TELEPHONE LINE TO KLAMATH FALLS

(Special Dispatch to The Journal.) Eugene, Or., July 29.—It is announced by the Pacific States Telephone & Telegraph company here that construction work on a through telephone line from Eugene will begin within the next 30 days. The proposed line is to follow the Southern Pacific railway route from Naton to Klamath Falls. In order to reach Klamath Falls by phone from this point Eugene will have to be connected at Ashland, and this occasion considerable delay in transmission. When the line is in operation messages will be transmitted from Portland and other points north and south of here direct through Eugene without relaying them.

RAILROADS HEAD FOR CENTRALIA

KNOCKED 25 FEET BY TRAIN; MAY LIVE

JAPANESE EDITOR ADVISED MURDER

Boosting Strike, Referred to "the Japanese Nation in Hawaii." (United Press Leased Wire.) Honolulu, July 29.—Editorials translated from Japanese newspapers are the feature of the trial today of M. Makino and other leaders of the strike of Japanese plantation workers, who on trial charges with conspiracy. The editorials are striking in character. Professor Denning was brought here specially for the purpose of acting as interpreter at the trial.

(United Press Leased Wire.) Seattle, July 29.—West Virginia and Delaware are celebrating at the Alaska-Yukon-Pacific exposition today. Governor W. E. Glass of West Virginia delivered the principal address at the exercises which were held in the Washington state building.
