

# ATTORNEY SERVES NOTICE ON CHIEF COX, SHERIFF STEVENS AND CONSTABLE WAGNER THAT LAW MUST BE ENFORCED TO LIMIT.

Attorney Henry C. King this morning started a moral crusade against the women of the world who have again started operations in the north end. King filed notice with Chief of Police Cox, Sheriff Stevens and Constable Lou Wagner that the law against these places be obeyed. He then sent notice to Sheriff Stevens and Constable Lou Wagner the same effect and stated that he will take the matter up with Mayor Simon this afternoon.

Attorney King received an assurance from Chief of Police Cox this morning that he would see that the public was not annoyed by these people but did not get a definite statement that the women would be ejected. Chief Cox called attention to the fact that the women were not operating in rooms opening on the streets. Constable Lou Wagner, on learning that this notice had been sent out, stated that he would certainly be called upon to enforce the law.

"When notice is sent to me calling my attention to these immoral practices, which I certainly know are going on, I can do nothing else than go down there and arrest every person whom I find breaking the law."

Attorney King states that he will follow his crusade to the finish. "There will be no houses of ill repute running in open violation of the law as long as I am in Portland. I will keep after this as long as there is a house of this kind left in the north end. If the officers fail to do their duty, I will appear before the grand jury as soon as it meets and demand that an investigation be started which will shut up every one of these houses. Thousands of people, learning that the north end had opened, visited the red light district on Saturday night. The police were on hand, keeping the crowds moving, trying to keep a semblance of order, but making no attempt to arrest any of the violators of the law."

It is reported that Tony Arnaud, a saloonkeeper, is said to have secured a monopoly of the rooms for the women in the district are placed at from 300 to 350 and it is stated that hundreds went to Arnaud and offered substantial bonuses for quarters.

ratified by the legislatures of three fourths of the several states or by conventions in three fourths thereof, as the one or the other method of ratification shall be proposed by the congress."

In the present case the amendment originates with the congress. There is no need therefore for summoning a national convention. It rests with congress to decide whether the method of ratification shall be by the state legislatures or by a state convention. In this case congress has chosen the latter and the states are obliged to conform with the determination.

**Governor Reed Not Sign.**  
After the governor of a state receives the resolution properly certified he submits it to the legislature. Here his function ends. He need not even sign the ratification of the governor of New Hampshire once vetoed an amendment.

It was never fully tested in the courts, but it is held by the state department that his action would have no effect. After each house of the state legislature has declared its assent, the action is closed so far as that state is concerned. It can never reconsider its action. If it fails to ratify, however, it can reconsider the action and ratification later will be effectual. Three states attempted to withdraw their ratification of the income tax amendment, but they were prevented by congress.

There is no limit within which a state may take action to block the ratification of the income tax amendment. Changes of water and climate often cause sudden attacks of diarrhoea, and it is best to be prepared.

When a state ratifies an amendment the state's secretary of state sends a certified copy of the action to the secretary of state of the United States. The federal secretary of state is charged with the duty of determining when a sufficient number of ratifications have been received.

As soon as he receives a sufficient number he issues a proclamation declaring that the amendment has been adopted. No action is required of the president. When adopted it is printed on parchment and after being tested by city secretary of state is deposited in the safe with the constitution and other amendments.

# SHIPPERS OF LUMBER SHIPS

Proprietor of Scott Hotel Restaurant Ends Life Because of Reverses.

J. T. Simpson, proprietor of the Scott hotel, committed suicide in his room at the Scott hotel last night by drinking the contents of a bottle of cyanide. He was found shortly after 7 o'clock this morning by a chambermaid of the hotel who tried to awaken him in his room, No. 345. At the time he was in an unconscious condition and was removed at once by the Red Cross ambulance to the Good Samaritan hospital.

Efforts to revive him by stimulants and electric batteries administered by Dr. F. J. Ziegler at the hospital failed and he died shortly after 10 o'clock. He did not regain consciousness after being found in his room. Just when he took the laudanum is unknown, as he retired late last night with no intimation of his act.

Mr. Simpson was a man 57 years of age who came here six months ago from La Crosse, Wis. He left his family there, having had some trouble with them. He opened the restaurant about four months ago and is said to have met with financial difficulties and is supposed to be the reason for his suicide. The empty bottle of the poison was found beside the bed by Patrolman Harris who called upon the patrol wagon this morning. The remains were taken to the funeral parlors of Dunne, and the cause of death is being held awaiting advices from Wisconsin.

