CHINAULT'S FEAT FOR BB'S

A SORRY PLIGHT

Will Try to Reestablish Friendly Relations With Portland Magnates.

San Francisco, Aug. 2.—Headed by Frank Ibb, president of the San Francisco club, the Seals left for Portland last night. Ibb went along on a special mission. He will act as a peace ambassador between the McCredies and Cal Ewing. There was a time when the McCredies were strong boosters for the Coast league.

The straw that broke the camel's back was Ewing awarding Shinn, claimed by Portland, to Sacramento. Ewing then the McCredies have lost no time firing hot shots at the president, who has taken them without returning in kind. Now, Ibb will labor to restore good feeling and it is hoped his trip won't be fruitless.

To Legalize Outlaws.

President Cal Ewing will make another strong effort to bring the California league under the protecting wing of organized baseball. This has been a hobby of Ewing for a year or more. Last winter the lost race sleep and money endeavoring to establish harmonious relations between the Coast league and the men who are now counting his chickens Cy Moreing, the backbones of the outlaws, bucked. Organized baseball was ready to extend liberal concessions to the California league. It could have had a club at Los Angeles, another at Oakland and held Sacramento, besides retaining all their old territory like Stockton, San Jose and Fresno.

The majority of the directors of the California league, who are now willing to enter organized baseball under these terms. Just when the prospects were the best, Moreing said "Nothing doing."

The Stockton magnate was willing to surrender certain players whom the organized club owned and wanted. Moreing declared he would be loyal to the men who had been loyal to him. He had induced players to jump camp and it was not his to give to abandon them to the bears and wolves. There was much haggling over terms before the two leagues saw the light.

That the California league has had a losing year, President Ewing will again make overtures to the opposition. It is known that the Coast league is ready to make generous concessions to the California league in regard to territory, though the nature of which cannot be stated with exactness at this time.
