Don't fail, when leaving a car, to look up and down the street for an approaching automobile or other vehicle which may run you down.
Don't jump on or off a car while it is in motion.
Don't ride on car steps.
Don't get off facing rear of the car.
Don't cross track after leaving the car, without looking for a car or vehicle which may be approaching from another direction.
Don't run after a car and jump on while it is moving.
Don't attempt to cross track ahead of a moving car.
Don't let your children play near streetcar tracks.
