Casey Tries Out New Judge.—Judge Bennett tried an experiment in municipal court yesterday morning. His subject was Jim Casey, who has spent the greater part of the last 10 years in the city jail. In fact, every time Casey has been turned loose from the jail he has reported back drunk within a few hours. He is kept around as a curiosity and is known as a good worker. Casey asked the judge to let him go, saying he wanted a breath of fresh air and "had a job." Judge Bennett then dismissed the charge of drunkenness against Casey upon his taking a solemn oath that he would not touch another drop of liquor for the long term of two weeks. Casey went free at 10 a. m. and shortly after 2 o'clock yesterday afternoon came into headquarters "roaring drunk." Judge Bennett said he expected it, when he learned of the failure of his experiment.

Three Families in Fight.—Three families becoming engaged in a fight with clubs, fists, sticks and boards, resulted in four people being arrested by Constables Wagner and McCouch yesterday. The complaint is brought by H. O. Bowman and Edna Bowman, his wife, and the arrested parties are R. Spurluck, his wife Emma Spurluck, Ernest Hatter and his wife, Maggie Hatter. It appears from the complaint that the Rowmans were just building a new house and in putting up the fence around the house they alleged that Lewis had threatened his life, was arrested yesterday afternoon by Deputy Sheriff Bulger and Bird on an insanity charge. He was living in a tent in a battle royal, in which boards were torn from the fence and used as weapons, sticks and stones were more or less damaged.

Steel for County Courthouse.—The Pacific Iron works of Portland offers to furnish steel for the new courthouse to be erected for \$37,714. This is apparently the lowest bid submitted to the county commissioners yesterday, but the contract will not be awarded until next Wednesday, to give the architects an opportunity to check over the bids and make sure that this bid is acceptable. The United Engineering & Construction company bid the Northwest Bridge company bid \$39,807, and the Des Moines Bridge & Iron company \$40,000. Gerrick & Gerrick of Seattle bid \$10,500 per ton for the job of erecting the steel. The Pacific Iron works offers to deliver steel complete at the end of 90 days from the time the contract is awarded.

Sues Painter for Ruined Clothes.—Because he is alleged to have spilled a large quantity of paint on the person of Grace Wright and the infant she had taken out walking, M. E. Orsen has been sued for damages to the clothing of the plaintiff to the extent of \$82 and costs in bringing the suit. It is alleged that Orsen was engaged in painting the Morrison street bridge on June 9, when he carelessly spilled a bucket of black paint upon Mrs. Wright, who was upon the roadway beneath the spot where Orsen was painting. The clothing enumerated as ruined includes one dress, a hat, a pair of gloves, a waist, a corset cover, a skirt, a baby dress and a baby's hat. The suit was brought in Justice Olsen's court. Joseph and Henry appear as Mrs. Wright's attorneys.

Ervin's Marriage Annulled.—Circuit Judge Gatens yesterday signed a decree annulling the marriage of Frank Ervin to Mrs. Laura Ervin, because the latter neglected to procure a divorce from John Reimers before she married Ervin. No testimony was taken, as Mrs. Reimers entered her appearance and declined to plead further, virtually admitting the charges of Ervin, who alleged that she told him she was divorced when he married her in 1907. Mrs. Reimers began a suit for divorce from Reimers in the circuit court in Portland, but dismissed it. She married Reimers in McMinnville and Ervin in San Mateo, Cal.

LOSS OF TWENTY WAS TOO MUCH

Johnson Bets Against Cinch, Loses, Disappears—Wife Searches for Him.

Losing a bet for \$20 appears to have been too much for H. E. Johnson of 719 Hawthorne avenue, who has disappeared since July 17, the date of the bet, after having tried to account for the loss of his money by telling a story that he had been held up and robbed in the Worcester block.
On the morning of July 17 Johnson appeared in the Worcester block and inquired of W. C. Hathaway whether he had seen Justice Olsen. On being told that the judge was in his office, Johnson declared that the office was not in that building and a bet of \$20 was made between the two men relative to the location of the office and referred to Justice Olsen for settlement. Johnson said the bet was not greatly disturbed and departed.

