Youngster Walks Back Home.—After alarming a neighborhood and stirring the police to an investigation Mrs. Harry B. Smith, who lives at the end of East Thirtieth street, found her three-year-old grandchild, supposed to be kidnapped, at her home on her return 20 minutes later. On missing the child, Mrs. Smith hurried to a telephone and notified the police station on Tuesday night. Returning home she found that the little fellow had turned in his tracks and gone back to his home. As she had no telephone she did not call the police off the hunt. Yesterday at noon Chief Cox detailed Detective Mallett to make an investigation and last evening that officer returned with the report that the woman was only frightened and had no cause for alarm as the child had returned.

Ruffner to Get Jury Trial.—Ralph R. Ruffner demanded a jury trial in municipal court this morning for the charge of assault and battery brought against him by Councilman Thomas C. Devlin. Ruffner's case will be heard tomorrow morning when Judge Bennett will have a jury ready to hear the facts relative to the disagreement between Mr. Ruffner and Mr. Devlin which resulted in Devlin's being struck and the subsequent arrest of Mr. Ruffner. The charge of threatening to kill which was brought by Mr. Devlin against Mr. Ruffner will also be determined by the same evidence introduced during the hearing for the assault and battery charge.

Insurance Men to Meet.—Members of the American Association of Mutual Insurance Companies will hold their fourteenth annual convention in Portland August 17 to 20. About 300 delegates are expected to be present and several delegations from western and middle western states will come in special cars. Secretary Harry L. Keefe will be in Portland August 14 to complete arrangements for the convention. The local mutual insurance companies have the entertainment of the visitors in charge and have arranged for a banquet up the Columbia as well as automobile rides and a banquet.

Inquest in Schilling Case.—Coroner Norden announces that an inquest will be held at 4 o'clock this afternoon over the remains of Andrew Schilling, the 17-year-old boy who was killed on Tuesday night in an elevator accident at the New Grand Central hotel. John Popin, the 14-year-old boy in charge of the elevator at the time of the accident, will be one of the important witnesses although the report that the elevator was accustomed to be left standing with the door opened will be investigated.

Thrown Out of Saloon.—Fred Holmes, a man who has been drunk for the last week, was thrown out of a saloon at Second and Burnside streets at 1 o'clock last night and in sprawling on the sidewalk injured himself so badly that he was removed to the Good Samaritan hospital by the Red Cross ambulance for treatment. He was booked at police headquarters as a common drunk.

Principal G. W. Hamilton, in defending himself against the charges of misconduct brought by three subordinate teachers last night before the school board, brought counter charges against his accusers. He declared that they had formed a conspiracy to oust him, and had encouraged and abetted the board on the part of students. The reason for his "acting" the instructors under him, he said, was that these men were "greenhorns," and had to be criticized frequently because of their ignorance of correct teaching methods. Hamilton denied that he had used the obscene language credited to him. Otto P. Goldmeister and Julius H. Klein, two of the teachers, had previously sworn that Hamilton had used such language.

Three more witnesses for the complainants were brought before the board last night. One of these, a student named Roy Johnston, testified that the principal had insulted him by calling him a sneak and stating that he was crazy.

E. J. Phillips, city school electrician, Exchange Hotel Fifth street, gave information on electrical wiring, and that he had made suggestions contrary to the rules of the board of underwriters.

After hearing the additional testimony and the principal's denial, the board adjourned to take the case under advisement. Its decision will be given out tomorrow. Complainants want Hamilton removed from the principalship of the trades school.
