

MAKING PLANS FOR RICH MAN HAS LARGE CAR BARNS STRANGE MANIA

Streetcar Company Will Put in Concrete Building on East Ankeny.

Plans are being prepared for the construction of new permanent car barns for the Portland Railway, Light & Power company, to be located between East Burnside and East Ankeny just east of East Twenty-eighth street. Vice President F. L. Fuller of the company, announced this morning. The structure, according to present plans, will be built of reinforced concrete and will cost between \$20,000 and \$40,000. Its capacity will be 40 cars.

Mr. Fuller also stated that so rapidly has the construction and extension of the work of the company been pushed this summer that all the big track building and paving jobs now under way will be completed by the first week in September. This includes the two miles of Hawthorne avenue to Forty-first street, Union avenue to Alberta street, with the exception of the small part between Broadway and Holladay avenue. Also Broadway to Nineteenth street, where the paving has already been laid, and Belmont and Thurman streets, as far as has been contracted for.

"Our inability to obtain paving brick as fast as we need them to carry on our work constitutes our greatest handicap," Mr. Fuller said. Ten Portland Railway, Light & Power company flat cars are on their way to Portland, carrying 250 tons of steel rails to be used for track work here. Ten more cars, also belonging to the company and intended as the first consignment for freight service in this vicinity, are scheduled to leave the Loring plant today, loaded with an additional 250 tons of steel rails.

Surveys for the extension of the O. W. P. line from Cassidoro to the new power plant three miles farther up the river have been completed and the estimates of cost will be completed tomorrow. The contract for the brick work of the new car barns near the golf links will be let today. Mr. Fuller has also received word that the city will enter cars will be received for local service in September; a second 20 will arrive in November.

BRILLIANT LIGHTS FOR 7TH STREET

Twenty-five owners of property fronting on Seventh street, between the Union depot and Jefferson street, assembled at the first meeting of what is to be a west side improvement association, held in room 301 of the Hotel Belmont, last night. Plans for the lighting of Seventh street with lights according to the Los Angeles plan, as outlined in the Journal several days ago, were discussed and unanimously approved, and at the close of the meeting a committee was appointed to start the movement.

E. G. Ames, president, and J. C. Beck, secretary, were the temporary officers elected last night and they, with a committee composed of J. P. Moffatt, George L. Baker, Henry J. Baker, and C. C. Friendly, will effect the permanent organization. This committee is also authorized to present the proposition for the lighting of the street to the city council. Another committee composed of Ames, Beck and M. C. Dickerson is to have the lights hung at an equal expense to the property owners and city. The property owners will install the lights, while the city is to keep them burning. The Los Angeles lighting system consists of a series of clusters of lights strung three or four to the block. This makes a thoroughfare so thoroughly lighted that no person, either man, woman or child, need fear molestation while on that street at night. It is believed that the plan will go through without a hitch, as most of the property owners have already agreed to bear their share.

MAN THOUGHT LOST FOUND BY SISTER

(United Press Leased Wire.) Meridian, Miss., Aug. 11.—Thought to have been shipwrecked and lost in the Gulf of Mexico five years ago, the mystery surrounding the disappearance of P. H. Thorne of this city was cleared up today when a telegram from Miss Zola Thorne at Seattle to her parents announced that she had found her father working in a Seattle department store. Thorne's parents are wealthy. He left home and a steamer on which he sailed from New Orleans was wrecked. Thorne lost all his possessions. He then went to Seattle to seek a fortune before returning home, according to the telegram.

Kenosha, Wis., Aug. 11.—Judge Clarkson, who disappeared three weeks ago, and who was found by relatives working as an unskilled workman in a button factory 200 miles away from his home, gratified his yearning for manual labor today by becoming an employee of the lacquer room of the Simmons Manufacturing company.

Before taking up his new labor Clarkson announced the dissolution of the new law partnership he had formed with Robert Baker.

While laboring, Clarkson said he would study to become an Episcopal minister.

Clarkson's case has attracted general attention. Twice within the last 15 years he has disappeared from his home to do the work of a day laborer. When found he explained the desire by the statement "something drives" him to manual labor.

Clarkson has enjoyed a large law practice and has been on the superior bench. He is reputed to be wealthy.

THREE STATES STAND BY ROOSEVELT

"The good work of the reclamation service protects the public depending upon it. They demand that the reclamation service be kept free from political disturbance of any kind."

Topics: Land and Irrigation. Topics relating to public lands and irrigation filled the program at the morning session of the congress. Howard Elliott, president of the Northern Pacific railroad, chose for his subject, "The National Association of Audubon Societies." Elliott, who is a well-known bird expert, spoke on "Irrigation in South Dakota." William L. Finley, field agent of the National Association of Audubon Societies, discussed "The Value of Wild Birds to Forest and Field." F. H. Griswold, assistant secretary of the Irrigation congress, spoke on "The Message of the West to the East."