# RECORDS SHOW SEAWARD GROWTH

Postoffice Business Points Finger of City's Progress Steadily Upward.

"There is no better evidence of a city's prosperity than its postoffice receipts," said Assistant Postmaster Williamson this afternoon, "which accounts for the increase in the figures for Portland for 1908."

The business done by the Portland postoffice, money secured from the sale of stamps, from the rent of boxes, from the sale of money orders—everything—totals \$18,570.30, as against \$15,121.49 for the same month in 1908. This is an increase of \$3,448.81—22.84 per cent.

The increase of June receipts over last year was \$10,393—68.22 per cent. "What does it all mean?" said Mr. Williamson, "is that every month shows a good substantial increase over the corresponding month for last year. This shows better than anything else could show that the growth of Portland is a steady and substantial."

Rumors that a general strike like that at Barcelona, in protest against the continuation of the war in Morocco, will be declared, reached here today.

Hundreds of rioters have been arrested in various cities throughout Spain and a large number of executions took place at Barcelona today.

# THOUSANDS OF REFUGEES ON WAY TO FRANCE

Paris, Aug. 2.—Thousands of refugees are arriving on the French frontier, having fled from their homes in Barcelona, bringing the most terrible tales of distress and suffering.

# ASSETS OF SHIPPERS

Pacific Export Lumber Company Takes Grievance Into United States Court.

SAYS MASTER HAS VIOLATED CONTRACT

Was Chartered to Carry Lumber to China, Starting Before July 30— Captain Refuses to Set Sail and Suit Follows.

The British steamship *Suveric* is libeled in the United States court today by the Pacific Export Lumber company in the sum of \$6000. The *Suveric* was chartered by the Pacific Export Lumber company to carry 3,000,000 feet of lumber to Chinese ports. Under the charter party the master of the *Suveric* was to sail from this port on or before July 31.

The Pacific Export Lumber company alleges in the papers filed in the suit that the cargo of lumber was loaded several days prior to the departure of the *Suveric* and that the master of the ship refused to leave this port and also refused to furnish the paper with a properly signed bill of lading.

J. Ernest Laidlaw is the local agent of the *Suveric*, a British ship of 4011 tons burden.

# EUROPEAN CARGO

Steamer *Falcon* Arrives From San Francisco With Bonded Freight.

With only a little head wind for a few hours after she left the Golden Gate, the American steamer *Falcon*, Captain Schrage, arrived here from San Francisco at 4 o'clock this morning with 250 tons of bonded freight, including European cargo.

Her cargo, which she received at San Francisco from the steamer *Albatross*, consists of 200 tons of general merchandise brought from Salina Cruz by that steamer, of which about 150 tons were shipped to Europe, and the other 50 tons is from New York, being miscellaneous merchandise, the largest part of it being various kinds of iron ware, which she carried as her deck load.

The bonded freight is as follows: One cask rum, 2 crates decorated earthenware, 15 cases manufactured metal, 8 packages biscuits, 10 cases cyanide of potassium, 20 packages of carbolic acid, 20 cases wine, 12 cases glass, 9 cases manufactured wood, 10 cases water, 10 barrels of currants, the latter coming from Greece.

The steam schooner *Tahoe*, Captain Peterson, also arrived from San Francisco last night, after a fair trip. Her cargo is made up of 670 tons of cement and 160 tons of decorated earthenware, which she is unloading at the Oak Street dock. This is her first trip to this port, but from next time she will carry water to sea to obtain hydropon.

After unloading here, she will go to Grays Harbor, where she will load 800,000 feet of lumber for San Diego.

# MAY CHANGE LIGHTSHIP

Captains Wish Vessel Moved to New Position.

A petition has been sent to Captain J. M. Elliott, lighthouse inspector for this district, to have the lightship moved regularly into the harbor, to have the Columbia light vessel shifted. Captain Elliott favors the petition, which he will submit to the lighthouse board.

It is desired that the lightship be moved from her present position to a point one and one fourth miles almost directly east of the light, and in a direct line with the Cape Disappointment light. If the light ship were in this position, they could steady the light to the Cape Disappointment light and have the lightship astern, giving them a fore and aft range, which would give them a direct course through the water in the channel. In case the lightship is moved the whistling buoy in the north channel, which is rarely used, will be moved over into the south channel, in line with the light on Cape Disappointment and the lightship.

