

# HEADQUARTERS TO BE IN THIS CITY

## Decision Reached at Convention of Women of Woodcraft.

At this morning's session of the Women of Woodcraft convention it was determined, pending final vote, that the headquarters of the grand guardian, grand clerk and grand banker shall hereafter be in Portland. This question came up for discussion under the revision of the constitution, which is the work of today's session.

The revision of the constitution is the most important work of the convention and it is being carefully considered from beginning to end. Some of the important questions so far discussed are the name, objects, purposes, territory, where they shall operate, principal officers, archives, records, headquarters of grand circles officers, composition, general powers of the grand circle and committees of the grand circle. The committee on laws has been made a permanent part of the grand circle.

It has further been decided that any officer who has served three consecutive terms and has retired with honor shall have the rank of past grand guardian conferred upon him. This will entitle her to a seat in the grand sessions.

All of the questions discussed are pending the final vote, but no opinion is anticipated to the adoption of them.

Coeur d'Alene, Idaho, Aug. 9.—At 10 o'clock this morning Miss Helen Hamilton, niece of the mayor of Coeur d'Alene, picked an envelope from a heap of 105 on the mammoth platform erected in the heart of this city, and Uncle Sam's drawing for lands in the Coeur d'Alene, Spokane and Priestland Indian reservation was on. The Coeur d'Alene lands will be drawn first. The chance for these is considered one in 200. Three thousand names will be drawn for the Coeur d'Alene reservation lands, about twice the number of homesteads on this reservation. Miss Hamilton had drawn the first 100 names, Miss Christiana Donlan of Missoula, Mont., and Miss Harriet Post of Spokane assisted her. The three will continue drawing until 3000 names are drawn.

For the flathead reservation about 6000 applicants will be drawn and for the Spokane reservation about 250, in each case about twice the number of the available homesteads, to allow for improperly filled out applications and for any other irregularities, and for those who fail to appear at the proper time to make entry.

The drawing for Coeur d'Alene lands this morning, failed to attract the large crowd expected; very few strangers were in town and at 9:50 o'clock when Judge Witten ordered the opening of the 20 metal cans containing the names, not over 1000 people were present. The arrangements for the drawing have been carefully planned. Good order was maintained and the work of drawing proceeded rapidly.

Preceding the drawing, Judge Witten spoke briefly. He defended the method adopted by the government in these land drawings against the common charge of lottery. Lottery is defined as the act of paying for the privilege of losing or winning something in these drawings. He claimed no such charge existed. The government, he said, had found the system the most satisfactory yet devised. Judge Witten defended the fairness of the system and invited any one who thought he could pick out his own application to step upon the platform and take 30 minutes to the task. No one appearing the drawing began.

Contention suits have been in progress by Harriman people for right of way over the wagon road which will undoubtedly call for trial this fall. Ten days. Oregon Trunk and the Harriman line included in this suit and settled by the settlement of this suit.

Cotton Apparently Willing.

W. W. Cotton, attorney for the Harriman interests, is in the Dailies today, presumably preparing papers for the filing of a suit there, but it is known that he has suggested that all the matters in dispute between the two companies be settled in one suit and if he and the attorneys for the Oregon Trunk line can come to an understanding, an arrangement may be made to enlarge the present suit so as to include all the matters at issue or its withdrawal and the filing of a new and complete one.

The suit filed this morning was brought to enjoin the Deschutes Railroad company from going upon or interfering with any work upon the right of way from a point about the mouth of White river southward to Madras. This involves the title to about 60 miles of right of way which the Oregon Trunk line claims to have an actual trail for from the United States. It is alleged in the complaint that July 21, 1908, and June 21, 1909, the secretary of the interior approved the maps of definite location of the Oregon Trunk and that no maps covering this distance have ever been approved for the Deschutes Railroad company.

No Rights Conceded.

The contention of the plaintiffs is that the defendant has no rights whatever upon the right of way covered in this suit and is a mere trespasser. It is charged that the Harriman contractors have gone on the land with men and teams and have torn down part of the grade already constructed by the plaintiff and have pulled up and destroyed the grade stakes and obliterated the line of survey in various places and it also claims that the Harriman company has used powder to blow up some of the work.

