

GRAND CIRCLE NOW IN SESSION

Women of Woodcraft's Law-makers Have Fifth Annual Convention Here.

With about 75 delegates and grand officers present, the fifth grand circle session of the Women of Woodcraft was called to order at 10 o'clock this morning in the Women of Woodcraft building, Tenth and Taylor streets, to begin a business session which will probably extend over a period of 10 days.

Those attending upon the sessions are 55 grand delegates and 16 grand circle officers from all over the northwest jurisdiction, the headquarters of which are located in Portland, taking in Oregon, Montana, Idaho, Washington, Nevada, California, Colorado, Wyoming and Utah.

Today the sessions will be unimportant as compared with those of next week and the latter part of this week. The only business taken up at the morning session was the appointment of a committee on credentials. This afternoon other committees will be appointed. Tomorrow general work will be taken up in earnest.

May Make Assessments.
One of the most important questions to be considered and one which is expected to consume the greater part of the time of the delegates and officers is that of the raising of assessments all over the northwestern jurisdiction. Like many other fraternal insurance organizations, the Women of Woodcraft have found their assessments rather too low and, obeying an order of the insurance commissioner, will prepare to make them higher. Just to what extent the rates will be raised will come up for discussion.

Another amendment to the constitution and by-laws will be that covering the monument clause, which has heretofore been contained in all insurance policies issued by the order. An amendment to be introduced would eliminate the clause which provides for the erection of a tombstone over the grave of every member, but to whether or not the policy holder as to whether or not she desires a monument. If so, the rate of assessment on that particular policy will be raised.

In other ways the constitution and by-laws will be revised and strengthened and a change may be made in the method of taking in new members and in the issuing of insurance policies.

Toward the end of the week the election of officers will be held. While it is generally accepted that all the women holding the most important positions will be re-elected, though some contests are expected, bitter battles will probably center around the election of officers to fill the minor positions.

Mr. Wright will report the financial condition of the order to be excellent, and in line with the statistics which he will submit will make some interesting recommendations to the grand circle.

DR. WHITNEY IS STILL IN COUNTY JAIL

Because of the absence from the city of District Attorney Cameron, the hearing of the petition of Dr. G. B. Whitney for a writ of habeas corpus was not finished by Judge Gans in the circuit court this morning. Authorities were presented at some length by John A. Jeffries, attorney for Dr. Whitney, and by Deputy District Attorney Fitzgerald for the state, but the matter was not taken up again until tomorrow was granted.

The supreme court recently directed that the demurrer be sustained to the indictment on which Whitney was convicted on the charge of manslaughter. The court did not order his discharge, nor did it direct another trial. The defendant's attorneys rely on a statutory provision which says that a defendant must be released when the supreme court fails to direct that he be held.

District Attorney Cameron wants to re-submit the case to the next grand jury, and contends that the question is within the discretion of the court.

TACOMA WOMAN CAPTURES BURGLAR

Tacoma, July 29.—At the point of a revolver, Mrs. John Cruikshank-Scott held up and captured a prowler who had entered a room in the hotel which she conducts on C street at 9 o'clock this morning. The prowler was discovered by Miss Doris Heslop, a roomer in the building, who heard him ransacking drawers in a room from which she knew the tenant to be absent. Donning a wrapper she went to the room of the landlady and warned her. Mrs. Cruikshank-Scott encountered the man in the hall as he was making his way out and held him at the point of a revolver until the police arrived. The man gave his name as Harry Jones. The police are investigating his antecedents.

SWEET MUST GIVE UP DIAMOND RING

Circuit Judge Morrow has made an order directing Emathan Sweet to turn over a diamond ring and such oriental rugs as he purchased previous to his last marriage to satisfy a \$300 judgment rendered against the Sweet-Head-Lemcke company, of which he was president. This is the result of supplemental proceedings in the court last Saturday, when Sweet testified that he had given the ring and the rugs to his wife and had no property whatever.
