

DEED BOOSTS AND WAITS FOR TRAINS

Attorney General Crawford Tells Interesting Story of Conditions in Interior—Rich Land Only Needs Transportation and Water

Citizens of Bend are jubilantly boosting land values and preparing to raise big crops for rail transportation—this while they wait for the Deschutes railroad, or railroads, whichever it will prove to be.

"They don't care who builds the road, Harriman, Porter Bros. or Hill. They don't care if they sell the railroad, just so they get the transportation," said Attorney General A. M. Crawford, who came to Portland yesterday having spent several days in the Bend country.

It was reported that the people at Bend were complaining about their water rights, but this report is not true, said the attorney general yesterday.

One man bought 40 acres of land and he paid for water rights on 25 of it, believing that amount to be all that was irrigable. He finds after clearing that he can irrigate 35 acres. Does he have to pay for the water on the extra 10 acres?

"This was the question that took me down into the Bend country," said General Crawford. "It is one of the most puzzling that I have had put up to me."

It was suggested that the man who was getting more than he contracted to pay should be made to pay the additional amount and Attorney General Crawford responded.

JACK JOHNSON PUTS UP MONEY

Hopes to Settle Terms in New York With Jim Jeffries, in Person.

(United Press Leased Wire.) Chicago, Aug. 2.—George Lytle, manager for Jack Johnson, today posted with Ed Smith of this city \$5000 as a forfeit for a fight with Jeffries.

Jeffries has already posted a like sum with Robert Edgren in New York. This makes the big match for the championship of the world seem more of a reality than ever before.

The only conditions set by Johnson are that Jeffries normally agree to the match and set a time and place before he sails for Europe.

Johnson will leave Detroit Wednesday for Toronto and from there will proceed to New York, where he hopes to meet Jeffries personally in arranging for the fight.

The black giant, who won the title of champion of the world by defeating Tommy Burns in Australia last Christmas, seemed to think Jeffries would try to impose so many conditions that the fight would be postponed. It would give the impression that he thought Jeffries would back out.

When Jeffries had his \$5000 last week, he said he meant business, and his friends have little doubt that he is serious. Jeffries made it clear that he intended to try to make good on his promise to "win back the championship for the white race."

Lytle said he considered Jeffries' claim to the championship to be "all bluff," and that Jeffries could not afford to be dictatorial.

James O'Leary still holds Johnson's check for \$10,000, which Lytle said this afternoon would stand as a forfeit, but the colored man would beat Jeff.
