TRACK
DIAMONDSMALL FIGHTERS
COME TO PLATEAttell Must Beat Reagan to
Fight Cove—Willis
Loses Meal Ticket.

San Francisco, Aug. 6.—Mike Attell has executed an aboufface and if he whips Jimmy Reagan in Oakland on August 11 he will have the privilege of meeting Percie Cove before the Mission club on August 20. If Reagan whips Attell, he will be Cove's opponent. The tangled wires were straightened out late last night, but not until there had been an awful scramble between fighters, managers and promoters.

After declaring the Attell-Cove match off yesterday, Matchmaker Hester of the Mission club went after Reagan and secured his signature to an agreement to fight Cove, at the same time throwing out the idea of a fight with Attell. When the Oakland promoters heard of this they retaliated by opening negotiations with Cove, offering him far more than he was guaranteed to fight. Mike Attell, seeing that he was in danger of being burned out of a fight on either side of the bay, got into a good behavior and promised to fight Cove for Hester, but Hester insisted that he must first whip Reagan. Attell agreed to this arrangement and now everything is lovely.

Somewhere in the mountains of Mendocino county Ketchel, his father and his brother are wandering about without the services of the boy manager and Britt has visions of Joe O'Connor, Ketchel's ex-manager, lying in wait ready to kidnap the middleweight champion. Ketchel started on the roughing trip some days ahead of Britt and when the human smokestack arrived in Point Arena, the metropolis of Mendocino county, he could find no trace of his charge. If Coffreth gets the match, and if it is made he stands a better chance of being the successful bidder than McCarey or any other promoter, he will enlarge his arena just over the county line.

Portland had Adams on second and Mayes smashed the ball hard toward center. Lynch ran back and made a flying leap for it, fastening it securely.

Portland's lone run was made in the third inning when Fournier lifted the sphere high over the right field fence. It was a pretty homer.

Seattle made the first run in the second inning. Frisk walked, and Capron singled. Mayes sacrificed and Whaling walked. Thompson's hit to center scored Frisk. Capron was forced at the plate for the third out.

In the last half of the thirteenth, Adams erred in throwing Raymond's grounder to first, after making a nice stop. Bennett sacrificed. Raymond scored from second on Capron's liner to right center. Chinault had passed Frisk, who had not hit safely in the game, to Bret Carro and made the mistake of his life.

OH! YOU FISHER;
HAVE ONE ON CAL

Now Ain't He the Nice Little Man for Fessing Up?

San Francisco, Aug. 6.—Catcher Fisher of the Portland club will receive a billet from President Cal Ewing which he can paste in his scrap book and show to his children in after years. Usually when the president of a league writes a player it is on an unpleasant subject. When players become too obstreperous it is up to the president to reprimand them in language caustic. But this time a player did something to merit the president's commendation.

According to the dispatches Van Halgren was grilled to a dark brown for calling Nick Williams safe at the plate in Tuesday's game. Subsequently Fisher admitted, however, that Van Halgren was right, and that he, Fisher, missed Nick when he slid in. "Any player who will speak out so manfully I am going to thank," said President Ewing today. "It shows that Fisher is a square sportsman, and I believe he should be commended, and I will have my secretary write him a letter. If there were more players like Fisher less fault would be found with the umpires. Players often miss tagging runners, and they try to put it on the umpires and often get away with it."

New Wonder for Oakland.

Manager Bill Reidy will have another outfielder in uniform the first of next month. Oakland has bought the release of Maggett, who is playing right field for Springfield in the Connecticut league. Duffy Lewis won't be with Oakland next year, and Maggett is meant for his place. The new acquisition is highly recommended by such experts as Don Cameron, who played with him in the Central association in 1907, and Trip O'Neil, president of the Western league. If the dope is of any consequence, Reidy has picked up a valuable outfielder.

Maggett batted .312 last year, ranking fourth in the league, and he is going at a .325 clip this season. In the last 19 games he has hit at .400. Cameron says Maggett bats left handed, is like a deer on his feet and is a reliable fielder. Oakland thinks Oakland was lucky buying such a fast artist. In 1907 Pittsburgh gave Maggett a trial, but he was young then and lacking in experience and Pittsburgh turned him over to Wheeling, where he hit .270.

Danny Long slipped away into the country the other day and signed another bushy who may be a major leaguer some day. It is from little bushers that big stars grow. Roy Ames, who has won 13 out of 17 games he has pitched for Helena, is the name of the youngest Seal. After seeing him perform Long made him an offer which Ames accepted and he ordered him to report to Mohler at Portland.

He whipped the ball over at top speed, and there was no one to get it. It rolled clear to right center where Johnson had an easy time racing home for the winning run. 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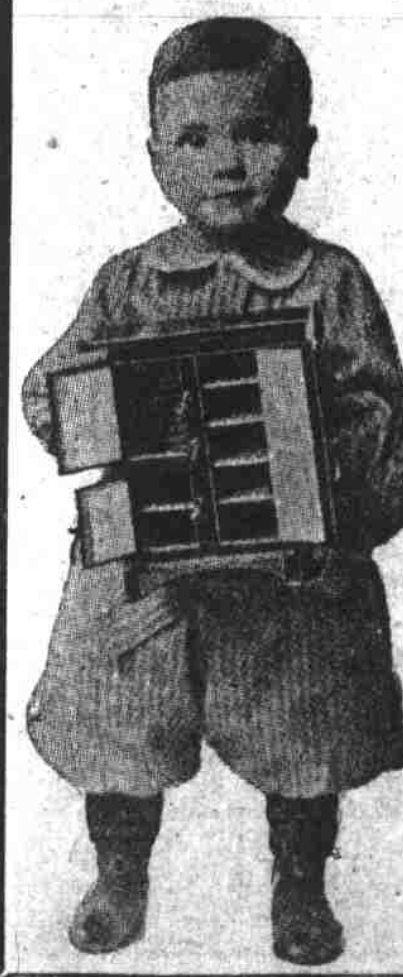
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
