Forces From Entire Northwest Will Capture the A.-Y.-P. Tomorrow.

(United Press Leased Wire.) Seattle, July 30.—With Governor John A. Johnson of Minnesota and many other notable persons present from all parts of the country, Swedish day at the Alaska-Yukon-Pacific exposition tomorrow is to be a memorable occasion in the history of the fair. Governor Johnson is expected to reach Seattle tonight or tomorrow morning. He will be met by Governor Hay and staff and escorted to the fair grounds. He is coming in a special train furnished by James J. Hill.

LORD'S ELOQUENT PLEA FOR ROSS

Able Attorney Makes Great Effort to Free Client—Case Closes Tomorrow.

(By Journal Leased Salem Wire.) Salem, Or., July 28.—Ex-Governor William P. Lord made one of the most remarkable and eloquent arguments in behalf of his client, J. Thorburn Ross, this morning that has ever been made before the Oregon supreme court. Though hardly able even to stand at times, Judge Lord has made a phenomenal effort to save Ross from the penitentiary.

Judge Lord started his argument yesterday afternoon and spoke until 10 o'clock. When court convened this morning he again took the floor and spoke until noon. Many times during his argument his voice would fail him, his mouth would open, but only a whisper could be heard. None of the argument of his colleagues came to him, neither could he hear the voice of the counsel for the state, being almost entirely deaf.

MOTHER TAKES HER BOY AGAIN

Countess Rathlou Secures Child From Dr. Collins' Mother at Salem.

"The child is mine, why should I not have it? No court in the land can keep me from holding the child.