It is charged that these trespasses are unlawful, and that unless an injunction is granted there is danger of violence and innumerable lawsuits.

Included in the showing made by the plaintiffs to obtain the injunction order is an affidavit by President V. D. Williamson and another by W. H. Bethel, chief engineer of the Oregon Trunk line. These affidavits assert that the original surveys of the Oregon Trunk were begun in the early part of 1906. Soon after they were begun the Harriman people began a survey also.

Both Have Surveyed.

These surveys were all in the lower part of the canyon, near the Columbia and resulted in parties filing plats with the interior department on that stretch of the river comprised between the mouth and a point near the mouth of the White Salmon river. It is only recently that the secretary of the interior has approved the maps of both parties on that portion of the surveys. But it is claimed that as to the remainder of the Oregon Trunk's surveys which run from the White river southward to Madras, no attempt was made by the Harriman people to get a survey until recently, and the surveys that were made did not file with the secretary of the interior by the Oregon Trunk were allowed as early as July 21, 1908; but, notwithstanding this situation, the Deschutes company, it is alleged, has been hoping to get a grant of the right of way along that part of the river, and in anticipation of it has taken possession and done some work along its opponent's line of right of way.

There are also involved in the suit the rights across some ranches near "The Cove," opposite the Warm Springs Indian reservation, to which the Oregon Trunk has deeded from the owners, but upon which the Deschutes company has put men and camps and has attempted to fence up the plaintiffs' right of way.

Bond Is Required.

Judge Wolverson allowed the application for the restraining order, requiring the plaintiffs to give the National Surety company as surety. The papers were placed in the hands of the marshal for service early this morning and service was had upon W. Litten, a member of Mr. Cotton's office and secretary of the Deschutes Railroad company.

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upon the plaintiffs' right of way, but the defendant is permitted to approach August 13 and show cause why the injunction should not be made permanent. At that time it is probable that a hearing will be had by Judge Wolverson and the defendant will file affidavits disputing the claims of the plaintiffs.

Incorporated in Nevada.

It is presumed that one of the first attacks made upon the Trunk line by the Harriman attorneys is that it is not an Oregon incorporation and therefore has no standing in court or in the state as a railroad company. The Oregon Trunk line was incorporated in the state of Nevada and made its survey under that incorporation. This, it is claimed by the Harriman attorneys, should prevent the company from having any rights as a railroad company in this state, and before they would go ahead on a common suit to settle their difficulties with the Trunk line it is probable they would insist upon decision as to this point.

The Southern Pacific company itself is a Nevada corporation. The company, but in constructing branch lines and extensions it works under the name of various incorporations, leasing the lines from them when completed. In instances, the Southern Pacific's line from Ashland to Portland is legally the Oregon & California Railroad company, just as the Portland-Seattle extension is known as the Oregon & Washington railroad.

## NEW CONSTITUTION TO MAKE CONGRESS A PERMANENT BODY

(Special Dispatch to The Journal.)

Spokane, Wash., Aug. 9.—The report of the executive committee of the National Irrigation congress, brought in today at the seventeenth annual convention of the organization, presents a rewritten constitution, designed to make the organization permanent.

This constitution provides for the enlargement of the board of governors to seven persons, with the provision that no two members of the board shall be from one state.

The constitution as drafted also authorizes the board to initiate action and to meet emergencies and authorizes the executive committee to open offices and expend funds.

The executive committee's report was adopted, which is tantamount to amending the constitution of the congress. The new constitution gives all conservation commissions, state and federal, representation in the congress. This is regarded as a victory for the supporters of Finchot.

## SCIENTISTS WILL BUILD NEW CHURCH

The Dailies, Or., Aug. 9.—The Christian Science association of this city has begun the erection of a church edifice on the corner of Case and Seventh streets. It is a wooden structure with stone basement which, complete, will cost in the neighborhood of \$2000, not including furnishings. The main auditorium will be 34x50 feet, with a 10x16 classroom in front, besides an \$x10 hall. The finishing inside will be in natural Oregon fir, and the general style of architecture is in the modern.

