Blind Husband Skips Out.—Mrs. S. B. Stevens of Salem, a bride of two months, is in Portland trying to locate her husband. From the time she was married she has been in search of him, leaving her almost destitute. She thinks Mr. Stevens is in Portland and asked the police to assist her in locating him. At present she is stopping with Mrs. Mathena, 1017 Union avenue north. The missing man is described as being 5 feet 7 inches in height, weighing 160 pounds, rather slender, hair sprinkled with gray, sandy mustache, and has a heavy filling of gold in his front teeth. He is blind in one eye and wears glasses. When he left home he was wearing a black soft hat and a gray suit of clothing.

Many Take a Look.—The rooms of the Oregon Historical society in the city have been attracting a good deal of interest in the city, as may be seen by the following: The total number registered in July was 3555, a daily average of 131. Forty-five states were represented by 1646 visitors. One hundred and sixty-four towns in Oregon were represented by 585 visitors. The remainder came from Portland. The eight states showing the largest number of visitors were as follows: Washington, 208; California, 190; Iowa, 115; Kansas, 112; Nebraska, 101; Minnesota, 89; Michigan, 70; Wisconsin, 70.

Civil Service Examinations.—Several civil service examinations are announced for the month of August by the United States civil service commission. On August 25 examinations for an officer to fill a vacancy at West Point, N. Y., and a translator in the patent office at Washington, D. C., will be held. On August 26 and 28, examinations for a female scientific assistant in seed and for the department of agriculture, an assistant inspector of electric light plants, treasury department, and an assistant in the naval observatory in Washington, D. C., will be held.

School Board to Investigate.—A special meeting of the school board has been called for this afternoon to investigate the charges made against G. W. Hamilton, principal of the Trades school. These charges were preferred against him by O. Guildmeister and others, instructors in the school, and chief among them is one which accuses Hamilton of being the paid agent of the Scranton Correspondence schools.

Brick Works Incorporated.—Articles of incorporation of the Columbia Brick Works were filed in the office of the county clerk today by A. Klose, R. Klose and F. Olbrich. The company is capitalized at \$100,000.

Sold Bad Kame.—H. T. Caffee was convicted and fined \$25 in the municipal court this morning for selling infected meat. A week or more ago he sold a ham to Mrs. M. D. Barnes of Myrtle Park Arleta, which was filled with maggots.

GREAT DEMAND FOR LABORERS

Rival Contractors Almost Shanghai Gangs on City Streets Every Day.

A dearth of laboring men in Portland is precipitating a war between contractors. The local supply has run so far short of demands that men are being taken from the streets, many of them against their will, and hurried to the scenes of railroad construction work, in Washington and Idaho. Several gangs of men employed in the extension work of the Portland Railway, Light & Power company have been taken from the streets, together with their foremen, to serve Porter brothers or Harriman in Deschutes canyon, or the United Railways down in the valley west of Burlington, or in the Cornelius pass. "Our men have been taken from their work by the employment agents of railroad contractors," said B. S. Jowelyn, president of the Portland Railway, Light & Power company yesterday. "We have lost a good many of them to the United Railways people," he added. Porter brothers or Harriman are not so anxious to obtain big forces of men with picks and shovels as are the United Railways. "We are willing to pay the best wages given anywhere and will employ all who come," said L. B. Wickersham, chief engineer. "At that we can't get nearly as many men as we need."

The way in which the United Railways rush laborers to the Cornelius pass is being revived by the fact that it is backing the road, to use it as a means of entry into San Francisco. The tunnel is being bored from both ends and work is being pushed under rush orders.

Maggots. The condition of the ham which was discovered until it was used and Mrs. Barnes became ill. This led to investigation which disclosed the infected condition. It was reported and the market inspector, Mrs. Sarah A. Evans, made an examination of the meat at Caffee's place and found that much of it was in the same condition. She caused his arrest which resulted in conviction this morning. There is some possibility of a civil suit resulting, as Mrs. Barnes is still very ill.

Objection to Attorney's Fees.—Louis Goldsmith has filed suit in circuit court against the Portland Development company, of which John F. Shields is president, for the collection of a promissory note for \$75,000 and \$7500 attorney's fees. Mr. Goldsmith alleges that the note was given on certain property in the Lewis and Clark tract grounds, in 1906. In an answer to the complaint, filed today, the defendant company takes exception to the amount asked for attorney's fees and to other allegations of the complaint. The note is alleged to have become due July 14, this year.

Will of Edward Martin.—The last will and testament of Edward Martin, deceased, was filed today. It is a brief document, bequeathing \$300 to Edward B. Martin, a son, and the remainder of the estate equally between the widow, Nancy Martin, and the four children, Clara E. Carpenter, Edward B. Martin, Frances E. Wheeler and Mamie L. Bullock. Edward B. Martin and John Lipscomb are named as executors.

Fund Is Raised.—Sufficient funds to keep the library and reading room in Montaville in supplies for another year were realized from the festival given in Montaville last Friday and Saturday nights. The booths were in charge of the churches and fraternal organizations and \$16 was realized as a result of the hard work done by members of the booth committees.

Disorderly House Raided.—Constable Lou Wagner with Deputies McCullough and Rennie raided one of the red light houses at Seventh and Flanders streets last night and placed in women under arrest. Complaints were made that the women were acting in an unseemly manner, carrying their operations into the street in front of the place and acting boisterously.

Fortie Is Arrested.—L. H. Reid, a colored Pullman porter, was arrested last night by Detectives Hellyer and Moloney on a charge of larceny brought by Mrs. H. H. Trask. She alleged that Reid was arrested a few days ago on suspicion of this theft but was released. The defendant secured a continuance until tomorrow.

PLATFORM WAS FATAL PLACE

Returned Visitor Tells of Scenes at Spokane Wreck Last Saturday.

"A fact not generally known," said D. N. Macklem, who returned from Spokane today, "is that nearly all of the killed and many of the wounded in the

disastrous interurban wreck, near Spokane Saturday afternoon, were standing on the platform of the two trains." Mr. Macklem visited the scene of the wreck yesterday along with thousands who wanted to view the spot where so many lives were snuffed out when the heavy trains crashed together. "I was told of one poor fellow who was hurled headlong under one of the cars and badly injured and who crawled out and in spite of his dreadful injuries managed to take several snapshots of the wreck with his kodak. This man is now in a Spokane hospital and is not expected to live." Mr. Macklem says that the first report sent out from Spokane to the effect that the trains were running not over 15 miles an hour when the crash came was undoubtedly wrong as the cars were torn to kindling wood and must have been traveling at a high rate of speed.
