After Western Business.—Western cities have money they wish to spend for eastern products; Worcester has wares she wishes to exchange for western cash. This excursion proposed to bring the two together. In this way the Worcester, Mass., board of trade explains its reasons for making a \$6000 mile trip to see Portland and the A-Y-P. and Seattle. The special train on which the party will travel under the direction of John L. Sewall, the board's secretary, will arrive in Portland according to schedule, Tuesday, August 17. While here they will do the town. Incidentally they will confer with local commercial organizations and business men regarding trade opportunities. The journey is the longest undertaken by any eastern commercial body and to honor the coming of the Massachusetts business men Worcester day has been set for August 12 at the exposition. The party will be entertained by the Commercial club while in Portland. They will be given a luncheon and taken on a trolley ride over the city.

Two Suits Filed.—Only two divorces suits have been started in circuit court, and both of the plaintiffs advanced pleas of simple desertion. Edith Winnifred Whittle was married to Charles Whittle April 12, 1906. She says in her complaint that he deserted her three months later. They have no children. A. J. who divorces a decree. Lois M. Wigle asks the custody of the two children, one nine and the other five years old. She married to A. L. Wigle in Benton county, Or., September 20, 1898. He left her in March of last year, she says.

New York Society.—The New York State Society of Oregon instead of its regular meeting will give a launching party on the evening of Tuesday, August 10, on the launch Rose City, leaving Merrill's boat house, foot of Morrison street, at 7:30 o'clock sharp. The trip will be up the Willamette to about Oswego, where light refreshments will be served, returning to the city in time to catch cars to any part of the city. Off to Irrigation Congress.—Nearly 100 delegates from Oregon will leave tonight and tomorrow morning for Spokane to attend the National Irrigation congress which will open there tomorrow. The congress will be in session from August 9 to 14 and many irrigation matters of moment to the Pacific northwest states, particularly Oregon, will be discussed. Most of the delegation from Portland will leave for Spokane tonight.

Threatens to Kill Herself.—Mrs. Par Burge who a few days ago told her husband arrested for cruelty but who failed to secure a conviction, last night wrote her husband telling him that she intended taking her life somewhere in the suburbs of the city. She claimed that she was tired of living and that her dead body would be found Monday morning. Constable Wagner is working on the case and hopes to prevent the rash act.

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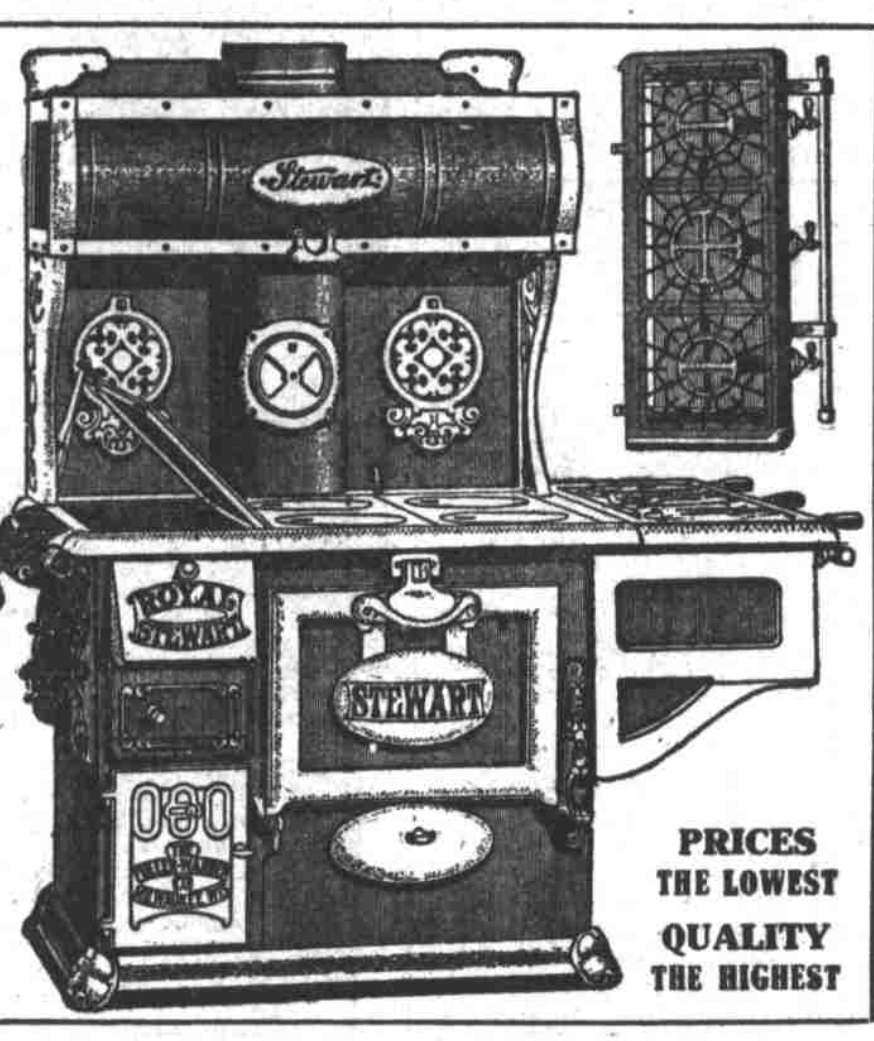