Until yesterday morning nothing was heard of Johnson, when his wife appeared at Justice Olsen's office and asked to be aided in locating her husband, whom she declared had returned home on the evening of July 17 with a cut on the side of his coat and a story that he had been held up and robbed while in the Worcester building. He left home again that evening and has not been heard of since.

Mrs. Johnson believes that her husband's mind has become affected, as he has acted queerly on several occasions since returning from the bicycle repairing business here. He returned a short time ago and has called on Justice Olsen several times, but has not been seen since July 17.

The missing man is described as being about 35 years of age, 5 feet 9 inches tall, weighing 155 pounds, rather thin of feature, sandy haired, sandy moustache, and dressed like a fairly well to do laboring man.

June 12, Mollie C. Lewis wants \$15,000 damages from the Portland Railway, Light & Power company. Her suit for this sum was filed in the circuit court yesterday. The collision took place near the car barns on East Twenty-eighth street. The plaintiff says she was hurled to the floor and badly injured, and she has spent most of the time in bed since that time, she says, and has been permanently injured.

Hit by Horse and Runny.—Ernest Coughlin, at 212 North Ninth street, a young man about 25 years of age, was struck by a horse and buggy at about 5:30 o'clock last evening and knocked unconscious. He was removed by the Red Cross ambulance to the Good Samaritan hospital, where his injuries were attended by Dr. K. K. Chapman and Herman T. Bohman.

AUDUBON DELEGATES TO SPOKANE CONGRESS

William L. Finley, who represents the National Association of Audubon societies, authorized to appoint five delegates to the National Irrigation congress at Spokane, August 9 to 14 inclusive, has appointed A. King Wilson, Horatio H. Parker, F. Chapman and Herman T. Bohman.

The objects of the congress are to preserve forests, to reclaim deserts and to make homes on the land. Mr. Finley will give a talk and show the importance of wild birds in the preservation of forests. The National Association of Audubon societies, with its organizations in almost every state, has done more than any other organization to save our wild birds and animals.

Mr. Finley has also been invited to represent the cause of wild bird and game protection at the First National conservation congress at Seattle, August 26 to 28. He will give two illustrated lectures before this congress on the protection of wild birds.

Good Roads Convention at Tualatin, August 7, Will Be Entertaining.

The farmers of Tualatin, Washington county, are arranging to hold a Farmer's convention and barbecue, Saturday, August 7. Alexander Sweek and John Nyburg have full charge and are making great arrangements to hold the largest convention of its kind ever held in the state. They are going to have two heaves barbecue and a number of hogs and sheep. McFarland of Oregon City has been employed to conduct this part of the convention, and he has a state wide reputation as an expert in barbecuing. A free dinner will be given to all who attend on this occasion, and everybody is invited.

This convention is to be held in the interest of good roads, and an attempt will be made to interest not only the farmers but all other persons in Oregon. It is hoped that a large crowd will be in attendance.

The park that has been selected for this convention is located on the banks of the Tualatin, near the depot of the Oregon Electric and Southern Pacific railroads, hence it will be most convenient for all attending. Special arrangements have been made with the railroad companies to take care of all those who wish to attend.

Webster, county judge of Multnomah county, is to be the principal speaker on this occasion, and it is generally known that Judge Webster is better informed on good roads, and takes more interest in this subject than any other person in the state of Oregon. Honorable George C. Brownell of Oregon City, Honorable W. A. Carter of Portland and Honorable John Manning, also of Portland, will be present and speak on this occasion.

Tualatin has a brass band which is a credit to any community, and they will furnish the music for the occasion. A fine orchestra has been selected from Portland to play dance music, and an appropriate pavilion has been arranged for dancing. There will be sack, pony and other races of an entertaining nature, with appropriate prizes. There will be something doing every minute.
