

ARTILLERY IS SENT TO FRONT

Ninety men strong, Battery A, Oregon state field artillery, left at 5 o'clock this morning for Seaside, Or., where the annual encampment of the militia men will be held. At 7 o'clock the battery assembled at the armory and marched to the station with field pieces and caissons.

For 10 days the militiamen will

camp near Seaside, holding practice daily during the entire period. On Sunday, August 15, camp will be broken and the battery will return to Portland. It has been planned to hold field practice every morning of the encampment from 8 to 11 o'clock. From 1 to 3 o'clock in the afternoon pistol target practice will be held. In the finals the state medal for pistol shooting will be competed for.

Seaside offers an ideal location for target practice by the national guardsmen. The field pieces will be planted at the mouth of Necanicum creek and the targets placed out in the stream. They are set in such a position that danger from flying shells is entirely eliminated. Preparing for hard practice, the company took 140 rounds of ammunition beside a large number of

blanks. The range will be about four miles in length.

The battery is in charge of Captain H. U. Welch. Other commissioned officers in charge are First Lieutenants Randall and Kropka, Second Lieutenants Lee, Clark and Otterstead, and Lieutenant Holt, in charge of the hospital detachment.

Observation Car, Portland and Cottage Grove.

BIG BLACK BEAR PUTS FEAR INTO HEARTS OF BRAVE HARRIMAN MEN

Joe and his crowd are way up on the Lacksaw river, where everything has to be packed in on "man back."

So far there has been nothing in par-

ticular to shoot, but the fishing has been good. Three or four of the party fish almost every noon and catch enough to supply 15. One noon Joe caught eight fish in 40 minutes; three about six inches, three about 10 inches and two about 12 inches. His biggest catch so far has been between 14 and 15 inches.

One evening two of the men went

down to the creek for water. In a few minutes those at camp heard shots, and the two came running back and reported that they had seen a bear. Joe and one of the packers started on the hunt, but were unable to find the bear. A short time after their return to camp the bear came crashing through the brush past the camp and on up the creek. It was too dark to fire, and in about five minutes they heard cries of help from one of the men. The men in camp made a dash in the direction of the cries and met the man coming on the dead run. He had been sleeping and was awakened by a deep growling, and found the bear within 15 feet of him.

The beds were moved by the fire, and although the bear did no further dam-

age, he prowled around through the brush until midnight.

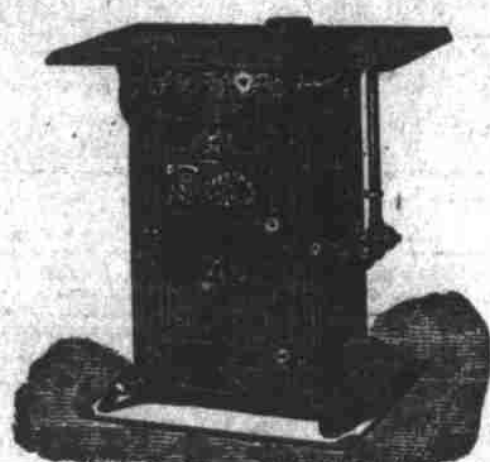
Joe says there is no chance for him to grow, as the exercise is too strenuous. He is coming home in the fall to enter college, where he will take up the further study of electricity.
