutions we would have no need of an emergency hospital. In San Francisco and other cities the emergency hospital is maintained seven miles from the business district, and smaller receiving hospitals are located in various parts of the city."

Councilman Callers yesterday objected to the final passage of the ordinance authorizing \$42,000 for the purchase of the jail and hospital site at Park and Everett streets, so the matter will have to go over for two weeks. At the next council meeting, however, there is no doubt that the measure will be passed almost unanimously.

BALLOONIST NEARLY MAKES LAST ASCENT

To those who enjoy thrilling attempts and are on the lookout for a sensational accident the balloon ascension on Council Crest these days must offer a real inducement. Dave, Devil Harry Wright, the man is called, who risks his life periodically in his balloon. He himself asserts that he expects to be killed in one of his daring attempts some day and that he never goes up without taking his life in his hands.

Saturday afternoon came near his "Goodbye Willie" day. Only the narrowest margin of luck, tempered with steady nerve saved him from being dashed to death in Marquam's gulch east of Council Crest. Mr. Wright says that he thought it was surely time for his prayers that afternoon.

It happened this way. A very high wind was blowing at the time of the ascension and the greatest difficulty was experienced in filling the balloon. "Ordinarily," said Mr. Wright, "this would have been accomplished in a few minutes but owing to the difficulty experienced in getting off and the fact that Stasora, my able assistant, was nearly overcome while at work directing the charging wire, I did not properly adjust the sling connecting the parachute to the big balloon and only realized my danger after leaving the ground and while I was suspended head downwards from the trapeze bar. My only chance was to remain perfectly still until a sufficient height had been reached. I then endeavored to reach the sling but the jerk in so doing caused the knot to let go, fortunately at sufficient height to permit the opening of the parachute before reaching the ground. I had intended to rise 4000 or 5000 feet higher and to disappear from sight before cutting loose had not an accident occurred."

Stasora, who is devoted to Wright, and has been his right hand man for years, was nearly overcome when he learned what a narrow escape his friend had experienced and he added that every time Wright ascends in his balloon he thinks it may be his last ascent. Wright will go up again next Saturday afternoon and he says he will not cut loose this time before attaining an altitude of a mile above the Crest.
