RICH PERJURER
WANTS FAVORSSees No Reason Why Cell
Should Not Be Fitted
Up as Office.

San Rafael, Cal., Aug. 7.—Notwithstanding his objections to leaving the private cell for the main jail, millionaire William Bradbury, convicted of perjury, has been taken from the women's cell he has occupied and placed in one of the larger cells of the jail. His cellmate is a man who is accused of assault to commit murder.

After Bradbury had been placed in his new quarters he stated that he wanted privacy.
"I hoped to fix up my cell as an office so I could transact some important business deals I have on," he said angrily.

Later he was granted his request for a desk and Sheriff Taylor, aided by Bradbury and jail attendants, moved a large rolltop desk into the barred room occupied by the aged prisoner.

Bradbury then wanted a telephone installed but the sheriff would not permit him to have it.

Another disappointment was in store for the prisoner when the sheriff took from him a silver bell which he had purchased to ring for the jailer when he desired to send a telegram or post a letter.

Bradbury has raised a number of objections regarding his treatment in the prison and has asked privileges almost constantly. Sheriff Taylor said Bradbury would receive the same treatment accorded any other prisoner.

Newport, Or., Aug. 7.—The weather at Newport continues ideal. Visitors are coming by hundreds every day. The accommodations are more than double those of any former year, yet it is predicted that Newport will be a full town before the middle of the month.

Band concerts every evening, and the moonlight excursions on the bay are very popular. The band concert on Nye beach last Sunday afternoon was enjoyed by thousands and would have done credit to Professor Rosebrook's famous band. Rosebrook in his boyhood days was the leader of a Newport band.

The government jetty at the entrance of the bay is a scene of unusual activity. Old and young, including the "small boys," are catching the luscious tom cod by the thousands. They usually work in companies of two. One takes the fish off the hooks while the other hauls them out. A record catch is 300 fish in 45 minutes.

It is estimated that one fourth the people at this beach are here for the first time and as a rule they declare it to be the most attractive place they have ever visited. The great variety of agates is a source of unending interest to them.

The large skating rink is well patronized in the afternoon and evening. The select dancing parties are a source of delight to the young people.

American Girls.

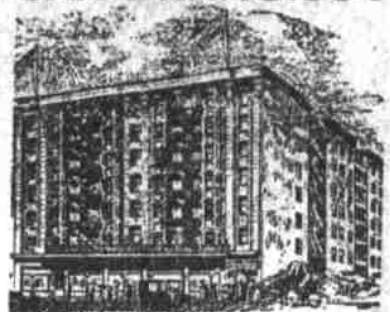

Berlin, Aug. 7.—The tables were turned today on the German press, which bitterly criticized American women for "unnatural relations with men of other races," during the agitation which followed the murder of Elsie Sigel by a Chinese in New York recently.

When the news came today from Frankfurt that a variety actress named Hoffman, of much beauty and wide popularity, had been killed by a Chinese lover who then committed suicide, the editors as well as the entire city, received a severe shock.

Tien Yen, the Chinese, is said to have paid devoted attention to the actress during her recent appearance here. She tired of him and secretly went to Frankfurt. From there she wrote to him, saying she would not return.

Tien took the first train for Frankfurt and tracing her whereabouts, called at her apartment. A quarrel followed and the celestial fired three bullets into the girl's body. He then sent two into his own brain.
