Magee is here shown at the bat, having just allowed a wide one to go past him. Besides being a safe hitter and a hard, timely wall-popper, Magee ranks among the best outfielders in the game. He is a star in the left field garden, and with the probable exception of Fred Clarke, has no equal for this position. It would be hard to find a ball player more valuable to the Giants than Magee would prove.

LISTING LANDS OF WASHINGTON

Investigation Will Show the Status of All Granted by the Government.

(United Press Leased Wire.)

Seattle, Aug. 7.—The joint house and senate investigating committee has determined to investigate the office of the state land commissioner, according to Chairman Pliny L. Allen. He said the committee was determined to find out what had become of all lands given by the government to Washington under the enabling act of 1889 and to make a permanent record of all sales and contracts for sale and secure a list of what is left.

Land Commissioner E. W. Ross has such a list in his office, but Mr. Allen says the committee has declined to consult it, and ignoring all that has gone before regarding these transfers, has set a force of expert clerks at the enabling act of 1889 and to make a permanent record of all sales and contracts for sale and secure a list of what is left.

Now comes Amos White with the knowledge that he is certain of the discovery of the location of the lost mine. The Mount Adams Prospecting association was formed, consisting of ranchers living in this valley. These are Elmer Wright, Alis Winegardner, John Winegardner, E. Arnold, James Brown, William Schnick, A. White, and another old miner of Portland. Five of the members, James Winegardner, Wright, Schnick, White and the other miner, left with pack horses the first of the week for the new discovery, which lies about 20 miles north-east of Trout lake, along the western base of Mount Adams. Provisions for a three weeks' trip were taken, and results prove satisfactory. The party will remain longer.

Wright, the leader of the party, says that a few of the places they expect to prospect are almost inaccessible, and that he will have to be lowered down into deep crevices or crevices with ropes. White exhibits specimens of gold quartz said to have been taken from the lost mine that assays \$5000 to the ton.

WILL PROSPECT FOR LOST MINE

Fabulously Rich Quartz Said to Be Located Near Mt. Adams, Washington.

(Special Dispatch to The Journal.)

Husum, Wash., Aug. 7.—A number of ranchers in the White Salmon valley have formed a stock company for the purpose of prospecting for gold in the vicinity of Mount Adams, gaining their knowledge of the whereabouts of a supposed lost mine from Amos White, an old miner, who for the past few years has been living in Portland.

Old settlers now living in the Horse Heaven country tell of a Freemen named Pierre Babado, who lived near Bickleton some 20 years ago, who mysteriously disappeared every spring and after a few weeks' absence would return with about \$500 worth of gold dust. He would evade all the curious ones as to his destination, but it was generally believed he procured his gold near the western base of Mount Adams. In the spring of 1891 the Freemen started on his annual trip for gold, but never returned. The theory was that he either was killed by Indians, or had passed on over the mountains to return no more.

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FOUR MEN SCALDED BY BOILING BLOOD