The seating capacity of the auditorium will be 175. For a number of years the society had rooms in the Masonic building, where regular Sunday afternoon services were held; but of recent years the society has been meeting with Mrs. W. Lord. When the new church is completed they expect to have a regular service to conduct their services.

## MANY NEW TEACHERS FOR DALLES SCHOOLS

# MRS. SHOCKLEY SEEKS DIVORCE

## Accuses Husband of Cruel and Inhuman Treatment.

Marian Amelia Shockley, now under indictment charged with running a disorderly house, today filed suit in the circuit court for divorce from her husband Elmer Lee Shockley. Charges of cruelty are preferred against the husband.

They were married January, 1908, in Boise, Idaho. They had been together less than a year, she alleges, when his first exhibited signs of an ungovernable temper. On July 16 of that year it is alleged, he beat and abused her, leaving bruises that lasted for weeks. Then again on August 1, when they were living at 31 1/2 Stark streets, she charges that he again set upon her, beating and abusing her and applying vile names to her. The case has not been set as yet.

Shockley had his wife arrested in June charged with keeping disorderly house, and she was indicted by the grand jury June 14. It is believed that the indictment will be dropped and that she will go free. C. A. Sheppard is her attorney.

## BITTEN BY MAD DOG; WATER KILLS HIM

New Orleans, Aug. 9.—A small glass of mineral water standing on the bar of a local saloon was the cause of the death of John Higgins, an Englishman, whose body is in charge of city officials who are awaiting instructions for its disposal.

Higgins was bitten by a mad dog four weeks ago, and was taken to a Pasteur institute for treatment. He left the institute before his cure was effected, but until yesterday retained his normal health.

Entering a saloon during the hottest part of the day Higgins noticed a glass of water on the bar. He rolled to the floor, writhing and uttering strange snarling sounds. The combined efforts of several men were necessary to pin him to the floor. He died an hour later.

## CANNON IS NOT READY TO RETIRE

## WESTERN RAILROADS BUY 57 ENGINES

Philadelphia, Aug. 9.—Western railroads today ordered 57 locomotives from the Baldwin Locomotive works. The value of the engines will aggregate about \$1,000,000. As the result of the order many men who were laid off during the panic are being reemployed. The resumption of operation of the plant on a large scale is the cause of gratification in business circles.

## BOARD OF INQUIRY REPORT READY

San Francisco, Aug. 9.—The special board of inquiry named by Captain Theophilus Phelps, commandant of the Mare Island navy yard, to investigate the charges against Commander Clarence Carr, of the steam engineering department of the navy, for his passing of work alleged to be defective has closed its labors. Its verdict has been sent and sent to the navy department at Washington. If the charges are sustained it means a court martial for the officer. The court has been held behind closed doors with all members and witnesses sworn to secrecy so that information concerning its findings have been kept from the public.

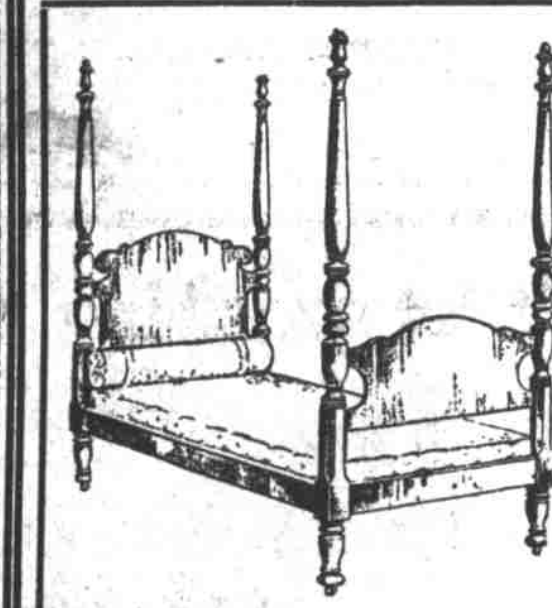