Elliott Pleads for "Peace." Commending the federal reclamation service, condemning the Roosevelt policies as useless agitation and expressing confidence that the present administration will not disturb business, President Elliott's speech was one of the most remarkable of the congress. He said in part: "The reclamation service is doing one of the greatest works of the age. In the reclamation service there are many strong and good men and much credit should be given them."

Elliott then branches into a discussion of the eight-hour day. "The railroad has no holiday; no eight hour day. After all the risks it has taken, how few men are paid for their work. Good and faithful servants. The real railroad question of today is not whether the rate should be three or two cents, but whether the country should permit rewards sufficient to induce strong men to invest their money so that facilities may keep pace with demands. The eight-hour day doctrine tends to crush out ambition. Everyone who has accomplished much in this world has worked from 10 to 14 hours a day."

"There has been delay in the development of the western country, because of attacks upon the rights of property. Abuse in every case is exaggerated and distorted. Let us hope we are now entering upon a period when necessary discussion of great business affairs will be held in a calm and reasonable manner."

Pardee Attacks Ballinger. Declaring that the recent rulings of Secretary Ballinger redound only to the interests of corporate greed, former Governor George C. Pardee of California took up the cudgels with the secretary of the interior. He said:

"It is a greater question than money making for those who will use the land for their own and their children's good. Therefore there are not a few people who will look with regret upon the recent rulings of the secretary of the interior concerning the operations of the reclamation act. 'No one has yet the right to question the secretary's loyalty to the principles of government reclamation, but there is one class of people who will rejoice at the secretary's rulings; that class is composed of those who are opposed to the reclamation service, and would, for one reason or another, like to see it hampered in its great work.'"

Reversed Garfield. "In rendering these decisions, Secretary Ballinger has reversed his predecessor, Secretary Garfield, whose loyalty to the principles of government reclamation has never been questioned. It is true Garfield had his opinions on the rulings of Garfield reversed, which rulings of Garfield had been based upon the opinions of western lawyers and members of congress, who sided in the passage of the reclamation act."

The first of Secretary Ballinger's reversals of Secretary Garfield's rulings, which has aroused those desirous of protecting arid lands, was that decision which restored to public entry 1,000,000 acres which Garfield had withdrawn in order that valuable water rights might be kept from the hands of those who monopolize them to make burdens for the people.

"Ballinger based his decisions on the opinions of advisers who argued that there was no specific law authorizing Garfield to make withdrawals. But it cannot be denied that Garfield and his legal advisers thought he was acting within the law and that President Taft ordered no more restorations; and the president has quite a reputation as a lawyer."

Should Give People Best of It. "Another of Ballinger's rulings, overruling the cooperative certificate plan, will make it more difficult and onerous for settlers to obtain homesteads. It is based on a ruling from Attorney General Wickham upon what is believed by many to have been an incomplete statement of the case by Ballinger to Wickham. The ruling of Ballinger puts many hardships upon settlers. If any one is pleased with it it is those who desire to see the building of irrigation works done by private corporations."

"It is at all outside the pale of reasonable and just government to say that it should be the duty of those in high authority to show reasonable diligence in finding a law for the people instead of one against them."

ABHORS POOR FARM; ATTEMPTS SUICIDE

Pasadena, Cal., Aug. 11.—In debt and unable to get work, Henry Feiler, 57 years of age, and a resident of this city for a quarter of a century, tried last night to end his life rather than spend his last days at the county poor farm. Feiler entered his room, and after swallowing the contents of an ounce phial of chloroform, stabbed himself in the groin with a pocket knife and lay down to die. He left a letter to the coroner and two others to friends in this city, telling the reason for his act.

The old man was taken to a hospital, where it was announced he had a chance to recover. His only relative in the west, a brother, died at Salem, Or., a month ago.

ONLY \$70 PER FOR EVELYN

New York, Aug. 11.—Evelyn Thaw has denied that she is contemplating suing the Thaw family for \$500,000. She said: "It is unjust to make me live on \$70 per week, with only an extra \$500 per month, but I don't know what I can do. I won't sue."

PECULIAR SITUATION IN IRVIN ESTATE

Alhambra, Or., Aug. 11.—There is a peculiar situation in reference to the estate of Samuel J. Irvin, who died recently. On August 5, J. Fred Yates of Corvallis began the administration of estate, with Mrs. Luana E. Hood of Philomath as administratrix. The estate was given as \$1000 in Linn county

and \$1000 in Benton county. Today S. M. Garland of Lebanon began proceedings for the establishment of a will in the same estate, the estate being given as consisting of \$1000 worth of property in Linn county and \$3000 in Benton county. Under it all the property is left to a sister, Beale Boyd of Sodaville, and S. M. Garland is named as executor. The witnesses to the will are O. P. McLean, J. W. Burkhardt and J. G. Gill. The parties asking for the administration of the estate knew nothing of the will.