# SAILORS DROWNED

Three of Loudon Hill's Crew Swept Overboard off Cape Horn.

Advices received by the Merchants' Exchange this morning from San Francisco state that the British ship *Loudon Hill* put into the harbor, with a leaking slightly. While off Cape Horn she ran into heavy weather, during which her deck crew was swept overboard. She is bound for Dublin with lumber from Muklettoe. She left Port Townsend April 30.

# GLENHOLM HERE

First of Grain Carriers to Arrive in Port.

The first of the fleet of grain carriers coming here for new crop loading arrived this morning at San Francisco. The British ship *Glenholm*, which sailed for this port from Honolulu June 30. She is chartered some time ago by the Kerr & Co. to carry wheat to United Kingdom ports.

This is the first one of the fleet of ships chartered to carry wheat which has shown up here yet, but it is expected that others will soon follow.

# FIRST MILWAUKEE STEAMER ARRIVES

Tacoma Maru is Unloading at Tacoma—One of Five Freight Carriers.

Tacoma, Wash., Aug. 2.—Twenty-four hours ahead of her schedule of 31 days, *Osaka Shosen Kaisha* steamer *Tacoma Maru*, on her maiden voyage, has arrived in this port and is discharging her cargo of oriental merchandise.

The *Tacoma Maru* is the first of a fleet of five freight carriers that will handle the new road's traffic. The *Seattle Maru* will be the next of the fleet to reach this coast here American ports call being *Seattle*. The *Chicago Maru*, the third vessel of the Japanese Milwaukee line, is almost ready to prepare for loading on her initial voyage.

The steamers of the new line are exclusively freight carriers, though it is possible that other boats to be used by the company may be fitted with passenger accommodations.

# G. A. R. VETERANS TO GO TO SALT LAKE

Civil war veterans from Oregon will attend the national G. A. R. encampment at Salt Lake City, August 9-14. In large numbers because of the encampment being held so far west, visitors from this state will far outnumber those attending former encampments.

The Oregon delegation will leave Portland at 6 p. m. on the evening of August 7, arriving in Salt Lake on the morning of August 9. Department Commander J. P. Shaw and Adjutant General C. A. Williams will head the delegation. Other members of the Oregon G. A. R. have been named officially, as follows: Enos Swan, Portland; S. C. Cope, Hood River; Daniel Webster, Salem; B. M. Brown, Oregon City; W. B. Blanchard, Brownsville. Besides these official delegates, officers of the department, besides past commanders, are entitled to seats in the convention.

These will attend quite generally, and besides there will be many visitors from the ranks of the Oregon G. A. R. The annual conventions of the women's auxiliaries of the G. A. R. will be held in Salt Lake City at the same time as the session of the G. A. R., and will be largely attended by Oregon women.

Mrs. Mary E. Chamberlain of Portland, president of the department of Oregon, Women's Relief Corps, will head a large delegation from that order, and Mrs. Ella G. Himes of Portland, department president of the Ladies of the G. A. R., will take with her a number of representative and visitors to the convention.

Wanamaker Buys Pipe Organ.

St. Louis, Aug. 2.—The giant organ, whose deep notes were heard by hundreds of thousands at the Louisiana Purchase exposition in 1904, has been sold to John Wanamaker of Philadelphia. Loaded on 10 cars it has left St. Louis.

Since the World's Fair the organ, which is valued at \$110,000, has been in storage. It was the property of a big organ company. The pipe organ is now in a church or any other structure outside of the convention hall. It is intended to give daily concerts in the Wanamaker store in Philadelphia.

Ellis was interested in the National Geographic Society. He came here a few years ago from Dallas, Or.

# DROWNED ON EVE OF WEDDING DAY

Seattle, Aug. 2.—Lake Washington is being dragged for the body of Ernest G. Calvert of Bellingham, who drowned Saturday night before the crest of the storm.

Calvert came to Seattle Saturday. Miss Agnes Pierson, his fiancée, preceded him several days and was visiting Mr. and Mrs. H. C. Piles, who live on the east shore of the lake. They were to return to Bellingham that night. Piles and Calvert went for a swim at 8:30, the two women sitting on the bank watching them. Piles was lying on the double up from a cramp and sink. He reached the drowning man too late. Piles was in the lake and had saved an exhausted swimmer from drowning. Calvert was 31 years of age.
