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Body of Unknown Man Tied in Blankets Is Fished Out of the River—Crime Committed Some Time Ago.

Everything points to the man having been murdered by strangulation, then wrapped in the bundle and cast into the river. The condition of the remains make it probable that the only clue leading to the belief that the remains are those of Gnomis is a flyleaf notebook bearing the name and address.
